





CHILDREN'S SERMON – "Jesus the Vine" / Video Posted to Facebook and YouTube Channel

WORD – "God speaks to us in Scripture reading, preaching and song."

Led by the Spirit, Philip encounters an Ethiopian official who is returning to his African home after having been to Jerusalem to worship. Philip uses their encounter to proclaim the gospel to him. Upon coming to faith in Jesus, he is baptized by Philip.

FIRST READING: Acts 8:26-40

²⁶An angel of the Lord said to Philip, "Get up and go toward the south to the road that goes down from Jerusalem to Gaza." (This is a wilderness road.) ²⁷So he got up and went. Now there was an Ethiopian eunuch, a court official of the Candace, queen of the Ethiopians, in charge of her entire treasury. He had come to Jerusalem to worship ²⁸and was returning home; seated in his chariot, he was reading the prophet Isaiah. ²⁹Then the Spirit said to Philip, "Go over to this chariot and join it." ³⁰So Philip ran up to it and heard him reading the prophet Isaiah. He asked, "Do you understand what you are reading?" ³¹He replied, "How can I, unless someone guides me?" And he invited Philip to get in and sit beside him. ³²Now the passage of the scripture that he was reading was this:

"Like a sheep he was led to the slaughter,

and like a lamb silent before its shearer,

so he does not open his mouth.

³³In his humiliation justice was denied him.

Who can describe his generation?

For his life is taken away from the earth."

³⁴The eunuch asked Philip, "About whom, may I ask you, does the prophet say this, about himself or about someone else?" ³⁵Then Philip began to speak, and starting with this scripture, he proclaimed to him the good news about Jesus. ³⁶As they were going along the road, they came to some water; and the eunuch said, "Look, here is water! What is to prevent me from being baptized?" ³⁸He commanded the chariot to stop, and both of them, Philip and the eunuch, went down into the water, and Philip baptized him. ³⁹When they came up out of the water, the Spirit of the Lord snatched Philip away; the eunuch saw him no more, and went on his way rejoicing. ⁴⁰But Philip found himself at Azotus, and as he was passing through the region, he proclaimed the good news to all the towns until he came to Caesarea.

We love God and others because God first loved us. We cannot say we love God, whom we have not seen, while hating fellow Christians, whom we regularly see. Love toward God is to be matched by love toward others because the essence of God is love.

SECOND READING: 1 John 4:7-21

⁷Beloved, let us love one another, because love is from God; everyone who loves is born of God and knows God. ⁸Whoever does not love does not know God, for God is love. ⁹God's love was revealed among us in this way: God sent his only Son into the world so that we might live through him. ¹⁰In this is love, not that we loved God but that he loved us and sent his Son to be the atoning sacrifice for our sins. ¹¹Beloved, since God loved us so much, we also ought to love one another. ¹²No one has ever seen God; if we love one another, God lives in us, and his love is perfected in us.

¹³By this we know that we abide in him and he in us, because he has given us of his Spirit. ¹⁴And we have seen and do testify that the Father has sent his Son as the Savior of the world. ¹⁵God abides in those who confess that Jesus is the Son of God, and they abide in God. ¹⁶So we have known and believe the love that God has for us.

God is love, and those who abide in love abide in God, and God abides in them. ¹⁷Love has been perfected among us in this: that we may have boldness on the day of judgment, because as he is, so are we in this world. ¹⁸There is no fear in love, but perfect love casts out fear; for fear has to do with punishment, and whoever fears has not reached perfection in love. ¹⁹We love because he first loved us. ²⁰Those who say, "I love God," and hate their brothers or sisters, are liars; for those who do not love a brother or sister whom they have seen, cannot love God whom they have not seen. ²¹The commandment we have from him is this: those who love God must love their brothers and sisters also.

Just as the branch cannot bear fruit by itself unless it abides in the vine, neither can you unless you abide in me. ⁵I am the vine, you are the branches. Those who abide in me and I in them bear much fruit, because apart from me you can do nothing. ⁶Whoever does not abide in me is thrown away like a branch and withers; such branches are gathered, thrown into the fire, and burned. ⁷If you abide in me, and my words abide in you, ask for whatever you wish, and it will be done for you. ⁸My Father is glorified by this, that you bear much fruit and become my disciples."

NICENE CREED



With this bread and cup we remember our Lord's passover from death into life as we proclaim the mystery of faith:







Music Ministry

We know that most of you (hopefully everyone) has greatly missed singing as a congregation in our worship services. Once it became suspected - and then obvious - that the COVID-19 virus is most commonly spread through aerosols exhaled from an infected person, we decided that we should forego singing whenever we gathered for worship. Now, we need to decide when and how to reintroduce that essential part of our worship.

The two mitigating actions we think will have the most effect on reducing the risk of singing in church are vaccinations and ventilation. As more and more of us have been vaccinated, all indications are that a return to previous practices is becoming safer, although the impact that COVID-19 variants may have in the next few months is unknown. As the weather permits, we will also be able to return to worshiping in a room with open windows and fans providing better ventilation.

When we begin to ease back into congregational singing, you can expect the following:

- Begin to sing parts of the liturgy since the liturgy is the "work of the people" and most of those are short and involve relatively quiet, meditative singing.
- Sing the "Sending Hymn" since everyone will leave the building within a few minutes of that activity.
- Sing fewer verses of hymns to reduce the singing duration.
- Continue to be led by the recorded organ and choir music so that we can experience a full sound without increasing our exhalation and exposure.
- Continue with our practices of mask wearing and distancing while beginning to gently raise our voices, albeit in a subdued manner.

Our choir is also considering when and how to resume rehearsals and singing together. When asked how they, as individual singers, will decide when it is safe to sing together, the most common response has been "when everyone in the choir has been fully vaccinated." We also plan to hold shorter rehearsals in well-ventilated rooms (or even out-of-doors, weather-permitting) and will gather in church as a choir only for the duration of a psalm or anthem. Otherwise, the choir members will participate in worship as a congregant under the constraints listed above.

Worship practices during the pandemic have been a core discussion of the monthly church council meetings and recently we have been discussing this return to singing. When a consensus has been reached that the risk has sufficiently decreased (through decreasing incidence of the virus in our community and through our proposed mitigation practices) you can expect that we will move forward. Please continue to pray for wisdom and guidance for those that must make these decisions and for all of us who desire both to worship as fully as we can while considering the health and well-being of our neighbor.

First Holy Communion classes have begun and are held on Sundays, April 25-May 23 at 9:15am in fellowship hall. Classes are offered in person and on Zoom by our instructors, Ann Flick and Beth Keller. Masks are worn and all safety protocols are followed. Children will receive their First Holy Communion on Sunday, June 6 at the 10:30am service.
