As you take advantage of the beauty of Spring this year (I think we can call agree well deserved after the record-breaking winter we had), perhaps as you choose your flowers and vegetables for planting and hopefully get those fingers into some soil, as we celebrate all the joys of this celestial season, let us remember the joys of this liturgical season. In Christ is our life. And in the beauty of Spring all around us we are reminded that the gift of life is for us and forever.

I pray this Spring is warmed by the Resurrection Dawn for you!

Christ is risen, indeed! Alleluia!

The Church of Jesus will stand the tests of time...whether it looks like it does today or not is only known to Jesus. As part of this planning and dreaming, folks have gotten together as a taskforce to consider models of collaborative ministry in

our area. But this is not work just for a few people sometimes, but work that we are all called to do in God's future. In our planning and dreaming, we are looking toward what ministry looks like years down the road. The Church and Criminal Justice: Hearing the cries A Social Statement on Criminal Justice Brief Overview

The Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) affirms the fundamental principles of the U.S. criminal justice system such as due process of law and the presumption of legal innocence. Yet, this church hears people's cries that reflect the current system's serious deficiencies. Drawing from the biblical witness to God's wondrously rich forms of love and justice, we are compelled by a "holy yearning" to address the need for a change in public mindset and for dramatic reforms in policies and practices. This statement calls upon Christians to strengthen or take up ministries of compassion and justice. Drawing on evidence and data, it affirms some current efforts at improving the system while identifying numerous other reforms that urgently need implementation.

The statement makes the following basic points:

- The ELCA is prompted to speak and to act because so many cries of suffering and despair emerge from the criminal justice system from victims, the incarcerated, their families, communities, those wrongly convicted, they who work in the system and have not been heard.
- Drawing from Holy Scripture, this church holds up a vision of God's justice that is wondrously richer and deeper than human imitations and yet is a mirror in which justice in this world, God's world, must always be assessed.
- In assessing the current system, the ELCA gives thanks for its principles and orientation toward justice. This church recognizes many in the system who serve their professional vocations with competent and humane performance. Yet, this statement recognizes serious deficiencies. An underlying punitive mindset, budgetary constraints and persistent inequalities based on race and class frequently challenge its basic principles and impose significant costs on all involved in the system, and on society as a whole.
- Christians are called to confess that we, as individuals and in our common life together, often have fallen short in responding to criminal justice both in response to crime's harm and to problems in the justice system.
- Guided by historic "marks" of the church, the ELCA is called to renewed ministry on behalf of those whom the system affects: victims of crime and their families, the incarcerated and their families, affected communities, those who work in the system, and many others.
- Through ministry with and bearing the burdens of those in the criminal justice system members of this church can respond wisely through four practices: hearing the cries, hospitality, accompaniment, and advocacy.
- The ELCA supports positive trends for reform such as greater emphasis on victims' rights and needs, use of restorative justice, community-based alternatives to incarceration, legislation that reduces sentences for certain offenses, the emergence of specialized courts, and the growing emphasis on reentry. These efforts should be funded and supported adequately.
- Because mass incarceration causes significant harms, both personal and social, the ELCA strongly urges those who make and administer correctional policies to take all appropriate measures to limit the use of incarceration as a sanction for criminal offenses. Toward that end this statement identifies three specific paths: pursue alternatives to incarceration, reform sentencing laws and policies, and closely scrutinize national drug policy.
- Four other imperatives also require vigorous action from policy makers: the criminal justice system must acknowledge the disparities, and address the implicit and explicit racism that persists within; it must recognize the special needs of juvenile offenders; it must stop the privatization of prison facilities; and finally, it must foster the full reintegration of exoffenders into community.

- A fundamental transformation of mindset about criminal justice is required that challenges the logic equating more punitive measures with more just ones. Individuals must be held accountable, but every person in the criminal justice system deserves to be seen and treated as a member of human communities, created in the image of God and worthy of appropriate and compassionate response.
- To God we owe thanks for human reason and its abilities to discern with compassion and wisdom how human communities might reflect at least the justice of the law. "For what does the LORD require of you but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God?" (Micah 6:8).
- Ten Implementing Resolutions direct specific actions consistent with the principles and recommendations set forth in the statement. A glossary provides assistance with legal terms.

- 1. Minutes On motion, the minutes of the March 11, 2025 Council Meeting were unanimously approved.
- 2. Pastor Jay's Report Sign-up sheets for Second Sunday Soirée and Council Greeters passed around.
 - a. Pastor reported on Erie Conference retreat. Next step: congregational survey is going out to represented congregations regarding "How do we support existing ministries with limited full-time pastors over the next 5-10 years?"
 - b. Harvest 912 will be doing ministry in the parking lot areas Saturday, April 19 from 8:00 11:00am.
 - c. Holy Week activities and services highlighted.
- 3. *Property Committee* Finalized bids have not been received from South One or ProSource for the classroom carpeting. Installation timing is during summer break. A carpet sample was shown.
- 4. Hospitality Committee Council continues to look for a chair.
- 5. Holy Trinity Dinner Thursday, April 24, 2025; volunteers are needed.
- 6. Security Guard Richard Rowland's current wage was based on the previous security guard wage rate. During Richard's interview he voiced a desire for \$15/hr. wage. There is a proposal to provide a wage increase brought to Church Council. The current workload is approximately 20 hr./week at the current wage rate of \$14.50/hr. The proposed wage rate is \$15/hr. Motion to increase the wage rate of \$15/hr. was unanimously approved.
- 7. *Second Sunday Soirée* Hosted by Council on Sunday, April 13. The purpose is to promote fellowship between the 8:15 and 10:30am services.
- 8. Safety Committee Exit signs are ready to be installed.
- 9. Hosting of Documentary Film Proposal made by Cantor, Bryan Timm, to host Linda Karn's documentary film, "Matthew Shepard is My Friend" under the banner of Luther Memorial Concert Series. Consideration of heightened security. Estimated attendance may fill the sanctuary. Tentative timing of the event would be late June / early July. Motion to approve hosting the event with one opposed. The decision was made for Bryan Timm to collect further planning details for review at the next council meeting. Approval was not given to host the event.
- 10. Renew Erie Building / Bethany Outreach Center Bethany Outreach Center Liability Insurance lapsed due to failure of the Bethany Outreach Center Executive Director to provide details to the insurer. Required details were provided to the insurer; Bethany Outreach Center Executive Director confirmed the details. Liability insurance will be restored, expected by Friday, April 11.
 - a. Lack of Bethany Outreach Center leadership leads to continuing concerns such as traffic issues, boxes blocking tenant access, and operational un-clarity.
 - b. Church Council Executive Board to meet with Bethany Outreach Executive Board to present concerns and propose steps to resolve same.
- 11. *Fellowship Hall Rental Issues –* Significant issues have risen with recent renters regarding excessive attendance and clean-up required. The Property Committee will re-visit the Rental Agreement.
- **12.** "A Hand-up Erie" MOMS Group has a request for \$1,500 for purchase of new beds and repurposing existing beds. On motion it was unanimous to "Pre-Approve" this request.
- 13. Treasurer's Report On motion, Treasurer Greg Kern's report was unanimously approved.
- 14. *LMA* Administrator, Michelle Thom, encouraged council members to attend the PTL Trivia Night on Saturday, May 3. Nine (9) new students have enrolled for next year.
- 15. Council Meeting The next meeting is Tuesday, May 13, 2025 at 6:00pm.
