





# A MESSAGE FOR THE YOUNG AND YOUNG-AT-HEART

# WORD – "God speaks to us in Scripture reading, preaching and song."

Led by the Spirit, Philip encounters an Ethiopian official who is returning to his African home after having been to Jerusalem to worship. Philip uses their encounter to proclaim the gospel to him. Upon coming to faith in Jesus, he is baptized by Philip.

# FIRST READING:

A Reading from Acts 8:26-40

<sup>26</sup>An angel of the Lord said to Philip, "Get up and go toward the south to the road that goes down from Jerusalem to Gaza." (This is a wilderness road.) <sup>27</sup>So Philip got up and went. Now there was an Ethiopian eunuch, a court official of the Candace, the queen of the Ethiopians, in charge of her entire treasury. He had come to Jerusalem to worship <sup>28</sup>and was returning home; seated in his chariot, he was reading the prophet Isaiah. <sup>29</sup>Then the Spirit said to Philip, "Go over to this chariot and join it." <sup>30</sup>So Philip ran up to it and heard him reading the prophet Isaiah. Philip asked, "Do you understand what you are reading?" <sup>31</sup>The eunuch replied, "How can I, unless someone guides me?" And he invited Philip to get in and sit beside him. <sup>32</sup>Now the passage of the scripture that he was reading was this: "Like a sheep led to the slaughter, and like a lamb silent before its shearer, so he does not open his mouth. <sup>33</sup>In his humiliation justice was denied him. Who can describe his generation? For his life is taken away from the earth." <sup>34</sup>The eunuch asked Philip, "About whom, may I ask you, does the prophet say this, about himself or about someone else?" <sup>35</sup>As they were going along the road, they came to some water, and the eunuch said, "Look, here is water! What is to prevent me from being baptized?" <sup>38</sup>He commanded the chariot to stop, and both of them, Philip and the eunuch, went down into the water, and Philip baptized him. <sup>39</sup>When they came up out of the water, the Spirit of the Lord snatched Philip away; the eunuch


saw him no more and went on his way rejoicing. <sup>40</sup>But Philip found himself at Azotus, and as he was passing through the region he proclaimed the good news to all the towns until he came to Caesarea.

# **SECOND READING:**

A reading from 1 John 4:7-21

<sup>7</sup>Beloved, let us love one another, because love is from God; everyone who loves is born of God and knows God. <sup>8</sup>Whoever does not love does not know God, for God is love. <sup>9</sup>God's love was revealed among us in this way: God sent into the world God's only Son so that we might live through him. <sup>10</sup>In this is love, not that we loved God but that God loved us and sent the Son to be the atoning sacrifice for our sins. <sup>11</sup>Beloved, since God loved us so much, we also ought to love one another. <sup>12</sup>No one has ever seen God; if we love one another, God abides in us, and God's love is perfected in us. <sup>13</sup>By this we know that we abide in God and God in us, because we have been given of God's own Spirit. <sup>14</sup>And we have seen and do testify that the Father has sent the Son as the Savior of the world. <sup>15</sup>God abides in those who confess that Jesus is the Son of God, and they abide in God. <sup>16</sup>So we have known and believe the love that God has for us. God is love, and those who abide in love abide in God, and God abides in them. <sup>17</sup>Love has been perfected among us in this: that we may have boldness on the day of judgment, because as the Son is, so are we in this world. <sup>18</sup>There is no fear in love, but perfect love casts out fear; for fear has to do with punishment, and whoever fears has not reached perfection in love. <sup>19</sup>We love because God first loved us. <sup>20</sup>Those who say, "I love God," and hate a member of the community are liars, for

those who do not love a person, whom they have seen, cannot love God, whom they have not seen. <sup>21</sup>The commandment we have from God is this: those who love God must love the members of the family also.

Every branch that bears fruit my Father prunes to make it bear more fruit. <sup>3</sup>You have already been cleansed by the word that I have spoken to you. <sup>4</sup>Abide in me as I abide in you. Just as the branch cannot bear fruit by itself unless it abides in the vine, neither can you unless you abide in me. <sup>5</sup>I am the vine; you are the branches. Those who abide in me and I in them bear much fruit, because apart from me you can do nothing. <sup>6</sup>Whoever does not abide in me is thrown away like a branch and withers; such branches are gathered, thrown

into the fire, and burned. <sup>7</sup>If you abide in me and my words abide in you, ask for whatever you wish, and it will be done for you. <sup>8</sup>My Father is glorified by this, that you bear much fruit and become my disciples."

# SERMON






# COMMUNION





#### **Worship Matters**

The gospel text for the last three weeks of Easter can be found in John 14-17. These chapters are known as The Final Discourse. In them, we hear Jesus teaching his disciples the last things he will teach before being arrested in the garden. Having washed their feet after supper in John 13 and telling them to love one another as a sign of the covenant he makes with them—by this everyone will know that you are my disciples, he says—he spends some time explaining just what that means. For the next three Sundays, we will hear from Jesus in some of the most poetic (and sometimes confusing) images he gives us to explain what it means to be loved by God and to love as God has loved us. As we hear these passages, let us remember their context. We hear them, now, after the resurrection and empty tomb, after the ascension and Pentecost, after 2000 years of striving to live with Christ-like love. But for the disciples, Jesus is preparing them to witness his death and Passion. How do we carry both into our witness of who Jesus is for us?

#### **Readings and Commemorations This Week**

**April 29** – **Catherine of Siena, Theologian, 1380** – Psalm 36:5-10; I John 1:5-2:2; Luke 12:22-24, 29-31 -- This theologian was the first woman among Roman Catholics to receive the title "Doctor [teacher] of the Church." Catherine was a Dominican sister known for her mystical visions as well as her work on behalf of people who were poor and imprisoned.

**May 1 – Philip and James, apostles** – Isaih 30:18-21; Psalm 119:33-40; II Corinthians 4:1-6; John 14:6-14 -- *Philip was one of the first disciples of Jesus, and called Nathanael to "come and see." Little is known of James, the son of Alphaeus, called "the Less" to distinguish him from another apostle named James.* 

**May 2 – Athanasius, Bishop of Alexandria, 373** – Psalm 71:1-8; I John 5:1-5; Matthew 10:22-32 -- Best remembered for defending the teaching that Christ was fully God against those who taught otherwise, Athanasius was an influential church leader around the time of the Council of Nicaea. He was banished from Alexandria five times for his forthright views.

May 3 - Psalm 98; Isaiah 42:5-9; Acts 10:34-43

**Mary 4** – **Monica, mother of Augustine, 387** – Sirach 26:1-4, 16-21; Psalm 115:12-18; Luke 7:11-17 -- *Monica was married to a pagan husband who was ill-tempered and unfaithful, but whom she helped bring into the Christian faith. She repeated the influence on her son Augustine, who went on to become one of the greatest church teachers.*
