





Morning Has Broken









FIRST READING: Deuteronomy 30:15-20




¹Paul, a prisoner of Christ Jesus, and Timothy our brother, To our beloved coworker Philemon, ²to our sister Apphia, to our fellow soldier Archippus, and to the church in your house: ³Grace to you and peace from God, our Father, and the Lord Jesus Christ. ⁴I thank my God always when I mention you in my prayers, 5because I hear of your love for all the saints and your faith toward the Lord Jesus. ⁶I pray that the partnership of your faith may become effective as you comprehend all the good that we share in Christ. ⁷I have indeed received much joy and encouragement from your love, because the hearts of the saints have been refreshed through you, my brother. 8For this reason, though I am more than bold enough in Christ to command you to do the right thing, ⁹yet I would rather appeal to you on the basis of love— and I, Paul, do this as an old man and now also as a prisoner of Christ Jesus. ¹⁰I am appealing to you for my child, Onesimus, whose father I have become during my imprisonment. ¹¹Formerly he was useless to you, but now he is indeed useful to you and to me. ¹²I am sending him, that is, my own heart, back to you. ¹³I wanted to keep him with me so that he might minister to me in your place during my imprisonment for the gospel, ¹⁴but I preferred to do nothing without your consent in order that your good deed might be voluntary and not something forced. ¹⁵Perhaps this is the reason Onesimus was separated from you for a while, so that you might have him back for the long term, ¹⁶no longer as an enslaved person but more than a slave, a beloved brother—especially to me but how much more to you, both in the flesh and in the Lord. ¹⁷So if you consider me your partner, welcome Onesimus as you would welcome me. ¹⁸If he has wronged you in any way or owes you anything, charge that to me. ¹⁹I, Paul, am writing this with my own hand: I will repay it. I say nothing about your owing me even your own self. ²⁰Yes, brother, let me have this benefit from you in the Lord! Refresh my heart in Christ. ²¹Confident of your obedience, I am writing to you, knowing that you will do even more than I ask. ²²One thing more: prepare a guest room for me, for I am hoping through your prayers to be restored to you. ²³Epaphras, my fellow prisoner in Christ Jesus, sends greetings to you, ²⁴ and so do Mark, Aristarchus, Demas, and Luke, my coworkers. ²⁵The grace of the Lord Jesus Christ be with your spirit.

Luther Memorial Church and Academy are located on the original and ancestral homelands of the Haudenosaunee, Mississauga, and Erie people. These lands were ceded by the people of the Six Nations on October 22, 1784 in a treaty ratified by the United States Government in 1785 and never ratified by the people of the Six Nations. We gather in this place indebted to these peoples for their forced generosity. While some peoples were successful in resisting assimilation and genocide, and still live on dwindled homelands now, many were absorbed into other peoples, exiled, or annihilated by the United States government for their land. For those who remain and for the land on which we gather, we give thanks to the Creator and to those who have been custodians of this part of Turtle Island since time immemorial. We also wish to recognize and honor all our Indigenous siblings who have and continue to call this land their home.

Worship Matters!

This Sunday we begin using *Deutsche Messe* by Schubert. Some would think of this as THE Deutsche Messe (German Mass), but it is, strictly speaking, not even a German Mass on its own, let alone the only one. In 1526, seeing the various ways that the Latin Mass was starting to stray from the original sources, Luther set forth his "German Mass and Order of Worship at Wittenberg," for congregations who followed Lutheran reforms to potential follow. It puts in a lot of music to be sung by the congregation (which had previously been sung by trained choirs largely because it was in Latin, a language very few outside of choir schools knew). Over time, many put the words of Mass to music. Schubert is one of them. And in 2025, it would be arguable that his version is the best known in the United States of the choral German Masses.

But the interesting thing about THE Deutsche Messe that Luther outlines is that he very directly tells those who might choose to follow the order of the Mass that it is not a requirement to be Lutheran. It's not the only way to do it. And, he says, if there comes along a *better way* for it to be done, he encourages the pastor to throw out whatever he's written down and do the new way. The Mass should be ever-reforming (like the Church), in Luther's mind, so that it is always relevant and accessible to the people who encounter it. For this reason, to this day, we sing a variety of hymns from a variety of sources and in a whole bunch of styles. We recognize that God's Word is still being proclaimed around the globe. For Luther, what is necessary is that the Word be proclaimed faithfully and the sacraments be administered rightly. And that can be done in just about any *style*. So, we again pick up the well loved *Deutsche Messe* of Schubert in this season and give thanks for all those who have shaped our worship through the years and around the world.

LIVESTREAMERS ARE NEEDED! Recently, a few of our services have not been livestreamed and therefore not available to our homebound members. This is due to scheduling conflicts and volunteer availability. We need a robust rotation of livestreamers which involves tending the camera in the choir loft during our 10:30am worship service and our main worship services on feast days (such as Christmas Eve or Ash Wednesday). All ages are welcome to take on this vital leadership role in our communal worship. If you are interested in what this would entail and/or would like to sign up, please speak with Cantor Bryan or Pastor Jay.

Faith Formation for All Ages

This year we are using *Cross-Examined: Reading the Bible in Times of Division* by Josh Scott. Saint Zita's Day—Church Clean-Up!

Saint Zita, a 13th century Italian woman known for her devotion to God and her service to others, is the patron saint of domestic workers.
