Assembly Elects New Bishop of NWPA Synod



The Rev. Michael L. Lozano, Sharon, Pa., was elected June 15 to serve a six-year term as bishop of the Northwestern Pennsylvania Synod of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA). The election took place during the synod assembly, held June 13-15 at Thiel College in Greenville, Pa.

Lozano was elected on the fifth ballot, with 71 votes. The Rev. William Coleman, pastor of Luther Memorial Lutheran Church in Erie, Pa., received 61.

The bishop-elect has served as pastor of Christ Lutheran Church in Sharon, Pa., since 2014. He was pastor of Gethsemane Lutheran Church in Gainesville, Fla., from 2005 to 2007; Evangelical Lutheran Church in Mount Holly Springs, Pa., from 1996 to 2005; and St. Paul Evangelical Lutheran Church in Catawissa, Pa., from 1993 to 1996. An active U.S. Army Reserve chaplain, he served this call full time from 2008 to 2014.


Lozano received a Bachelor of Science from Mansfield (Pa.) University in 1988 and a Master of Divinity from the Lutheran Theological Seminary at Philadelphia (now United) in 1992. United is one of seven ELCA seminaries. He received a Master of Strategic Studies from the U.S. Army War College in Carlisle, Pa., in 2015.

Wrestling with Jakob

When God Says, “No”

I feel that I owe you, my brothers and sisters, an explanation for why I removed my name from consideration for the office of bishop of this synod. So, here goes...

For 40 years I have wrestled with the call, both external (from the church) and internal (from God), to be bishop. I confess that I both coveted and desired the office. I even believed at times that I was fated to be the next bishop of this synod. Then six years ago, as Bishop Jones announced his third term, the internal call disappeared (the coveting did not). At last year’s Synod Assembly the external call from those in attendance was deafening. I convinced myself that I didn’t need an internal call to become the next bishop. In July God slammed the door. There was no event, no voice from the heavens, no earthquake, fire or wind but rather a crushing silence out of which came a still, small but forceful, “No, you are not to be bishop.” It was a clarion call as clear as the one that called me into the ministry of Word and Sacrament.

This led to one of the longest years of my life as I wrestled with bishops, church executives, colleagues, friends and cherished members of this synod who tried to convince me that I needed to have my hearing checked. The wrestling was painful and excruciatingly tempting at times. Yet, after each attempt to reconsider the “No” got louder and more convincing. After the first ballot I removed my name. I have not had second thoughts or regrets but there is a sense of finality to my bishop fantasy. Sometimes the Holy Spirit’s call is to say, “No.”

The hardest part of this journey has been not knowing what God has in store for me in the remaining years of my ministry. If not bishop, what?

While the call is still not clear (I had my hearing checked and even got hearing aids) it is

clear that it will involve helping others share the good news of Jesus Christ. As pastor, prophet, priest, mystic, author and spiritual director who knows what direction this may take.

I want to thank all of you for your prayers and support (I will continue to need them in the days ahead). I also want to thank all of you who walked with me through this difficult journey (even those who challenged me greatly). Without this great cloud of witnesses I, and we, would not be able to faithfully live into our respective callings.

May this be our prayer as we journey forth: O God, you have called your servants to ventures of which we cannot see the ending, by paths as yet untrodden, through perils unknown. Give us faith to go out with good courage, not knowing where we go, but only that your hand is leading us and your love supporting us; through Jesus Christ our Lord. And let the church say, "Amen."

"Each congregation with fewer than 175 baptized members may elect one additional voting member who is a youth or young adult. A congregation with more than 175 baptized members may elect two additional voting members who are youth or young adults."

Without the help of all our volunteers, musicians, committees, and leaders these events would not have happened so easily!



A YEAR OF ZERO WASTE – PART 4

So how is your challenge to become ‘waste free’ going? In the last newsletter we discussed zero waste in real life and minimizing mindfully. Are you thinking differently about your garbage?

JULY: YOUR AT-HOME GARDEN

- * What is your growing potential?
- * Try low-waste gardening

Are you a gardener? If you are, you know the joys of a fresh ripe tomato or cucumber eaten right from the garden. If not, you can try some simple gardening in pots on your porch or a raised bed. Many communities now have community gardens where you can garden with friends or neighbors and learn from each other. It’s easier than you think. You can grow a tomato or lettuce. In the spring and fall you can grow cool weather crops like spinach, lettuce and peas. Or grow more native plants in your yard and mow less. And think organic. Stay away from chemicals to treat your lawn and garden. It’s not good for the pollinators or your children and pets.

Low waste gardening includes recycling your waste back into your garden. When you com-

post this goes back into the earth to enrich your soil to grow food or flowers for the pollinators.
