


PREFACE




COMMUNION

WEEKLY READINGS AND COMMEMORATIONS

September 17 – **Hildegard, Abbess of Bingen, 1179** – Ecclesiastes 43:1–12; Psalm 104:25–34; John 3:16–21 – *A mystic who was widely influential within the church, Hildegard advised and reproved kings and popes, wrote poems and hymns, and produced treatises in medicine, theology, and natural history. She was also a musician and artist.*

September 18 – Dag Hammarskjöld, renewer of society, 1961 – Psalm 77; Joshua 3:1-17; Hebrews 11:23-29 -- A Swedish diplomat, Hammarskjöld served as the second Secretary General of the United Nations until his death in a plane crash while trying to negotiate peace in present-day Zambia. His journal, published as Markings, revealed the depth of his Christian faith.

September 19 – Psalm 77; Nehemiah 9:9-15; Romans 14:13-15:2

September 20 – Nelson Wesley Trout, bishop, died 1996 – Acts 20:17-35; Psalm 84; I Peter 5:1-4; Matthew 24:42-47 -- *A native of Ohio, Trout served parishes in several parts of the United States before being elected bishop of the South Pacific District of the American Lutheran Church, the first African American Lutheran to serve in such a capacity.*

September 21 – Matthew, Apostle and Evangelist – Ezekiel 2:8-3:11; Psalm 119:33-40; Ephesians 2:4-10; Matthew 9:9-1 -- *Matthew (or Levi) was a tax collector in Capernaum for the Roman government. Tax collectors were frequently despised for dishonesty and for assisting the occupiers. Jesus nevertheless showed love for them, and chose Matthew to be a disciple.*
