Stir up your power, and come! The psalmist's plea in Psalm 80:2 has become familiar to us in the Advent prayers. Isaiah wants God to rip the heavens open. Both cry out for an apparently distant, angry God to show up, to save, to restore. When we hear Jesus describing the coming of the Son of Man with stars falling from heaven, it can sound dire and horrible, not like anything we would ever hope for. But when we really look at the suffering of people God loves, we can share the hope that God would tear open the heavens and come.





³Grace to you and peace from God, our Father, and the Lord Jesus Christ. ⁴I give thanks to my God always for you because of the grace of God that has been given you in Christ Jesus, ⁵for in every way you have been enriched in Christ, in speech and knowledge of every kind— ⁶just as the testimony of Christ has been strengthened among you— ⁷so that you are not lacking in any gift as you wait for the revealing of our Lord Jesus Christ. ⁸God will also strengthen you to the end, so that you may be blameless on the day of our Lord Jesus Christ. ⁹God is faithful, by whom you were called into the partnership of the Son of God, Jesus Christ our Lord.

NICENE CREED

A Let us confess the faith of the Church:

2 We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen. We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father; through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven, was incarnate of the Holy Spirit and the virgin Mary and became truly human. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried.

On the third day he rose again in accordance with the scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life,

who proceeds from the Father and the Son,

who with the Father and the Son is worshiped and glorified,

who has spoken through the prophets.

We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic church.

We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins.

We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

As you return by the side aisles, please place your empty cup in the tray.


All are invited to the meal. If you would like to participate but not to receive the bread and wine, please cross your arms in front of you for a blessing from the pastor.

This hymn was originally written as an evening hymn for Advent between the 7th and 9th centuries. The text was originally translated in English by John Mason Neale, the prince of 19th-century translators, from the Latin Conditor alme siderum as found in the Sarum Breviary, an 11th-century rite from Salisbury.

This traditional tune from Wales pairs elegantly with a contemporary text by Mary Louise Bringle. While a new tune to Lutheran hymnals, its form with three lines being identical makes it easy to learn. The contrasting third line holds both the highest note and the high point of the melody. Both text and tune have a quietness about them. Notice the words "whisper," "slumber," "stirring, faint within," "drift away"—reminders that Christ comes in the quiet so that our hearts grow "soft" and "warm."





Worship

The Eucharistic Prayer for the season of Advent was composed by Gail Ramshaw, a liturgical scholar. About it, she writes: *This Advent Eucharistic Prayer is based on the O Antiphons. Sung in medieval monasteries December17–23 at evening prayer before and after the Magnificat, the antiphons used Old Testament images as descriptors of Christ.*

The first letters of the seven Latin words—

Sapientia (Wisdom),

Adonai(Lord),

Radix Jesse (Root of Jesse),

 $\overline{\mathbf{C}}$ lavis David (Key of David),

Oriens (Sunrise),

Rex Gentium (King of Nations),

Emmanuel (God with us)

--when read backwards, spell "Ero cras," "I will be tomorrow," that is, Christ will be here December 24. The final quatrain ("Come, Lord Jesus, be our guest") can also serve as meal prayer in the home.

Beginning with the new church year, which begins today, you will notice our prelude begins at 10:25 each week and flows into the 10:30am worship time. We hope that this will draw us together and into our time of worship. Please remember to be mindful of those around you and those worshiping at home by keeping conversations and visiting to the lobbies once the prelude has begun. Thank you.

A reminder that our livestream runs from the beginning of the prelude through the end of the postlude. To maintain a worshipful space for those joining from home, please remember to leave the chancel area (the area around the altar) clear until after the postlude.

READINGS AND COMMEMORATIONS

December 4 – John of Damascus, theologian and hymnwriter, c. 749 – Psalm 118:14-21; I Corinthians 15:12-20; John 5:24-27 -- A monk in an abbey near Jerusalem, John wrote many hymns as well as theological works. One of his works, The Fount of Wisdom, remained influential for centuries.

December 5 – Clement, Bishop of Alexandra, c. 210 – Psalm 34:9-14; Colossians 1:11-20; John 6:57-63 – *Titus Flavius Clemens, a cultured Greek philosopher, who was born about 155, after seeking truth in many schools, settled in Alexandira in Egypt, which was then the chief center of scholarship. He became the head of the catechetical school there and held this post until about 202. The exact date and place of his death are unknown. His career is a landmark in the history of the church, for he was the first Christian to make a systematic attempt to bring the treasures of pagan culture into the service of the church.*

December 6 – Nicholas, Bishop of Myra, c. 342 – Isaiah 10:33-11:9; Psalm 78:3-7; I John 4:7-14; Mark 10:13-16 -- Little is known about Nicholas, except that he was a bishop in present-day Turkey. According to legend, he was famous for his giving to the poor, and so has become a symbol of anonymous gift-giving. His name is listed among the bishops at the first ecumenical council in Nicaea where it is said he had a physical altercation with the heretic Arius. He sided with the "homoousios," meaning "of the same substance," belief of orthodox Christianity.

December 7 – Ambrose, Bishop of Milan, 397 – Wisdom 2:7-11, 16-18; Psalm 27:5-11; Luke 12:35-37, 42-44 -- While a governor of northern Italy, Ambrose was elected bishop of Milan on the same day he was baptized. He was a famous preacher, a writer of hymns we still sing today, and helped lead St. Augustine to faith.

December 8 – Psalm 85:1-2, 8-13; Jeremiah 1:4-10; Acts 11:19-26

December 9 – Psalm 85:1-2, 8-13; Ezekiel 36:24-28; Mark 11:27-33
