A MESSAGE FOR THE YOUNG AND YOUNG-AT-HEART

WORD - "God speaks to us in Scripture reading, preaching and song."

Though God provides food and water for the Israelites in the wilderness, they whine and grumble. They forget about the salvation they experienced in the exodus. God punishes them for their sin, but when they repent God also provides a means of healing: a bronze serpent lifted up on a pole.

FIRST READING: Numbers 21:4-9

⁴From Mount Hor the Israelites set out by the way to the Red Sea, to go around the land of Edom, but the people became discouraged on the way. ⁵The people spoke against God and against Moses, "Why have you brought us up out of Egypt to die in the wilderness? For there is no food and no water, and we detest this miserable food." ⁶Then the Lord sent poisonous serpents among the people, and they bit the people, so that many Israelites died. ⁷The people came to Moses and said, "We have sinned by speaking against the Lord and against you; pray to the Lord to take away the serpents from us." So Moses prayed for the people. ⁸And the Lord said to Moses, "Make a poisonous serpent, and set it on a pole, and everyone who is bitten shall look at it and live." ⁹So Moses made a serpent of bronze and put it upon a pole, and whenever a serpent bit someone, that person would look at the serpent of bronze and live.

While we were dead in our sinfulness, God acted to make us alive as a gift of grace in Christ Jesus.

We are saved not by what we do but by grace through faith.

Thus our good works are really a reflection of God's grace at work in our lives.

SECOND READING: Ephesians 2:1-10

¹You were dead through the trespasses and sins ²in which you once walked, following the course of this world, following the ruler of the power of the air, the spirit that is now at work among those who are disobedient. ³All of us once lived among them in the passions of our flesh, doing the will of flesh and senses, and we were by nature children of wrath, like everyone else, ⁴but God, who is rich in mercy, out of the great love with which God loved us ⁵even when we were dead through our trespasses, made us alive together with Christ—by grace you have been saved. ⁶With Christ God raised us up and seated us in the heavenly places in Christ Jesus, ⁷ so that in the ages to come might be shown the immeasurable riches of God's grace in kindness toward us in Christ Jesus. ⁸For by grace you have been saved through faith, and this is not you own doing; it is the gift of God—⁹not the result of works, so that no one may boast. ¹⁰For we are what God has made us, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand so that we may walk in them.

To explain the salvation of God to the religious leader, Nicodemus, Jesus refers to the scripture passage quoted in today's first reading. Just as those who looked upon the bronze serpent were healed, so people will be saved when they behold Christ lifted up on the cross.

GOSPEL: John 3:14-21

Jesus said to Nicodemus who had come to him under the cover of night: ¹⁴"Just as Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness, so must the Son-of-Man be lifted up, ¹⁵that whoever believes in him may have eternal life. ¹⁶"For God so loved the world that God gave the Son, the only begotten one, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life. ¹⁷Indeed, God did not send the Son into the world to condemn the world but in order that the world might be saved through him. ¹⁸Those who believe in him are not condemned, but those who do not believe are condemned already because they have not believed in the name of the only Son of God. ¹⁹And this is the judgment, that the light has come into the world, and people loved darkness rather than light because their deeds were evil. ²⁰For all who do evil hate the light and do not come to the light, so that their deeds may not be exposed. ²¹But those who do what is true come to the light, so that it may be clearly seen that their deeds have been done in God."







Again, after supper, he took the cup, gave thanks, and gave it for all to drink, saying:





White grape juice is in pre-filled cups for those who cannot have alcoholized wine.


Gluten-free wafers are available for those who need them; please let the pastor know.



Worship Matters

Why aren't there responses to the Prayers of Intercession? The format of the Prayers during Lent is one that follows what is known as *bid* or *bidding* prayer. For each of the Intercessions we usually offer during this time, there is a bid for us to pray and then silence for us to offer our own prayers either silently or aloud. As we live into the Lenten discipline of prayer, this helps us to add our own prayers rather than simply having someone read intercessions for us to respond to. The hope is that this draws us into a more interactive intercession on behalf of our world.

Worship

Our prelude begins at 10:25 each week and flows into the 10:30am worship time. We hope that this will draw us together and into our time of worship. Please remember to be mindful of those around you and those worshiping at home by keeping conversations and visiting to the lobbies once the prelude has begun. Thank you.

A reminder that our livestream runs from the beginning of the prelude through the end of the postlude. To maintain a worshipful space for those joining from home, please remember to leave the chancel area (the area around the altar) clear until after the postlude.

Lent Opportunities

Worship services are held each Wednesday in Lent, February 21 – March 20 at 12:05pm in the main church. Pastor Jay will be preaching on the "The Seed of Joy". This midweek series will flow in tandem with the daily devotional *Tending Joy* that is available at the hospitality tables.

Lenten Luncheons are offered on Wednesdays in Lent; February 21 – March 20 at 12:30pm in fellowship hall. A home-cooked meal will fill you up for the day; cost \$8. The main dish for Wednesday, March 13 will be hamloaf. Steps in Faith, our evening Lenten gatherings, are held each Wednesday in Lent; February 21 – March 20. At 5:30 we gather for dinner; the main dish is provided, please bring a dish to share. A Bible lesson and a craft or activity will be held following our meal.

Walking is a simple form of exercise for many, but a Lenten walking practice can be a time for spiritual development. The main church is open each weekday thru Wednesday, March 27 from 9:00am – 2:00pm. We invite you take advantage of a comfortable place to walk and take those extra steps as a time for prayer or fellowship with a companion walker.

Christian Education

First Holy Communion will be offered on Sunday, April 14, 2024 during the 10:30am service. In preparation for First Communion two Saturday morning sessions will be held on April 6 and April 13 from 9:00am – 12:00 noon, including snack time. These 2 All-Family Workshops will be our preparation for the big celebration! Any family interested in First Communion should plan to attend both sessions. First Communion is open to all the baptized so any child and family are welcome if you're ready. However, families with children in grades 3-5 are strongly encouraged to participate if your child has not received First Communion yet. Readings and Commemorations This Week

March 10 – Harriet Tubman, Sojourner, 1919; Sojourner Truth, 1883; renewers of society – Wisdom 8:24-28; Psalm 146; Luke 11:5-10 -- Harriet Tubman, born into slavery, helped about 300 others to escape slavery until the institution was abolished. Sojourner Truth, whose birth name was Isabella, was freed after slavery was abolished, and discerned a call to be a preacher. Taking the name Sojourner Truth, she set out on an evangelistic journey, where people found her testimony to be deeply moving.

March 11 – Psalm 107:1-16; Exodus 15:22-27; Hebrews 3:1-6

March 12 – Gregory the Great, Bishop of Rome, 604 – I Chronicles 25:1b, 6-8; Psalm 57:6-11; Mark 10:42-45 -- Born into wealth and power, Gregory was for a time the chief administrator of the city of Rome. Giving this up for a life in the church, he was elected pope in 590. He influenced public worship through the establishment of a lectionary and prayers to correlate with the readings. Gregorian chant is named in his honor.
