Worship Matters!

"...and on our behalf." This simple phrase is one that I would love to see us add to our weekly Rite of Corporate Confession that begins our worship. Over the years—and no matter what version of the words we use—we have confessed our sin of commission and omission, the things "we have done and left undone." But I wonder how often we include in our confession those things *done on our behalf*. Whether this is as an individual, a family, a congregation, a church, a society...however we would define "our," there is sin in the world being done and left undone on our behalf. The good news we received every time we join together in Confession and Forgiveness *or* in Thanksgiving for Baptism to begin our worship is a reminder that we are forgiven from God before we even know to ask and for things we don't even realize we've done. Nevertheless, it is important for us to consider before our approach to God in worship all those ways we have fallen short. In so doing, we realize all the more the good news of a God whose love brings us life despite it all. And for that, thanks be to God!

TFF. You may have noticed a rare hymnal listed in our second communion hymn. "TFF" means *This Far by Faith* which is one of the myriad worship resources of the ELCA. It focuses primarily on the worship tradition of the African Descent community, though there is much that is common between TFF and other ELCA worship resources. Some of our best loved "golden oldies" of hymns are found in TFF and when possible, we use them in our worship here at Luther.
