may your Spirit live in us


that we might live for others.


listing concrete ways of manifesting God's presence for the world, confessing God's activity beyond the church's work, and inviting blessing on the church's work on behalf of the gospel.

WEEKLY READINGS AND COMMEMORATIONS

September 11 – Psalm 119:65-72; Leviticus 4:27-31, 5:14-16; I Peter 2:11-17

September 12 – Psalm 119:65-72; Deuteronomy 17:2-13; Romans 13:1-7

September 13 – John Chrysostom, Bishop of Constantinople, 407 – Jeremiah 1:4-10; Psalm 49:1-8; Romans 10:11-17; Luke 21:12-15 – John was a priest in Antioch and an outstanding preacher. His eloquence earned him the nickname "Chrysostom" ("golden mouth"). Appointed bishop of Constantinople, seat of the empire, he criticized corruption in the court. As a result, he was exiled by the empress.

September 14 – Holy Cross Day – Numbers 21:4-9; Psalm 98; Philippians 2:6-11; John 3:13-17 -- Helena, mother of Constantine, made a pilgrimage to the Holy Land and found what may be the actual site of Jesus' crucifixion. Her son built two churches there, and the dedication of one of them gave rise to this celebration of our Lord's victory on the cross.

September 15 – Psalm 103:1-13; Genesis 41:53-42:17; Acts 7:9-16

September 16 – Cyprian, Bishop of Carthage, martyr, c. 258 – Psalm 116:10-17; I Peter 5:1-4, 10-11; John 10:11-6 -- Cyprian served as a bishop during a time of great persecution of Christians. He insisted on receiving back those who had left the faith under duress. He also provided medical care during a severe epidemic.

September 17 – Hildegard, Abbess of Bingen, 1179 -- Sirach 43:1-2, 6-7, 12, 27-28; Psalm 104:25-34; John 3:16-21 -- A mystic who was widely influential within the church, Hildegard advised and reproved kings and popes, wrote poems and hymns, and produced treatises in medicine, theology, and natural history. She was also a musician and artist.
