



## FIRST READING: Acts 12:1-11

<sup>1</sup>About that time King Herod laid violent hands upon some who belonged to the church. <sup>2</sup>He had James, the brother of John, killed with the sword. <sup>3</sup>After he saw that it pleased the Jewish religious leaders, he proceeded to arrest Peter also. (This was during the Festival of Unleavened Bread.) <sup>4</sup>When Herod had seized Peter, he put him in prison and handed him over to four squads of soldiers to guard him, intending to bring him out to the people after the Passover. <sup>5</sup>While Peter was kept in prison, the church prayed fervently to God for him. <sup>6</sup>The very night before Herod was going to bring him out, Peter, bound with two chains, was sleeping between two soldiers, while guards in front of the door were keeping watch over the prison. <sup>7</sup>Suddenly an angel of the Lord appeared, and a light shone in the cell. The angel tapped Peter on the side and woke him, saying, "Get up quickly." And the chains fell off his wrists. <sup>8</sup>The angel said to him, "Fasten your belt and put on your sandals." He did so. Then the angel said to him, "Wrap your cloak around you and follow me." <sup>9</sup>Peter went out and followed the angel; he did not realize that what was happening with the angel's help was real; he thought he was seeing a vision. <sup>10</sup>After they had passed the first and the second guard, they came before the iron gate leading into the city. It opened for them of its own accord, and they went outside and walked along a lane, when suddenly the angel left him. <sup>11</sup>Then Peter came to himself and said, "Now I am sure that the Lord has sent an angel and rescued me from the hands of Herod and from all that the Jewish leaders were expecting."

## SECOND READING: II Timothy 4:6-8, 17-18



## Worship Matters!

**Today we celebrate** two great figures of the early church, Peter and Paul, who represent the spread of the gospel to both Jews and Gentiles and, according to tradition, were martyred on this date. The witness of Peter and Paul inspires us as we seek ways to faithfully proclaim the gospel in our contemporary context.

We remember today the apostleship of Peter and Paul. They were very different men and arrived at their apostleship in very different ways. They didn't even get along particularly well. But both found the gospel calling them out from the grave. In all this, Jesus is more patient than we know. He waited, John points out, until breakfast was finished before he began his beautiful and shattering questioning of Peter. "Do you love me?" That is not a question one answers between mouthfuls of fish. Jesus waited. So with Paul, it wasn't until he was on the Damascus road that Jesus knocked him down and struck him blind. Jesus waited. This patience must be part of the wisdom of the Good Shepherd. Indeed, as Jesus' charge to Peter makes clear, the call of the Christian is to have the heart of a shepherd for God's people, to seek, to call, to wait.

## **Readings and Commemoration This Week**

June 30 – Psalm 140, Genesis 24:34-41, 50-67; I John 2:7-11

July 1 – Catherine Winkworth, 1878; John Mason Neale, 1866; hymn translators -- Neale was an English priest who specialized in the translation of Latin and Greek hymns into English. Winkworth lived in Manchester, England, and devoted herself to translating German hymns. Almost all English-speaking hymnals include many of their translations.

**July 2** – Psalm 140; Jeremiah 23:16-22; Matthew 10:16-25

**July 3 – Thomas, Apostle** – Judges 6:36-40; Psalm 136:1-4, 23-26; Ephesians 4:11-6; John 14:1-7 – Though frequently remembered as "doubting Thomas," this apostle also demonstrated a willingness to suffer and die with Jesus (John 11:16), and finally claimed the risen Christ as "my Lord and my God!" By tradition, he later worked as a missionary in India. Long commemorated on December 21, Thomas's celebration is moved to July 3 in agreement with ecumenical calendars.

**July 5** – Psalm 66:1-9; Zechariah 14:10-21; Luke 9:1-6
