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Dear Luther Memorial,

I've talked about it often, but one of my favorite Continuing Education events every year is the Institute of Liturgical Studies at Valparaiso University which takes place the second week of Eastertide every year. I was lucky to share this amazing opportunity with Cantor Bryan this year. This coming Eastertide, we will be exploring the possibilities of the Season of Creation.

There are a number of Seasons in the Church Year: Advent, Christmas, I Ordinary Time, Lent, Easter, Ordinary Time. They cycle through and their colors keep us mindful of the advancement of time as well as the focus on each season. These seasons are held fairly ecumenically throughout the Western Church. There is a growing movement across those came denominations to keep a Season of Creation in the midst of all those others. It is a movement to which the Lutheran World Federation—of which we are a part—is subscribed.

The Season of Creation, I think, is a great idea. You see, there are largely two main foci throughout the church year. During the *colorful* seasons (Advent, Christmas, I Ordinary Time, Lent, Easter) we focus on the life of Jesus. I like to call this the Christ Cycle in the Church Year. The other focus is on *our* part of the story of God at work in the world. This long green season in which we find ourselves that stretches from the Sunday after Pentecost until the Reign of Christ around Thanksgiving is nearly half the year! And during it we focus on what it means to be Church.

The Season of Creation would be inserted from September 1 through October 4 (St. Francis Day) and be focused on creation's part in God's work in the world. We are definitely seeing the effects of humanity on creation and the destruction we have wrought. We have often forgotten having dominion is not to dominate creation. This is also the season in which we see harvests around the world in the northern hemisphere and consideration of stewardship in many corners of the Church. Focusing in this time of the great gift that is creation and our role in fostering and stewarding that great gift seems more than appropriate.

The change has not come yet. Nothing new or different as far as that goes. But I invite you in these weeks of October—after St. Francis Day on the 4th and still heavily in the harvest and stewardship season—to consider how creation fits into your understanding of God's work in the world. We're fairly comfortable with Christ's place (the Christ Cycle) and we're learning fairly confidently in our place (the Church Cycle)...but what about creation which grows and groans all around us?

Three T's, Two P's, and Year-Long Commitment

By now, many of us who grew up in the Church—Lutheran or otherwise—have probably heard of the "Three T's" of Stewardship. For those who are unfamiliar, they are: Time, Talent, and Treasure. It's a handy way to think about all the ways that we can consider giving of ourselves to the work of God in this place. But let's start at the beginning:

What is stewardship? Stewardship, arguably, is the very first thing God asks of humanity. After creating the creatures of earth, God charges us to have dominion over the earth. "Dominion" is

how we have come to translate this word, but really the word is more like "tend," or "steward." The word "dominion" has some problems, not the least of which is its root-connection to "domination" in Eng lish. But "dominion" is related to the Latin "domus" for "lord" or "master." And while the option is already there to "master" creation by exploitation and overuse, if that is how we view our role there will very soon not be a creation to have dominion over. This call to dominion is stewardship: to care for what we have been gifted—even to all of Creation itself—so that it can flourish into what God intends. Often, especially in the Church, we have come to use "stewardship" as a short-hand for "financial giving." And there is most definitely a piece of stewardship that is about being responsible with and recognizing our financial assets as gifts from God first and foremost. But, as we will see, there is so much more.

What about these Three T's? This model of stewardship consideration is all about remodeling the ancient practice of offering. In Judeo-Christianity before the fall of the Second Temple (around 70 CE), right worship = offering. AND offering (almost always) = animal sacrifice. If it wasn't animal sacrifice it was grain offering or drink offering or incense offering—all those offerings and sacrifices we hear so often in our Hebrew Scripture readings. After the fall of the Second Temple, Judeo-Christianity had to figure out how to worship. Judaism continued in the Synagogue model with teaching and fellowship around Torah. Christianity continued into the Church model with worship taking on a whole new meaning with a meal and preaching and prayer. But how to explain away all those expectations of sacrifice and offering? When you boil it down: animal, grain, drink, or incense offering/sacrifice is a financial gift. If you are a cowherd, your tithe to the Temple and God would be the very first tenth of your herd every year. Drive your cows to the Temple and watch them be taken to the altar for burning. That's a significant portion of your herd—which is your source of income—that you give to God! So, in a world without such sacrifice and opportunities for worship, in an increasingly urbanized and industrialized world, money itself becomes that which we offer/sacrifice to God. But there is so much more to a life of stewardship than just money. So to get to the idea of a whole life of sacrificial giving to God's mission, the idea that we sacrifice of our Time, our Talent, and our Treasure arose.

The fourth T. Arguably, there is a fourth "T" that often comes up in the Stewardship conversation: Tithe. In Hebrew Scripture we are told that there is an expectation to share in both Tithes and Offerings. We shouldn't get them confused. The Tithe is what we outlined above: the first tenth of EVERYTHING is given to God every year. Not trying to scrape together whatever is leftover at the end of the year but joyfully and willingly giving the first tenth to God's mission in the world. That's a tithe. Offerings are those things given in celebration or supplication throughout the year *in addition to* one's tithe.

All this seems legalistic. Yes, it can be if that is how we choose to see it. However, what's there the Two P's come in. Over the years as life changes, as the society in which we live changes, as the needs and expectations on families and individuals outside of church change, the Three T's and especially the fourth T have become increasingly difficult. Is that the first tenth *before* taxes or *after*? Does my other charitable giving count? What about the needs to pay my or my child's educational expenses? To that, I have come up with the Two P's of stewardship. They are: Priority and Proportion. Together, these get to the idea of tithes and a lifetime of giving:

Priority: The idea of the tithe as the first tenth of everything every year is to emphasize God's priority in our lives. The life of stewardship is lived out of trust in God's abundance and cheerful gratitude not out of obligation and the leftovers. As each of us approaches the year ahead, consider how giving of yourself to God's mission will be a priority in your life. How it will take first place over all else. I find it often helpful to remember Luther's admonition on the First Commandment that *anything* we place before God to receive our fear, love, or trust is our God—even if it is not God.

Proportion: The Tithe also was a set proportion of what one had. One-tenth. In the world today, one tenth of possessions seems like a lot for some and a pittance to others. Becoming hyper focused on the one tenth can be an unachievable wish for some and a limitation on generosity for others. Asking ourselves as we consider our stewardship in the year ahead what *proportion* of our budgets God will get is a good place to start. We should proportion our time, our talent, and our treasure (they haven't necessarily gone away) so that we *feel* our giving. That helps keep God a priority. However, we should not get the proportion so high that we neglect the reasonable needs of life, either.

This is still sounding a lot like money talk. Yes. In many ways, especially at this time of year as we consider the coming year's budget, it is. We will each be asked to fill out a pledge card for our financial commitment to the ministry of God in this place for the year ahead. Being honest with those commitments—and making a commitment is more important than the number—is the only way for us to make an honest and faithful budget for the coming year. However, the life of stewardship is not *just* about money. The Three T's still exist. But I've come to think in different terms and invite you for this year to consider them, too. Perhaps in the future we'll have multiple different pledge Sundays to explore this life of stewardship:

Participation: as the program year gets under way, consider how you and your family can prioritize and proportion your participation in the programs going on throughout the year. Can you help as worship leaders? Can you attend one of our many Faith Formation groups? Can you supply a Coffee Hour or Second Sunday Soirée? The opportunities for generosity with your participation in our life together are numerous.

Prayer: do you take time each day to pray for the ministry of God in this place? Do you pray for the congregation, for folks on our prayer list, for your staff? If not each day, do you have time set aside regularly for such prayer? It is a vital part of our ability to continue to live into God's intention for us here at Luther Memorial. Budget some time each week to sit around dinner or just before bed or as you get up in the morning...heck, on your morning commute...to lift up Luther Memorial and God's mission here in prayer.

Presence: this may seem the same as Participation, but there is a difference. Can you set aside a proportion of your time to just attend the goings on at Luther? Maybe just be present in conversation while you're together with Luther people or on the other end of the phone. When considering the year ahead, can you offer your presence to the life of faith here at Luther?

This is a lengthy article, I know that. You've given some time to reading it. That's good. I invite you to consider as we move into this season when harvest and gratitude and gatherings become central to our schedules to consider your life of stewardship. You are a baptized Child of God. That is the greatest gift you can ever be given. Everything you have comes from God. That is another pretty good gift. How are you being inspired in this season to give back, to offer, to sacrifice to God just some of the gifts you have received?

Our Neighbors' Place



Our Neighbors' Place is a seasonal overflow shelter that ensures everyone has a warm, safe place to sleep during Erie's winter season.

A community effort, ONP used to operate on a rotating basis among several downtown Erie churches during the winter season. This season ONP will take place at the Community Resilience Center, a single site location provided by Erie County. Guests are provided food, the opportunity to shower, a place to sleep, chaplain services, hygiene necessities, foot care, and are introduced to available homeless services.

Where and When:

- Community Resilience Center (450 E 16th St. Erie, PA 16503)
- This program is seasonal and will open in November 2025 April 2026.
- Every night from 7:00pm until 6:45am the next morning.

Who We Serve:

Any homeless man or woman without shelter.

How We Serve:

- Providing a warm overnight space to sleep.
- Supplying one meal to each guest.
- Connection to chaplain services.
- Giving guests an opportunity to shower.
- Bringing in community partners to provide foot care.
- Connection to other homeless resources in Erie County.

How You Can Help:

• Luther Memorial Church will be volunteering at ONP the week of Wednesday, February 11 - Tuesday, February 17. Your help is needed for 1 night, 2 nights, or as many as you are able. Volunteers hand out towels for showers, offer coffee, hand out meals, provide t-shirts and socks for those that are in need of these items. Meals are pre-made and ready to serve.

It may seem as though February is long time away, but it comes quickly. Six volunteers are needed for each evening so we ask that you really give some thought to helping. Unfortunately, the start of those programs has been delayed due to scheduling conflicts and the efforts to mount the 45th year celebration of the Luther Memorial Concert Series.

Entering into this anniversary year for the concert series, a few things have changed in the scope and mission of this ministry. Although I am the first to acknowledge the profound impact that live performance provides, I also feel that we are missing o prortunities to further engage our community through lectures and educational content. As we move forward with the concert series, I will also be scheduling educational content as well as concerts that focus on local talent, small ensembles, and creative groups to provide further meaningful interaction with our own community.

Many of you have noticed that our ensembles that provide additional ministry weekly are diminishing in size. I cannot stress the importance of the leadership that the adult choir and bell choir provide us week to week. This is a commitment that many of us ask that you consider as we are more effective with more participants. As the adult choir diminishes in number, it becomes more restrictive to the variety and technically rewarding resources at our disposal.

For the 25-26 choir season, I have been planning a schedule mainly focused on festival services where we could engage a larger choir, much like we did at Transfiguration this past year. Please consider if you have restrictions on a weekly commitment throughout the year, that this may be an option for you. If you are interested, please contact me for more information and schedule. Commemoration of the Faithful Departed

Every year on the first Sunday in November we gather together to celebrate the Feast of All Saints. The feast itself is November 1. We give thanks for all those who have gone before us and have shaped our lives of faith. Particularly, in many contexts, we give thanks for those "big names" among the faithful whose names and deeds have come down to us through the generations. We often think about those whose names we put "Saint" in front of. In the Lutheran context, we often include in our celebrations on this day those who have died in the past year remembering and celebrating that through baptism we all are numbered among the saints.

That being said, there is an even longer tradition held in many parts of the Church and throughout the world of celebrating <u>all</u> those we have known who have died—this year and throughout time. This celebration is known commonly as All Souls' Day and is held on November 2, one day after All Saints' Day. It is, formally, the Commemoration of the Faithful Departed.

This year, in collaboration with the Luther Memorial Concert and Cultural Series and the Mercyhurst Concert Choir, we will celebrate All Souls Day with a Requiem Mass in the evening on Sunday, November 2. We will gather not just to hear a beautiful setting of the Requiem Mass composed by Faure, but also to share in a full Mass—with communion and all. We are considering this "A Requiem in Context."

Besides making sure this is on your calendar, we also want to make sure that we remember <u>your</u> faithful departed at our celebration. Between now and Thursday, October 30, you may submit names of anyone you would like remembered (from this year or before) to Pastor Jay for inclusion.

Bread for the World Offering of Letters



"Open your mouth for those who cannot speak, and for the rights of those who are left without help."

Bread for the World is a Christian advocacy organization urging U.S. decision makers to do all they can to pursue a world without hunger. Our mission is to educate and equip people to advocate for policies and programs that can help end hunger in the U.S. and around the world.

At Luther Memorial on October 12, 2025, we will be participating in Bread for the World's Offering of Letters. After each worship service that day, you will have the opportunity to write your own letter to Rep. Mike Kelly, urging him to cosponsor the Modern WIC Act, which will make it easier for women, infants, and children to receive much-needed nutritional support. Sample letters will be available, along with fact sheets, paper, pens, and maybe even some real bread to eat! Letters will be hand-delivered to Rep. Kelly's Erie office. You may also choose to email your letter.

The Women, Infants, and Children Act (WIC) was first piloted in 1972. Its mission is to assure healthy pregnancies, growth and development for mothers, babies, and young children to age 5 who are at nutritional risk. The program provides nutritious supplemental foods, breastfeeding promotion and support, education on healthy eating, and referrals to healthcare and critical social services.

The Modern WIC Act would make the program more accessible to eligible recipients by reducing barriers, such as transportation, time off work, and arranging child care. It would update the requirement of recipients being physically present in order to be certified to make virtual options available.

The Modern WIC Act already has broad bipartisan support in Congress. We will asking Rep. Kelly to show his support by becoming a co-sponsor of the bill.

We CAN make a difference. Earlier this year, when WIC was on the brink of being gutted, it was the voices of Bread for the World members that helped convince our lawmakers to allocate an increase of \$500 million to this life-saving program, rather than make more drastic cuts. Because of compassionate, faithful people like you, WIC will be there to help mothers raise healthy and nourished babies.



September 2025 Council Meeting

- 1. *Council Meeting*: Minutes of the August 12, 2025 council meeting were unanimously approved.
- 2. Pastor Jay's Report:
 - a. Erie Conference continues conversation about collaborative ministry
 - b. Pastoral exchange will take place on Sunday, September 14, 2025
 - c. October 4 at 2:00pm Hosting a Viewing Party for Bishop Curry's Installation in Minneapolis
 - d. Faith Formation start-up is underway
 - e. Saturday, September 13 is the LMA Block Party
 - f. Bishop Kristen Papson's Installation will be held in Oil City at Good Hope Lutheran Church in Oil City on October 19 at 3:30pm. Bus transportation is available with reservation.
 - g. Confirmation conversations have started for the present through 2030.
- 3. *Overflow Shelter:* Luther Memorial will take part in helping with the overflow shelter for one week in February. Two coordinators are needed; we currently have one. An email will be sent to church council asking for volunteers. Volunteers are also needed from the congregation.
- 4. *Property Committee:* The outdoor sign in the greenspace is almost finished. Spotlights will be installed and Chaffee Landscaping will plant red sedum ground cover between the front of the sign and curb.
- 5. Safety Committee: Exit signs have been installed throughout the building.
- 6. *Computer Replacement:* On motion it was unanimous to allot \$900 per computer (\$1,800 total) for the purchase of updated computers for the finance and church offices.
- 7. *Rabe:* Rabe replaced a cracked heat exchange unit at a cost of \$3,500.
- 8. *Church Directory:* A decision was made to update our church directory. Three to four Sundays will be selected to take pictures.
- 9. *Council Members:* Discussion regarding new council members to replace those whose terms are ending. Barb Dennison has agreed to serve a 3-year term. Volunteers will be needed to replace Gina Snider and Mike Hedlund whose terms are ending. Pastor Jay and Greg will seek a youth member to fill the seat of Ely Cooney.
- 10. "Cleaning Day": Lunch will be provided for "Cleaning Day" on Saturday, September 27.
- 11. *Parking Spaces:* Knox Law Firm is currently using 10 parking spaces. They have requested the use of 5 more, but it was decided that those spaces are needed for church, school and Bethany Outreach parking; especially on food distribution day.
- 12. *Playground:* Michelle has secured a security grant that will partially cover expenses. The base, 2,000 square feet, needs redone. Rubber chips need replaced as well as a retaining wall made of wooden ties. Select Specialty Hospital will be contacted regarding the painting of their generator and other large equipment. Our main electrical box, which has been painted in the past, will be repainted. The grant money needs to be used soon so decisions need to be made quickly.
- 13. *Bryan Timm, Cantor:* Bryan highlighted items from his report:
 - a. Matt Shepard event on September 20 and Western NY Chamber Orchestra event.
 - b. The website has been updated for the LM Concert Series.
 - c. Mercyhurst Concert Choir will join our All Saints' Service of Faure's Requiem.
 - d. Handbell and choir rehearsal will begin near the end of September.
 - e. Acquiring estimates/quotes to repair instrument equipment (speakers).
 - f. An Organ Committee and funding plan are needed as our organ has about 5 more good years left. Typically, these organs last only 30 years.

- 14. Treasurer's Report: On motion the Treasurer's Report was unanimously approved.
 - a. LM is currently -\$85,000 loss to date, but less than the past two YTD losses.
 - b. Income is going up, expenses are increasing but not as much.
 - c. Carpeting in the classrooms, offices, etc. were replaced at a cost of \$44,750 which came from the Memorial Fund. Carpet "tiles" were installed to make replacement easier and less expensive.
 - d. Most receivables are "in good shape", a couple are "lagging".
 - e. Unit 204 B at the Renew Erie building has given notice and will move out at the end of the month. Places that have expressed interest in the past have been notified that space is available.
- 15. Council Meeting: Council will meet on Tuesday, October 14, 2025 at 6:00pm.
