

This hymn text is attributed to Jean Tisserand, a 15th century Franciscan monk also known for founding a religious order for penitent women. The English text is a translation by John Mason Neale, a 19th century British cleric admired for his contributions to the church and hymnody. The tune is the work of Michael Vulpius, a 16th century Lutheran cantor and distinguished composer, who wrote it with a different text in mind. His tune appears in a lively triple meter, with a baroque playfulness in the syncopation appearing in the second and third phrases. And although the refrain is barred in triple meter, Germans would have sung it in duple meter, accenting the second syllable of "alleluia."

WORD - "God speaks to us in Scripture reading, preaching and song."

While the apostles testified to others about the resurrection of Jesus, the early Christian community shared what they owned or sold their possessions to help their fellow believers who were in need.

FIRST READING: Acts 4:32-35

³²Now the whole group of those who believed were of one heart and soul, and no one claimed private ownership of any possessions, but everything they owned was held in common. ³³With great power the apostles gave their testimony to the resurrection of the Lord Jesus, and great grace was upon them all. ³⁴There was not a needy person among them, for as many as owned lands or houses sold them and brought the proceeds of what was sold. ³⁵They laid it at the apostles' feet, and it was distributed to each as any had need.

The opening of this letter serves as a reality check. The reality of God is light, but our confessed reality has been sin. God cleanses us from our sinful reality through Christ's death so that we live in fellowship with Christ and walk in God's light.

SECOND READING: 1 John 1:1--2:2

¹We declare to you what was from the beginning, what we have heard, what we have seen with our eyes, what we have looked at and touched with our hands, concerning the word of life—²this life was revealed, and we have seen it and testify to it, and declare to you the eternal life that was with the Father and was revealed to us—³we declare to you what we have seen and heard so that you also may have fellowship with us; and truly our fellowship is with the Father and with his Son Jesus Christ. ⁴We are writing these things so that our joy may be complete.

⁵This is the message we have heard from him and proclaim to you, that God is light and in him there is no darkness at all. ⁶If we say that we have fellowship with him while we are walking in darkness, we lie and do not do what is true; ⁷but if we walk in the light as he himself is in the light, we have fellowship with one another, and the blood of Jesus his Son cleanses us from all sin. ⁸If we say that we have no sin, we deceive ourselves, and the truth is not in us. ⁹If we confess our sins, he who is faithful and just will forgive us our sins and cleanse us from all unrighteousness. ¹⁰If we say that we have not sinned, we make him a liar, and his word is not in us.

^{2:1}My little children, I am writing these things to you so that you may not sin. But if anyone does sin, we have an advocate with the Father, Jesus Christ the righteous; ² and he is the atoning sacrifice for our sins, and not for ours only but also for the sins of the whole world.

The story of Easter continues as the risen Jesus appears to his disciples. His words to Thomas offer a blessing to all who entrust themselves in faith to the risen Lord.

GOSPEL: John 20:19-31

¹⁹When it was evening on that day, the first day of the week, and the doors of the house where the disciples had met were locked for fear of the Jews, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you." ²⁰After he said this, he showed them his hands and his side. Then the disciples rejoiced when they saw the Lord. ²¹Jesus said to them again, "Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you." ²²When he had said this, he breathed on them and said to them, "Receive the Holy Spirit. ²³If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven them; if you retain the sins of any, they are retained."

²⁴But Thomas (who was called the Twin), one of the twelve, was not with them when Jesus came. ²⁵So the other disciples told him, "We have seen the Lord." But he said to them, "Unless I see the mark of the nails in his hands, and put my finger in the mark of the nails and my hand in his side, I will not believe."

²⁶A week later his disciples were again in the house, and Thomas was with them. Although the doors were shut, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you." ²⁷Then he said to Thomas, "Put your finger here and see my hands. Reach out your hand and put it in my side. Do not doubt but believe." ²⁸Thomas answered him, "My Lord and my God!" ²⁹Jesus said to him, "Have you believed because you have seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have come to believe."

³⁰Now Jesus did many other signs in the presence of his disciples, which are not written in this book. ³¹But these are written so that you may come to believe that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God, and that through believing you may have life in his name.

SERMON Pastor Coleman

This hymn text, so appropriate for the Second Sunday of Easter, is the work of a distinguished British scholar and theologian of the 19th century. The composer, about whom little else is known, named the tune after a famous bridge over Dunlap's Creek, located in Brownsville PA, 30 miles south of Pittsburgh.







Music Ministry

Announcing All Creation Sings, a new ELCA hymnal from Augsburg Fortress

In November 2020, Augsburg Fortress published a new hymnal as a supplement to the *Evangelical Lutheran Worship* hymnal. Titled *All Creation Sings (ACS)*, it includes:

- Two Holy Communion liturgies with new musical settings
- A Service of the Word and Prayer intended for contemplative worship
- About 200 hymns and songs, many of which have been written in this century on a wide range of topics

According to the ELCA worship team and Augsburg Fortress creating the hymnal, the "church body voiced a need for more material around four major topics: creation care, lament in times of crisis, healing and wholeness, and justice and peace." Released in the middle of the pandemic, one of the team members stated that "these hymns for healing and wholeness and lament are going to fill a need for folks even though we can't sing together as an assembly."

One such hymn (*Touch That Soothes and Heals*) is used today during the distribution. It both relates to Jesus presenting himself to the disciples after the resurrection as well as commanding us to help those among us.

Opportunities for Christian Education

Worship

At Luther Memorial Church we are thankful that we are able to provide at home communion.
