Worship Matters!

What happened to the green? While it is still the "green season" you may have noticed that the paraments and Pastor Jay's vestments haven't been green for two weeks now. What's with that? Throughout the year, there are a number of "Lesser Festivals" and "Commemorations." These are days when we remember and celebrate moments in the life of Jesus, moments in the Bible and Church history, people we find in relationship with Jesus or in the Bible.

All Sundays of the year are festivals of our Lord Jesus Christ. In a profound sense, Sunday—the first day and the eighth day of the week, the weekly celebration of the day of resurrection—is the primary Christian festival. Other principal festivals and observances are the Nativity of Our Lord and the Epiphany of Our Lord; Ash Wednesday and the days of Holy Week; the Three Days of Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and the Resurrection of Our Lord; the Sundays of Easter, the Ascension of Our Lord, and the Day of Pentecost; and the Holy Trinity.

Lesser Festivals are additional days when we celebrate the life of Christ, the witness of those who accompanied and testified to him, and the gifts of God in the church.

Commemorations illuminate various aspects of the church's life and mission through the lives of women and men who have followed Christ in succeeding generations.

Every Sunday of the year has a color of the day associated with the liturgical season in which we find ourselves. Lesser Festivals and Commemorations also have assigned colors. While you can find both lesser festivals and commemorations in the bulletin each week, only lesser festivals can take the place of the primary worship on a Sunday. There only a few such celebrations. Mary, the mother of God and St. Bartholomew are both such festivals. So, we celebrate these two Sundays. You can assume that *most* of such lesser festivals are celebrated with either white (representative of the glory of Jesus and reserved for those celebrations of Jesus, Mary, witnesses to the resurrection, and St. John the Evangelist who is the only apostle we are told who died of old age and not martyrdom) or red (representative of the Spirit and the blood of the martyrs and reserved for celebrations of the Spirit and the Church).

LIVESTREAMERS ARE NEEDED! Recently, a few of our services have not been livestreamed and therefore not available to our homebound members. This is due to scheduling conflicts and volunteer availability. We need a robust rotation of livestreamers which involves tending the camera in the choir loft during our 10:30am worship service and our main worship services on feast days (such as Christmas Eve or Ash Wednesday). All ages are welcome to take on this vital leadership role in our communal worship. If you are interested in what this would entail and/or would like to sign up, please speak with Cantor Bryan or Pastor Jay.

Faith Formation Calendar 2025C-2026A

Faith Formation Calendars for adults are available in hard copy on the Welcome Table near the Ramp Door. There are also electronic copies on the Facebook page and linked to the newsletters in August. Check out all the opportunities to gather for Adult Forum (beginning October 12), Brown Bag Bible (beginning September 4), and Bible After Dark (BAD, beginning October 7) every month! The schedule will be slightly different this year for some, and there are resources available for others. So check it out now and let the church office know if you need to put in a reservation for any of the resources!

Catechism is getting a revamp! It seems like there has been a change every year since Pastor Jay has gotten here. And there has. But there has also been much in flux about ConfirCamp and other programming. A general schedule has been set: For students 7th grade through 9th grade, there will be four workshops offered throughout the year on the 2nd Sunday (in odd months: November, January, March, May) after the 10:30am worship service. In order to successfully complete confirmation classes, each confirmand must attend all four. However, the *same four* will be offered every year in slightly different orders to allow for flexibility in attending all four. There will also be a worship leadership and a biblical literacy component that will need to be completed along with the usual service hours. Finally, ConfirCamp is strongly recommended for *at least* one year between the end of 7th and beginning of 10th grade. Confirmation will still be held in the autumn of 10th grade to each confirmand.

Outreach Offerings

Giving offerings to outreach ministries allows Luther Memorial to support vital work beyond our church walls, like serving those in need and spreading the gospel. It enables us to fulfill our mission of serving God and others by funding programs that improve lives, both physically and spiritually. On Sunday, August 31 our morning offerings will be donated to Augusta Victory Hospital, Lutheran World Federation sponsored hospital in Jerusalem (avh.org/).

Bishop-Elect Papson's Installation News

Readings and Commemoration This Week

August 24 – Bartholomew, Apostle -- The gospels of Matthew, Mark, and Luke include Bartholomew in their lists of the Twelve. Partly due to his connection with Philip, many scholars believe Bartholomew is probably the same person as Nathanael in John's Gospel. Nathanael is one of the first disciples called to "come and see" (John's version of "follow me"), and he is present on the shore of the Sea of Tiberius when the risen Christ invites his friends to "come and have breakfast" (John 21:12).

August 25 – Psalm 109:21-31; Ezekiel 20:1-17; Hebrews 3:7-4:11

August 26 – Psalm 109:21-31; Ezekiel 20:18-32; Revelation 3:7-13

August 27 – Psalm 109:21-31; Ezekiel 20:33-44; Luke 6:6-11

August 28 – Augustine, Bishop of Bippo, 430; Moses the Black, monk, martyr, 400 – Psalm 112; Proverbs 15:13-17; I Peter 3:8-12 -- Augustine was one of the greatest theologians of the Western church. A native of North Africa, he recovered from a debauched young adulthood through the influence of his mother, Monica, and Bishop Ambrose of Milan. Besides writing influential theological books, he served as bishop of Hippo, in present-day Algeria. Converted from life as a thief and a robber to Christianity, Moses was an Ethiopian who became a desert monk at Skete. The change in his heart and life had a profound impact on his native country. He was murdered when Berber bandits attacked his monastery.
