THE COMMUNION



Luther Memorial Church and Academy are located on the original and ancestral homelands of the Haudenosaunee, Mississauga, and Erie people. These lands were ceded by the people of the Six Nations on October 22, 1784 in a treaty ratified by the United States Government in 1785 and never ratified by the people of the Six Nations. We gather in this place indebted to these peoples for their forced generosity. While some peoples were successful in resisting assimilation and genocide, and still live on dwindled homelands now, many were absorbed into other peoples, exiled, or annihilated by the United States government for their land. For those who remain and for the land on which we gather, we give thanks to the Creator and to those who have been custodians of this part of Turtle Island since time immemorial. We also wish to recognize and honor all our Indigenous siblings who have and continue to call this land their home.

Today's Events

Prayer Ventures is a monthly pamphlet that provides a prayer for each day. The November pamphlet is available at the welcome tables. Please feel free to take one for you and anyone you would like to share this with. **Second Sunday Soirée** will gather in the parlor for refreshments and fellowship this morning at 9:15. Please join us.

Adult Forum will gather at 9:15 this morning. Pastor Jay will lead the discussion, The Communion of Saints.

The first gathering of our four Confirmation class workshops for our 7th-9th grade youth will be held this morning following the 10:30am worship service. These workshops will be offered the second Sunday of odd months (January, March, May). In order to successfully complete confirmation classes, each confirmand must attend all four. However, the *same four* will be offered every year in slightly different orders to allow for flexibility in attending all four. There will also be a worship leadership and a biblical literacy component that will need to be completed along with the usual service hours. Finally, ConfirCamp is strongly recommended for *at least* one year between the end of 7th and beginning of 10th grade. Confirmation will still be held in the autumn of 10th grade to each confirmand.

Sunday School for PreK-grade 5 will be held this morning at 9:30. Youth in grades 6-12 will also gather at 9:30.

Worship

This Tuesday is the 11th of November. For millennia this has been celebrated as the Feast of St. Martin. Indeed, our own beloved Luther is named Martin because he is baptized on this day (and the tradition was to take the name of the saint-of-the-day). It is not a mistake that the 11th of November was chosen for Armistice Day (now Veterans' Day in the United States, which shifts the focus of the international commemoration of the end of World War I, as in the Commonwealth where the day is Remembrance Day). St. Martin is the patron of soldiers. You can read his brief biography later in the bulletin. But Martin was a Roman soldier who was converted by giving his cloak to a beggar. He was later elected to the bishopric of Tours where he was known for his poverty and humility in his service among his flock.

St. Martin's Day is also traditionally the beginning of Advent. The remainder of November begins the looking to the coming Savior and then the transition with St. Andrew's Day (November 30) to looking to the coming of the baby in the manger.

LIVESTREAMERS ARE NEEDED! Recently, a few of our services have not been livestreamed and therefore not available to our homebound members. This is due to scheduling conflicts and volunteer availability. We need a robust rotation of livestreamers which involves tending the camera in the choir loft during our 10:30am worship service and our main worship services on feast days (such as Christmas Eve or Ash Wednesday). All ages are welcome to take on this vital leadership role in our communal worship. If you are interested in what this would entail and/or would like to sign up, please speak with Cantor Bryan or Pastor Jay.

This year we are using *Crossroads: Reading the Bible in Divisive Times* by Josh Scott. Brown Bag Bible will not meet in November. Our next gathering will be December 4. You do not need the book to participate, but if you would like a copy of the book, it is \$15 to the church office.

Bible After Dark (BAD) meets on the FIRST TUESDAY of each month at 6:30pm at Calamari's Squid Row (1317 State St) for a time of conversation and fellowship. We will be using Josh Scott's book *Parables: Putting Jesus' Stories in Their Place*. If you would like to order your book from the church office, the cost is \$14. You may also order your own. Readings and Commemoration This Week

November 10 – Psalm 123; John 20:1-11; II Peter 1:16-21


November 11 – Martin, Bishop of Tours, 397 <u>or</u> **Soren Aabye Kierkegaard, teacher, 1855** – Psalm 123; John 21:1, 17-34; II John 1-13 -- *Martin's pagan father enlisted him in the Roman army. Approached by a beggar, Martin cut his cloak in half and gave part to the man, whom he later understood as representing Christ. He asked to leave the army, but was jailed instead. After his release, he became a preacher, and later a bishop. <u>or</u> Kierkegaard was a Danish theologian whose writings also gave rise to the modern philosophy of existentialism. He frequently attacked the complacency of the state church of his day, as well as its desire to be accepted by polite society rather than be a stumbling block.*
