This is the day that the Lord has made. Together, let us rejoice and be glad in it!

Luther Memorial Church and Academy, is located on the original and ancestral homelands of the Haudenosaunee, Mississauga, Seneca, and Erie people. These lands were ceded by the people of the Six Nations on October 22, 1784 in a treaty ratified by the United States Government in 1785 and never ratified by the people of the Six Nations. We gather in this place indebted to these peoples for their forced generosity. While some peoples were successful in resisting assimilation and genocide, and still live on dwindled homelands now, many were absorbed into other peoples, exiled, or annihilated by the United States government for their land. For those who remain and for the land on which we gather, we give thanks to the Creator and to those who have been custodians of this part of Turtle Island since time immemorial. We also wish to recognize and honor all our Indigenous siblings who have and continue to call this land their home.

You are invited to stand as you are able where indicated. Hymns are included in this bulletin, however if you need larger print, hymns may be found in the back of the red hymnal using the number indicated (#). Please join in singing all the music! Today especially we raise our voices in praise!

 \sim **You don't need to disconnect here**! You don't need to turn off your phone, but please place it in silent mode. 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Worship Matters

Today the Church recognizes and celebrates Jan Hus, martyr. Martin Luther was not the first reformer of the Church. He wasn't even in the first ten people who tried to reform the Church. He was the most successful in his own time mostly because of the invention of the printing press and the ability to disseminate information much more quickly. Yet, Luther would not have seen himself as the first. Indeed, Luther credited Jan Hus as one of his predecessors and himself as an inheritor of Hus' reforming spirit. Among Hus' calls for reform was the end of indulgences and of crusades. He also called into question the line of succession of the Pope and the substance of the elements of Communion (whether the Bread and Wine remain bread and wine or are fully transubstantiated into the Body and Blood of Christ-a fine line Luther himself would argue in his reforms). However, we receive the story of Hus—who was burned at the stake for his heresy-we celebrate him today. We remember that the Church is called to semper reformanda to be always reforming. Luther was not the first nor the last reformer. And our vision of Christ's Church must not be one of a museum keeping everything intact and well preserved but of always being open to the dreams and visions of the future into which Christ himself calls his Church. Indeed, into our own continent came Henry Melchior Muhlenberg whose own phrase (besides semper reformanda) was semper plantada, the Church must be always planted. The growth of a tree is more apt to who we are called to be, always growing, always changing, always providing fruit and shelter to those who seek the shade of the Tree of Life around which we gather.

Adult Forum will be offered on Sundays, July 13 and July 20 at 9:30am in the library. Pastor Jay will be delving into the history of the Nicene-Constantinopolitan Creed which celebrates its 1700th Anniversary this year. There will also be discussion of the Joint Ecumenical Statement on the Filioque by the Lutheran World Federation and the Orthodox Churches.

Readings and Commemoration This Week

6 July – Jan Hus, martyr, 1415 – Ezekiel 20:40-42; Psalm 5; Revelation 6:9-11; Matthew 23:34-37 -- *Hus was a Bohemian (present-day Czech Republic) priest who spoke against abuses in the church, and was seen by Martin Luther as his predecessor in the reforming movement. He was found guilty of heresy by a council of the church, and burned at the stake.*

7 July – Psalm 119:73-80; Jeremiah 6:10-19; Acts 19:21-27

8 July – Psalm 119:73-80; Jeremiah 8:4-13; Acts 19:28-41

9 July – Psalm 119:73-80; Joshua 23:1-16; Luke 10:13-16

10 July – Psalm 25:1-10; Genesis 41:14-26; James 2:14-16

11 July – Benedict of Nursia, Abbot of Monte Cassino, 540; Scholastica, monastic, 547 -- Proverbs 2:1-9; Psalm 1; Luke 14:27-33 -- Benedict is known as the father of the Western monastic movement. Educated in Rome, he went to live as a hermit, and eventually gathered a community of monks around him. He wrote a rule for living in monasteries that is used by Benedictines and adapted by others. Scholastica is often venerated with Benedict. As his twin sister, Scholastica followed in Benedict's footsteps setting up monasticism for women in parallel with her brother.

12 July – Nathan Söderblom, Bishop of Uppsala, 1931 – Ezekiel 34:11-16; Psalm 84; Ephesians 3:14-21; John 21:15-17 -- *A winner of the Nobel Prize for peace for his efforts to unite peoples after the First World War, Söderblom also called attention to the revival of early church worship principles, and helped to lay the groundwork for the World Council of Churches.*
