Outreach Offerings

Worship Matters!

What is Worship after all? Is "worship" that thing we have to do on Sundays? Is it something God requires of us? Is it simple a "response" to what we have been given? Is it an hour once-a-week to commune with God? Is it about me-and-Jesus? Is it an obedience to the third commandment to keep holy the Sabbath?

Worship is entirely counter-cultural; not just historically but today. It is about getting out of the way and letting God act in our lives. It is about recognizing that nothing we do can be done without God. It is about seeing God in the rightful place as first-actor in our lives:

Worship is intentional time set apart out of our busy lives in which we allow God to be the primary actor. It is about hearing God whisper through the constant din of our lives to come and rest a while (*Gathering*). It is about quieting the various voices we listen to and listening to God (*Word*). It is about setting aside the coffee breaks, the business lunches, and the dinner plans to be fed by God (*Meal*). It is time that nourishes our whole selves so that when God sends us back out into the world we are strengthened and renewed to live the life to which we are called (*Sending*).

So is it all those things? Yes-and-no. God does not *require* that we come to worship. God invites us to be present in the gathering of God's people. It is not the *only* place where we can experience God. But here in water, word, wine, wheat, and each other we find God most tangibly. None of our lives is about me-and-Jesus at the exclusion of all others but rather about me-and-us-and-Jesus. And that third commandment to keep the Sabbath holy? That's still intact. We should keep holy the Sabbath for all the reasons God wants us to: to rest and renew ourselves, to reconnect, to ground ourselves. But Sunday is not the Sabbath. It never was. Very clearly we gather on Sundays as the "first day of the week," as "the day named after the sun," as the day of Resurrection. So please do consider keeping Sabbath in whatever way you can. And then come to worship, too!

Faith Formation Calendar 2025C-2026A

Catechism is getting a revamp! It seems like there has been a change every year since Pastor Jay has gotten here. And there has But there has also been much in flux about ConfirCamp and other programming. A general schedule has been set: For students 7th grade through 9th grade, there will be four workshops offered throughout the year on the 2nd Sunday (in odd months: November, January, March, May) after the 10:30am worship service. In order to successfully complete confirmation classes, each confirmand must attend all four. However, the *same four* will be offered every year in slightly different orders to allow for flexibility in attending all four. There will also be a worship leadership and a biblical literacy component that will need to be completed along with the usual service hours. Finally, ConfirCamp is strongly recommended for *at least* one year between the end of 7th and beginning of 10th grade. Confirmation will still be held in the autumn of 10th grade to each confirmand.

Faith Formation Calendars for adults are available in hard copy on the Welcome Table near the Ramp Door. There are also electronic copies on the Facebook page and linked to the newsletters in August. Check out all the opportunities to gather for Adult Forum (beginning October 12), Brown Bag Bible (beginning September 4), and Bible After Dark (BAD, beginning October 7) every month! The schedule will be slightly different this year for some, and there are resources available for others. So check it out now and let the church office know if you need to put in a reservation for any of the resources!
