

A MESSAGE FOR THE YOUNG AND YOUNG-AT-HEART

WORD - "God speaks to us in Scripture reading, preaching and song."

Today's reading is part of a longer discourse in Deuteronomy, an updating of the law for the Israelite community as the people wait to enter the promised land. Here Moses assures the people that God will continue to guide them through prophets who will proclaim the divine word.

FIRST READING: Deuteronomy 18:15-20

A reading from Deuteronomy. Moses said: ¹⁵"The Lord your God will raise up for you a prophet like me from among your own people; you shall heed such a prophet. ¹⁶This is what you requested of the Lord your God at Horeb on the day of the assembly when you said, 'Let me not hear again the voice of the Lord my God or see this great fire any more, lest I die.' ¹⁷Then the Lord replied to me, 'They are right in what they have said. ¹⁸I will raise up for them a prophet like you from among their own people; I will put my words in the mouth of the prophet, who shall speak to them everything that I command. ¹⁹Anyone who does not heed the words that the prophet shall speak in my name, I myself will hold accountable. ²⁰But any prophet who presumes to speak in my name a word that I have not commanded the prophet to speak or who speaks in the name of other gods, that prophet shall die."

Paul is concerned about the way some Corinthian Christians use their freedom in Christ as license to engage in non-Christian behavior that sets a damaging example to other, impressionable believers. Christians have a responsibility to each other that their behavior does not cause another to sin.

SECOND READING: 1 Corinthians 8:1-13


Now concerning food sacrificed to idols: we know that "all of us possess knowledge." Knowledge puffs up, but love builds up. ²Anyone who claims to know something does not yet have the necessary knowledge, ³but anyone who loves God is known by God. ⁴Hence, as to the eating of food offered to idols, we know that "no idol in the world really exists" and that "there is no God but one." ⁵Indeed, even though there may be so-called deities in heaven or on earth— as in fact there are many deities and many lords— ⁶yet for us there is one God, the Father, from whom are all things and for whom we exist, and one Lord, Jesus Christ, through whom are all things and through whom we exist. ⁷It is not everyone, however, who has this knowledge. Since some have become so accustomed to idols until now, they still think of the food they eat as food offered to an idol, and their conscience, being weak, is defiled. ⁸"Food will not bring us close to God." We are no worse off if we do not eat and no better off if we do. ⁹But take care that this liberty of yours does not somehow become a stumbling block to the weak. ¹⁰For if others see you, who possess knowledge, eating in the temple of an idol, might they not, since their conscience is weak, be encouraged to the point of eating food sacrificed to idols? ¹¹So by your knowledge your weak sibling for whom Christ died is destroyed. ¹²But when you thus sin against your siblings in Christ and wound their conscience when it is weak, you sin against Christ. ¹³Therefore, if food is a cause of their falling, I will never again eat meat, so that I may not cause one of them to fall.

This cup is the new covenant in my blood, shed for you and all people for the forgiveness of sin.


Do this for the remembrance of me.

Receive the bread in your open palm, then hold your cup steady for the assisting minister to fill.



Today's Events

Annual Congregational Meeting will be held this morning following the 10:30am service. Annual reports from staff members, committee heads and other key members of the congregation will be available. The Annual Report has been emailed and paper copies are also available. Please join us in fellowship hall this morning as we look ahead to 2024.

Greeting cards can be found in the information rack located near the parlor area. A large variety of cards that will fit every occasion are available. Youth are offering these cards for \$1 each or 6 for \$5. Proceeds will benefit our youth.

Worship Matters

Our Gathering Hymn this week comes from hymnwriter Ray Makeever. A former pastor and long-time worship leader, Ray writes his music to be both singable and theologically sound. As we have begun each liturgy in the Season after the Epiphany, this song is one of light. However, Ray also makes the connection between Light and Baptism. Indeed, in the baptismal rite, the baptized is given a candle with a command to let their own light shine reflecting the very light of God. In that way, *Brighter than the Sun* speaks of our light and The Light, and asks for the Holy Spirit to help our lights burn brightly. This is a direct tie-in to our reading in Corinthians where Paul admonishes the Church to be mindful of how our actions are seen by others and to act in ways that promote the common good and the Way of Jesus.

During the Season after Epiphany, we are using the *Nunc Dimittis* (Latin: "Now dismiss") as our **Post-Communion Canticle**. This Gospel Canticle is the Song of Simeon, which the prophet sings while holding the child Jesus at the Purification in the Temple. Martin Luther added this canticle to the Communion service because, he explained, just like Simeon held the child Jesus in the Temple, in Communion we too hold Jesus in our hands. So, like Simeon, we can sing in prophecy, proclamation, and praise.

Worship

Our prelude begins at 10:25 each week and flows into the 10:30am worship time. We hope that this will draw us together and into our time of worship. Please remember to be mindful of those around you and those worshiping at home by keeping conversations and visiting to the lobbies once the prelude has begun. Thank you.

A reminder that our livestream runs from the beginning of the prelude through the end of the postlude. To maintain a worshipful space for those joining from home, please remember to leave the chancel area (the area around the altar) clear until after the postlude.

Ash Wednesday worship services will be held in our main church on February 14 at 10:00am and 7:00pm. Ashes will also be given throughout the day for those who would like them.

Christian Education

First Holy Communion will be offered on Sunday, April 14, 2024 during the 10:30am service. In preparation for First Communion two Saturday morning sessions will be held on April 6 and April 13 from 9:00am – 12:00 noon, including snack time. These 2 All-Family Workshops will be our preparation for the big celebration! Any family interested in First Communion should plan to attend both sessions. First Communion is open to all the baptized so any child and family are welcome if you're ready. However, families with children in grades 3-5 are strongly encouraged to participate if your child has not received First Communion yet. January 28 – **Thomas Aquinas, teachers, 1274** – Wisdom 7:7-14; Psalm 37:3-6, 32-33; I Corinthians 3:5-11; Matthew 13:47-52 – One of the most brilliant and creative theologians in the church's history, Aquinas worked to bring together scripture and the philosophy of Aristotle. A member of the Order of Preachers (Dominicans), Aquinas was also a hymnwriter.

January 29 – Psalm 35:1-10; Number 22:1-21; Acts 21:17-26

January 30 – Psalm 35:1-10; Number 22:22-28; I Corinthians 7:32-40

January 31 – Psalm 35:1-10; Jeremiah 29:1-14; Mark 5:1-20

February 1 – Psalm 147:1-11, 20c; Probers 12:10-21; Galatians 5:1-15

February 2 – **The Presentation of Our Lord** – Malachi 3:1-4; Psalm 24:7-10; Hebrews 2:14-18; Luke 2:22-40 – Forty days after the birth of Jesus we mark the day Mary and Joseph presented him in the temple in accordance with Jewish law. There they were greeted by Simeon, an aged priest who offered the song "Lord, now you let your servant depart in peace," as well as by the prophet Anna, who spoke of the redemption of Israel.

February 3 – Ansgar, Bishop of Hamburg, missionary to Denmark and Sweden, 865 – Isaiah 62:1-7; Psalm 96:1-7; Acts 1:1-9; Mark 6:7-13 -- A monk who helped bring Christianity to Scandinavia, Ansgar returned to Germany where he was named bishop of Hamburg. He is remembered for his love for poor people.
