- 6. Report on Approval of the January 27, 2013 Annual Meeting Minutes Approved by Church Council at February, 2013 meeting.

B. ELECTION OF COUNCIL

Matters Discussed:

Rick Kern, our Operating Chairman for the past 17 years, updated the congregation on various improvements made to the facility, and the ongoing capital needs required. Two million dollars have been spent the past 16 years, and approximately two million dollars will be required for the next 6 to 25 years, or an average of \$100,000.00 per year.

Bill Lasher presented a financial overview with a 5-year illustration.

Kurt Sahlmann brought up the subject of a new organ which is not presently budgeted for at this time, but would probably be paid for outside the budget when needed.

Pastor Coleman reiterated his request that more parishioners should avail themselves of the Adult Spiritual Growth classes and the Adult Forum classes on Sunday mornings.

It was also mentioned there is a need for more volunteers for the Altar Guild, Communion Assistants and Stewardship Committee.

Kurt Sahlmann has prepared two videos for Luther Memorial (one of which was shown at the meeting), and these are now available on You Tube and our website.

A motion to accept the 2014 Budget and the other five resolutions listed was made by Sandy Barbaro, seconded by Skip MacInnes. Motion carried.

REPORT OF THE CHURCH COUNCIL PRESIDENT

ANNUAL REPORT FOR 2014

On the pages that follow, you will read reports of the many activities and accomplishments of the various committees and organizations that have carried out ministry in the name of Jesus and Luther Memorial Church during this past year. I invite you to read them carefully and offer up a prayer of thanksgiving to God for the ministry that is represented in these reports. During this past year, as has been the case for over 150 years, Luther Memorial Church has been a thriving congregation that is constantly challenging itself to grow and expand mission. It has been my honor and joy to serve as president of the church council and to have been a part of so much good work.

Every month during this past year, in the week prior to the church council meeting, Pastor Coleman and I have met together to quietly review and discuss the progress of our shared ministry at Luther Memorial and to prepare the agenda for the upcoming council meeting. It has been our practice to evaluate work that is ongoing; to challenge each other with ideas for new work that we might suggest to the church council and to spend some time in meditation and prayer. We always come away from our time together with a humble sense of thanksgiving for the dedicated members of the congregation who serve in so many ways. In particular, I want to recognize and thank the members of the church council. It has been a genuine pleasure to watch you prayerfully wrestle with issues both large and small and to participate with you as you carefully make decisions and take actions that reflect our shared commitment to furthering God's mission through the ministry of Luther Memorial Church.

It is good for us to periodically pause and reflect on what we have accomplished together as a congregation. That's part of the rationale for an annual congregation meeting. Equally as important as a quick look back though is a positive and challenging look forward. There is much to be done in the name of the Lord here in Erie and beyond, and I would like to take a moment to suggest a few areas that we might consider as we think about the ministry year ahead.

We have taken some bold steps in ministry that impact life in our immediate community. Our participation in several programs that serve the needy and homeless with food and shelter and clothing is a strong witness to our response to Jesus' call to care for the least among us. I challenge us to increase our support of and participation in existing programs and to look for even more opportunities to work in cooperation with community groups and other congregations in caring for those among us who are hurting and in need. In addition, I would challenge us to build upon the very successful "God's Work – Our Hands" project at McKinley Elementary School and look for other opportunities where we can help in similar ways. Finally, I propose that we build upon our close relationship with The Bethany Outreach Center. The church council has been briefed on a reading improvement project that is being considered and I hope that as the project develops, we will offer ourselves in as many ways as possible to enable its success.

I sense a growing understanding at Luther Memorial that we are an integral part of the larger church and that the ministry of The Northwest Pennsylvania Synod of the ELCA and the ELCA itself is, indeed, our ministry. Our gifts to the relief of world hunger, to a school in Africa through a companion synod project and to ELCA disaster relief to fight the Ebola outbreak are examples. There has been some preliminary conversation about the possibility of missionary sponsorship through the ELCA. I propose we continue to explore that opportunity as well as other projects where we can play an active role in reaching those who have not heard the Gospel.

Report of the Council President, cont'd.:

Luther Memorial Academy continues to be a valuable and important part of our mission and yet I sense that many in the congregation seem to have little knowledge or understanding of the operation of the school. I propose a closer working relationship between the leadership of the school and the leadership of the congregation to the end that both the school and the congregation will grow in support each other's mission.

It has always been my belief that the church either moves forward or falls backward; there is no standing still. Luther Memorial church is strongly moving forward, and I deem it a privilege to be part of the leadership in that movement. Please accept my thanks to all for your support of and participation in the ministry of Lutheran Memorial. We have much more to do! Plan to take an active part as we answer God's call to serve in the years to come.

Because I communicate to you in many different forms during the year, from sermons, to council reports, and Parish Banner articles, my report will be very simple and not try to encapsulate the entire year because my memory is not that great! I try, during the whole year, to offer my words of thanksgiving to the staff, council and you as disciples of Jesus. I am very thankful for each of you. My sense of call to this place continues to be affirmed in so many ways, and I hope this sense of call is something you can see in me, which I hope provides stability in the midst of so many life changes. The challenges and opportunities of Christian ministry are significant, but the best things in life are always filled with challenges. I take comfort in knowing that God is present and guiding us, and we have the support of one another. It's hard to believe how quickly this year has passed, and how much has happened, and yet, even though the year was rapid and haphazard at times, as God's children, we were surrounded by the promise of God's love. What I mean to say is that it's easy to lose momentum because the newness is gone, and as a result, the Christian practices of faith could begin to start to fall away, and so I ask you to realize **how much we need you... not just part of you, but all of you.** For the Church to be here for you, in your joys and sorrows, we are all needed to make that continued presence happen. This is an exciting time to be the Church because the old walls and barriers are coming down, so in this time of transition and change we root ourselves into the life of Jesus, our rock and shepherd, through the six marks of discipleship:

REPORT OF THE PASTORAL ASSISTANT ANNUAL REPORT FOR 2014

It seems inconceivable, that this is the third annual report I have had to prepare as the Pastoral Assistant. I continue to feel blessed by your vision and willingness to take the Lutheran mission and ministry in Erie in a new and different direction. As we continue to strive to witness to the good news of the gospel of Jesus Christ, God continues to bless our work.

St. Matthew's has hosted a neighborhood picnic for the children of the area on two separate occasions, along with a Christmas Party that hosted over 30 children, and also has begun a Friday evening spaghetti dinner (free will donation) for the neighborhood, as we say to them as Philip said to Nathanael, "Come and see." (John 1:46). St. Matthew's continues to host the GECAC Headstart programs that serve 160 children every day during the school year, and numerous 12-Step programs.

Holy Trinity hosts the Tuesday evening Pasta Kitchen (serving 80-100 each week), the Soup Kitchen on Wednesdays and Saturdays at noon (20-40 each day), with a Food Pantry on Tuesday evenings, and a Clothes Closet on Tuesday evenings, and at the Saturday Soup kitchens. The kitchen ministry is coordinated by a volunteer from Immanuel Lutheran, and 95% of the people working in this ministry are from the wider ecumenical community. The food pantry and clothes ministries are coordinated by Holy Trinity members. There is also a "Sloppy Joe" dinner the last Thursday of each month hosted by local congregations (LM is there too!).

We continue to be blessed by our dedicated volunteers and the ongoing financial support from many of the same folks and the community at large. This year through the impetus of our volunteers we started a "GoFundMe" site that raised an additional \$1500+. These contributions help enable the congregation to sustain this important neighborhood outreach.

Holy Trinity continues to host a two week session of the Overflow Shelter (Our Neighbor's Place). There is a Wednesday evening outreach for the young men of the neighborhood that has 10-20 attending each week, and there are 12-step programs that are hosted as well.

The continuation of these ministries is a result of your vision and willingness. Please know that both congregations truly appreciate your witness, and that you are welcome to visit any time the spirit would move you, and are always welcome to volunteer your time and talents in whatever way you are moved, as well.

The following were new or significantly changed in 2014:

- The youth are excited with their new space and have already been gathering there for confirmation class, children's church class, and LYO meetings.
- Fundraising for the LYO will continue, and plans will begin in January 2014 for the next National Youth Gathering which will be in Detroit, MI in July 2015.
- ➤ 2014 was the second year our youth attended Lutherlyn for their Winter Retreat. The retreat was January 31 February 2. Luther had 12 youth attending. This year we are looking at a few more. This is our way to provide an outing due to the discontinuation of the Clarion Retreat.
- ➤ The LYO (grades 7-12) continues to grow as does our Children's Church.
- The groupings for ministry have been redefined and are as follows: Pre/LYO (kdg.-6), LYO (grades 7-12), YAL (ages 18-25), and MORe (Middle of the Road, ages 25-50).
- The men's and women's softball teams completed a second season. Information will be shared to see if there is interest for 2015.
- ➤ A Corn Hole Tournament in September was well attended and enjoyed, as well as an Ugly Sweater Party in December. They were second annual in 2014, and we look forward to the third annual in 2015.
- > The Care Squad this school year, 2014-2015, is continuing to work with the Neighborhood Partnership.
- ➤ Volunteer opportunities have been available at different times and in different locations this year such as the Second Harvest Food Bank, The Over-Flow Shelter, and ServErie.
- The nursery would like to thank Megan Silvis for her time and care she shared with our young children over the last year. This past August Brennan Coleman was welcomed on board to our nursery. Tyler Keller continues to work in the nursery.
- Service Sundays with the LYO. In the fall 2014 we raked leaves at Loretta Deeds' and Sharon Burke's homes. In the spring we will be having another Service Sunday and hope to have another in the summer and continue in 2015.

LMC PROPERTY COMMITTEE ANNUAL REPORT FOR 2014



As the winter of 2013-14 began, all of the LMC heating systems were fired up in anticipation of a severe winter. It didn't take long to observe that our aging boiler was burning so poorly that soot was clogging half of the burners. This prompted a full system shutdown and cleaning which required the installation of a temporary forced air furnace to aide in battling the cold temperatures in the main church. Thank you to all for your tolerance and patience. This service cost \$3,426.00 and got us through winter. During this past summer, an annual required boiler safety inspection uncovered leaks which had developed since the cleaning. It was determined that repairing the old boiler would cost nearly as much as a new boiler. After working through a bid process, Bill Morewood Plumbing was selected to replace the boiler for \$30,699.00. While waiting out the lead time for ordering and unanticipated parts shortages, the old boiler was removed and the new boiler installation began. Inspection and certification proceeded the new boiler being put into service in late December of 2014. An annual preventive maintenance program should assure us that we will not have to revisit the boiler issues for many years to come. The best part of this agonizing boiler situation came when we were notified that our insurance carrier had agreed to pay \$23,584.00 towards the replacement costs leaving LMC to pay \$7,115.00. Who doesn't believe in miracles now!

The other significant project completed this past year was the beautiful meditation garden conceived by Bob Banks, Les Fobes, Brian Chafee and the Art Committee. The old cornerstones from Bethany and LMC were configured as a bench, and the large stainless cross from Bethany was located in a place of prominence. This project was made possible by the Bunny Britton memorial fund. Dedication was this past November, honoring our Pastor William Coleman for his extraordinary service.

Missing slate shingles on the main church roof were replaced this past fall. The copper flashings were inspected at the same time. In the next few years some additional flashing work may be required, however, the roof in general is in good condition for its age and should serve us for many years to come.

The balance of the year consisted of regular maintenance items such as carpentry, carpet cleanings, light bulb replacements, elevator inspections and maintenance, summer painting and snow plowing. All things considered, Property successfully worked through a rather difficult year but not without some impact on the 2014 budget. LMC Services cost \$14,183.92 against a budget of \$10,000.00. LMC Repairs and Maintenance cost \$19,483.22 against a budget of \$18,000.00. The total over budget for both accounts combined was \$5,667.14 as the result of the unexpected challenges that LMC Property faced over the year.

Projects that are being considered for the future include the replacement of the tiled side aisles of the church and repairs to some of our stained glass windows. Staying current with maintenance is a daunting task offering little respite every year! All bequests and gifts to LMC Property needs are so gratefully appreciated!

The best part of every annual report is the opportunity it provides to mention our appreciation to those who help to keep our highly used facility in such good condition. Thank you to all who contributed their time and talent to our facilities over this past year, it makes a difference! A special thank you to Miriam Scheid, Dave & Norma Buerk and Charlie Lintelman for their extraordinary service.

LUTHER MEMORIAL CONCERT SERIES ANNUAL REPORT 2014

During 2014, the Luther Memorial Concert Series (LMCS) committee members included: Pat Bellingham, Molly Dugan, Walt Gaber, Brian Hubbard, Greg Kern, Mark Lechner & David Ruler. All committee members continue to serve diligently to deliver each successful season: planning, finances & budget, program logistics, etc.

The continuation of the "Second Sunday Family & Friends Preludes" (SSF&FP) has been a success. On the second Sunday of every month, at the 10:30 service, an extended prelude is offered by a member or friend of Luther Memorial. This addition to our programming provides a venue for those family and friends to offer their talents as part of the LM worship experience. It is the desire of the LMCS that we recognize and support those that have been given music talents and have invested the time, finances and energy to develop those talents – especially when they can be realized to the glory of our Creator.

We continue to "host" well-known area performing groups. The LMCS has provided the venue for performances by the Erie Chamber Orchestra and Erie Renaissance Singers. The intent of these "sponsored events" is to bring the Erie community to Luther Memorial to hear local music talent and to raise the visibility of Luther Memorial as an active host of the arts. This also enabled the LMCS to advertise our own programming to audiences that have a known interest in music.

The annual **Bach Festival** continues to draw a large audience. This year, members of the Erie Lutheran Parish churches were invited to join the Luther Memorial choir to sing a full Bach cantata and several chorales appropriate for Holy Week. Approximately 30 individuals prepared the choral music which was sung entirely in German. This performance added nearly 20 singers to the Luther Memorial choir for music, worship and fellowship. Bach organ "chorale preludes" associated with the sung chorales were performed by Walt Gaber and other invited organists including: Vicki Baldwin (Mount Calvary), Bill Lasher (Luther Memorial), Sue Mohnkern (Faith Lutheran), Kathrine Swanson (St. John's) and Bryan Timm (Immanuel).

Due in part to the popularity of the Bach Festival choral presentations, we have begun a series of **Bach Cantata Vespers** programs. These feature a cantata by J. S. Bach performed on the liturgical date for which they were originally composed. The first of these was presented on Reformation Sunday and included many of the singers from the previous Bach Festival choirs and a small orchestra. John Chacona of the Erie Times-News included an interview in the October 23, 2014 ShowCase prior to this Reformation presentation (*see below*).

Two more Bach Cantata Vespers are being prepared for the 2014-2015 season:

- February 15 Last Sunday before Lent
- May 14 Ascension

Some of our events have been enhanced by post-concert receptions hosted by the LM Congregational Life committee. These have encouraged fellowship beyond the performances and are greatly appreciated by the LMCS.

Our website, www.lm-concerts.com, has continued to be a primary marketing tool. The website is regularly updated and many of our past performances are also available on YouTube. The LM Concert Series thanks all those who continue to support the series with their attendance and financial gifts. This continued support has enabled us to present a full and varied season. Luther Memorial features Bach Cantata Vespers concert on Sunday

On Oct. 31, 1517, an Augustinian friar approached All Saints' Church in Wittenberg, Germany, and nailed to the door his 95 Theses. The friar was Martin Luther, and the act of defiance marked the beginning of the Protestant Reformation.

This Sunday, his heirs at Luther Memorial Church will mark the anniversary of that occasion with a concert of music for Reformation Sunday by J.S. Bach and Luther himself.

The occasion is a significant celebration on the Lutheran ecclesiastical calendar and the featured music, Bach's cantata "Gott der Herr ist Sonn und Schild" ("God the Lord is Sun and Shield") is as stirring and celebratory as any music in Bach's stupefyingly massive catalog.

But the appearance of the chamber orchestra, Luther Memorial Church Choir and soloists Molly Dugan, soprano; Mary Laver, alto; and James Bobick, bass; signal a reformation of sorts in the music programming at Luther Memorial.

"We're concentrating on local musicians, building the choir and providing meaningful vocal music from a worship standpoint," said cantor Walt Gaber, who will conduct the concert.

Gaber explained that the Luther Memorial Concert Series had previously brought in touring artists, putting the church's programming somewhat into competition with other music series in Erie.

"The focus on Bach is something that we could do, and in the context of how the music might have been presented in Bach's day," he said.

The orchestra will be small, though the music will be appropriately large in ambition and scope with selections from Bach's Orchestral Suite No.1 in C Major and his chorale prelude for organ on Luther's hymn "A Mighty Fortress Is Our God."

Gaber plans two more concerts -- one the Sunday before Lent in February, and the other for Ascension Day in May. In the Lutheran tradition, both concerts will feature music for the liturgical occasion.

"Not all people will get that level of meaning," Gaber said. But he may be underestimating the universality and power of a composer whose faith and music were a mighty fortress indeed.

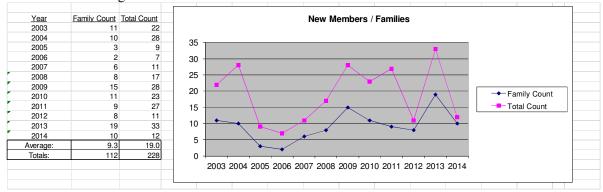

STEWARDSHIP COMMITTEE ANNUAL REPORT FOR 2014

The Luther Memorial Stewardship Committee has four members who have met periodically through the year to plan and carry out stewardship ministry activity and education. The current members are Stan Rose, John Tell, Mark Kay and Pastor Coleman. We would like to have at least one or two more members and encourage anyone with interest to step forward.

One of the desires of the Stewardship Committee is to regularly lift up members of the congregation who offer themselves in service to the mission of the church. This project is entitled "Recognition Sunday." On the last Sunday of every month, the names of those who serve in various ways are thanked and recognized in the prayers at worship. The committee feels strongly that this type of recognition is important, and we will continue to make the congregation aware of those who serve and to thank God for them and their ministry.

As was planned last year and carried out in February of 2014, a representative of Thrivent Financial provided a financial planning seminar for an invited group of Luther Memorial members. The seminar focused on some estate planning ideas as well as some tax saving techniques that might benefit members. The seminar was offered twice on February 4, with approximately 12 in attendance. The committee is considering a follow-up seminar that will focus more specifically on planned giving ideas and techniques.

The offering through members' time and talents continues to be an important part of the work of the Stewardship Committee. The time and talent commitment form known as "Disciples in Action" is regularly reviewed and is made available to the congregation at least twice a year. This year, June 8 and Sept. 7 were the dates that the "Disciples in Action" forms were made available at worship. The information received through the forms is collated and entered into the "Shepherd's Staff" software and then made available to committee chairpersons who are in need of names of people willing to serve.

The "Witness Sunday" project continues to be an important event sponsored by the Stewardship Committee. On May 4, Pat Bellingham was invited to speak to the congregation at both worship services and John Tell did the same thing on October 5. Both responded to the invitation with presentations that focused on their own faith journeys and both were well received by the congregation. The project will continue in 2015.

The committee offered some stewardship education for the Sunday school children in the fall of 2014. Utilizing some stewardship materials offered by the ELCA entitled "Kids, Money and Stuff," Stan Rose and Jack Tell met with the children on three consecutive Sundays in September to discuss some basic stewardship ideas. Plans were also discussed to make offering envelopes available for the children as a way of teaching regular thank offering behavior.

Although they were not particularly projects of the Stewardship Committee, we did strongly encourage the congregation to participate in the Crop Walk in September and in the "God's Work – Our Hands" project at McKinley Elementary School.

Benevolent Allocation Group (BAG) Annual Report for 2014

1.) Why Are We Doing This?

A.) Our Giving is an Act of Worship

- Our giving back to God through our gifts to others is an act of worship, an instance in which we are invited to give up something that we value as a sacrifice to God.
- Matthew 6: 21 says: "Where your treasure is, there you heart will be also."
- We are invited to give our offerings to God because we want and need to give it. We have a spiritual need to worship God, and through our offerings we are able to express our love and devotion for God in a way that is simple and sincere. The motivation of the giver is what counts the most.

B.) Our Giving is an Expression of Faith

- The position of Scripture is that we *are* stewards, and it is not something we choose to be. God has chosen us to have dominion over all that God has made, to care for God's creation, while at the same time we are "a little lower" than God and the angels. Beyond that God has entrusted Christians with the precious gift of the Gospel.
- The biblical teaching about stewardship is good news, for the recognition that we are *only* stewards and not owners is actually quite liberating.
- The basic principle of biblical stewardship is that everything we are and everything we have belongs to God.
- We also recognize we receive far more through our giving then the recipients receive. It is far better to give than receive.

C.) Our Giving is a Spiritual Discipline

• "Generosity with gifts is the way to spiritual maturity. Sacred and secular history and literature are replete with examples of the crippling effects of gifts hoarded and unshared. People are not naturally disposed to giving, yet, the life we all prize, filled with joy and spiritual depth is closely tied to giving generously and with thankful hearts." By Donald W. Hinze

2.) What are the responsibilities of the group?

BAG prays, researches and discusses ways to return our blessings to others. When the group makes a "decision" in where and how much to give, BAG makes a recommendation to council. Council then needs to approve the gift(s). BAG is also responsible for communicating the blessings we receive through giving to others and in particular the disciples of Luther Memorial. BAG will create ways to more deeply connect Luther Memorial with those we serve.

3.) Who serves in BAG and how is it structured?

Stan Rose, Jim Fried, Diane Banks and Pastor Coleman serve on BAG. BAG determines how the recommendation to council will be made. For instance, when a gift comes in, will BAG wait to make a large gift at the end of the ministry year (anticipating other gifts coming to Luther Memorial), or will it give away smaller gifts throughout the year as gifts come in.

Benevolent Allocation Group Report, cont'd.:

4.) What monies were tithed during 2014?

The money tithed came from money given to Luther Memorial Church which was unrestricted. This would **not** be money which would be assigned to annual budget income, but money given *which has not been budgeted*. Generally, the money assigned to BAG be would come from estate gifts. It is money which would be assigned to the budget line "Special Gifts".

5.) How the Tithe Was Shared during 2014

The local allocation of \$5,035.50 went to two local ministries:

\$2,517.75 - *Community Shelter Services* to support the homeless shelters set up in area churches during the winter (and specifically designated for the shelters at St. John's and Holy Trinity Lutheran Churches) **\$2,517.75** - *Habitat for Humanity* to support the ministry of building new homes in the Erie area.

The global allocation of \$5,035.50 will go to two ministries:

\$2,517.75 - Lutheran Disaster Response and earmarked for Ebola Outbreak Response.

\$2,517.75 - *ELCA Global Ministries* to support missionary work in Tanzania which is in partnership with the Northwestern Pennsylvania Synod.

LUTHER MEMORIAL CAPITAL CAMPAIGN FACTS ANNUAL REPORT – 2014

During 2014, we paid off our mortgage from MIF. We received enough money from our members to pay \$16,746 before we ran into a cash flow problem. We still had a balance due of \$48,326. We used \$21,223 from the LM Foundation and borrowed \$23,317 from the Endowment Fund to add to the checking balance we already had to pay the mortgage off. Paying the mortgage off early saved us approximately \$1,094 in interest.

We are still collecting on the pledges and have received enough to repay the Endowment Fund \$9,000 in December.

There is still \$7,445 in outstanding pledges. 22 members make up this amount. There are 2 members who have made no payments on their pledge.

REPORT OF THE TREASURER ANNUAL REPORT FOR 2014

WE DID IT. WE HAD ANOTHER SURPLUS LAST YEAR. We now have THREE surplus years in a row. 2014 ended up as a very good year for Luther Memorial. At last year's annual meeting we adopted a budget with a \$9,082 surplus. We ended the year with a surplus of \$10,148. That's \$1,066 better than expected. Here's what happened.

2014 RESULTS

INCOME

Our total income came in over budget by \$16,623. This included our giving being over by \$2,812 and our other income being over \$13,811. Our investment income came in over budget by \$9,164.

EXPENSES

Our total expenses came in over budget by \$15,557.

UTILITIES & TELEPHONE

We were **over budget** in total utilities and telephone by \$7,915.

REPAIRS, MAINTENANCE & SERVICES FOR LM BUILDING

These line items were over budget by \$7,564 had a lot to do with the boiler. Special thanks go to Rick Kern, Dave Buerk, Charlie Lintelman and Miriam Scheid for taking care of our facility for us.

SALARIES AND STAFF SUPPORT

Total salaries and staff support came in under budget by \$3,674. Staff support was under budget by \$4,734.

THE 2015 BUDGET PROJECTS A DEFICIT OF \$19,939

We are expecting a small deficit in 2015.

Our estimate of our 2015 total income is \$22,816 less than 2014 actual. Our total giving is expected to be \$18,005 less than 2014 actual. Our estimate of our total expenses is \$7,271 more than 2014 actual. Adding these two amounts means we are expecting a \$30,087 **decrease** from last year. \$10,148 surplus minus 30,087 equals expected deficit of \$19,939.

The 2015 budget has a 2% increase for Pastor and staff and keeps their benefits at the same level as before. We have budgeted all other expenses as close to 2014 actual expenses as possible with adjustments made as necessary.

Our priorities are still new members and to increase the surplus. The evangelism and stewardship committees did a great job last year in getting additional commitments. We have very good control of our expenses; it is the top two lines of the budget that drives this organization.
