





# **CONFESSION OF FAITH**

This day, as we contemplate the Sacred Mystery of the Trinity, we proclaim our faith with the words of the Apostles' Creed—the Creed into which we are baptized—and learn together from Luther's Small Catechism.

THE FIRST ARTICLE: ON CREATION

I believe in God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth.

What does this mean?

I believe that God has created me together with all that exists. God has given me and still preserves my body and soul: eyes, ears, and all limbs and senses; reason and all mental faculties. In addition, God daily and abundantly provides shoes and clothing, food and drink, house and farm, family, fields, livestock, and all property along with all the necessities and nourishment for this body and life. God protects me against all danger and shields and preserves me from all evil. And all this is done out of pure, parental, and divine goodness and mercy, without any merit or worthiness of mine at all! For all of this I owe it to God to thank and praise, serve and obey. This is most certainly true.

THE SECOND ARTICLE: ON REDEMPTION

I believe in Jesus Christ, God's only Son, our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried; he descended to the dead. On the third day he rose again; he ascended into heaven, he is seated at the right hand of the Father, and he will come to judge the living and the dead.

What does this mean?

I believe that Jesus Christ, true God, begotten of the Father in eternity, and also a true human being, born of the virgin Mary, is my Lord. He has redeemed me, a lost and condemned human being. He has purchased and freed me from all sins, from death, and from the power of the devil, not with gold or silver but with his holy, precious blood and with his innocent suffering and death. He has done all this in order that I may belong to him, live under him in his kingdom, and serve him in eternal righteousness, innocence, and blessedness, just as he is risen from the dead and lives and rules eternally. This is most certainly true.

THE THIRD ARTICLE: ON BEING MADE HOLY

I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting.

What does this mean?

I believe that by my own understanding or strength I cannot believe in Jesus Christ my Lord or come to him, but instead the Holy Spirit has called me through the gospel, enlightened me with gifts, made me holy and kept me in the true faith, just as the Spirit calls, gathers, enlightens, and makes holy the whole Christian church on earth and keeps it with Jesus Christ in the one common, true faith. Daily in this Christian church the Holy Spirit abundantly forgives all sins mine and those of all believers. On the last day the Holy Spirit will raise me and all the dead and will give to me and all believers in Christ eternal life. This is most certainly true. Amen.



# The earth is full of your glory. Amen.







#### Worship Matters!

We are using the east facing altar for our worship this summer. First, yes, even though *technically* the altar faces south, when an altar is built into one end of a church building along the main axis of the nave, it is facing *liturgical* east. Originally all churches had an altar that faced east. This was intentional as it faced (in most cases) toward Jerusalem. More importantly, it faced toward the rising sun—a reminder of our new life of resurrection through baptism. Until very recently (relatively in church years) almost all altars faced "the wall." Other than tradition, the reason for this is the idea that in worship all people—including the pastor—are facing in one direction. A brother in Taize phrased it as "we do not pray to one another, we pray to God." This is not to say that an altar table with the ability to gather all around it is wrong. In our evolution of liturgical and theological understanding, what we share in the Sacrament is less a sacrifice (in which case all people should face the same way with the sacrifice between themselves and God) and more a meal with Christ present in our midst so we gather *around* the Table. However, since we have *both* options at Luther, we are using the east facing altar for the summer as way of using both our tables, as well as considering these various theological ways of approaching worship and particularly the Meal. Note, however, that even when using the east facing altar, Pastor Jay recites the Word of Institution with the elements of the sacrament while facing the people. What happens at the altar is no secret, even if some of it is blocked by the pastor. We all have access to the altar and to our Savior who meets us there, beckons us to feast, and feeds us with himself. We will return to using the altar table in the autumn.

**Through the summer** we will share in *All Creation Sings* Setting XII of the liturgy. Composed largely by Anne Krentz Organ, this liturgy is unique in the liturgical settings in the ELW panoply of resources. There are two options for most of the liturgical texts: one, like we are sharing in worship this season to be used for usual services of Holy Eucharist and another with texts particularly appropriate for use at *evening* gatherings of Holy Eucharist. We have used many of the pieces of this setting before, and in this season we will use them all together.

A reminder that *All Creation Sings* (ACS) is the hymnal supplement to *Evangelical Lutheran Worship* (ELW), the official worship resource of the ELCA. Like *With One Voice* was a supplement to the *Lutheran Book of Worship*, ACS seeks to expand the worship offerings of the ELCA since the publication of ELW almost 20 years ago. It comprises some 200 new hymns (all written in the 21<sup>st</sup> century) and two full settings of the liturgy, one of which is the first time a bilingual service of Holy Communion can be found on the same pages of an ELCA worship resource.

About the Cover Icon: from Kelly Latimore, the iconographer: "Circling around" is all we can do. Our speaking of God is a search for similes, analogies, and metaphors. All theological language is an approximation, offered tentatively in holy awe. That's the best human language we can achieve. We can say, "It's like—it's similar to...," but we can never say, "It is..." because we are in the realm of beyond, of transcendence, of mystery. And we must—absolutely must—maintain a fundamental humility before the Great Mystery. If we do not, religion always worships itself and its formulations and never God." ~Richard Rohr, "The Divine Dance: The Trinity and Your Transformation" Commissioned by Mark Bozzuti-Jones.

#### From Pastor Gail Zackrison: A Conversation on Racial Justice

Dear Friends in Christ -

Several years ago I began a journey in learning about systemic racism and all the ills that go along with some folks "lording it over other" – 'cuz that's what it is. It wasn't the most fun journey – sometimes the learning hurts, but fortunately I encountered a group in the Northeast Ohio Synod that was intentional about learning and sharing, and <u>sharing</u> our hurts and learnings – without judgment. That group is black and white and clergy and lay. I'd love to start a group here in this synod, and since I'm a member here, this is the logical place. I will not be "teaching" anyone; I don't have all the answers; I'm still learning. But I do have materials or podcasts and other resources which we can start with, as well as our own learnings about "race".

And I don't see this group as being very regular in its meetings, certainly not weekly. Since I am available for pulpit supply in this synod, I won't even be here all the time. The group in Ohio meets once a month on Zoom (thanks to Covid!), and occasionally in person – which I don't attend. I think perhaps meeting after the second service to start with is a possibility, and then we can think about other times or places. I'll be "lingering" in the parlor after worship for the next 2 Sundays. Hope to see you there!

## **Readings and Commemoration This Week**

June 16 - Psalm 124; Proverbs 7:1-4; Ephesians 4:7-16

June 17 – Emanuel Nine, martyrs, 2015 – Isaiah 11:1-9; Psalm 91; 1 John 3:1-3, 18-24; Matthew 5:1-10 – On June 17, 2015, Clementa C. Pinckney, Cynthia Marie Graham Hurd, Susie Jackson, Ethel Lee Lance, DePayne Middleton-Doctor, Tywanza Sanders, Daniel Lee Simmons, Sharonda Coleman-Singleton, and Myra Thompson were murdered by a self-professed white supremacist while they were gathered for Bible study and prayer at the Emanuel African Methodist Episcopal Church (often referred to as Mother Emanuel) in Charleston, South Carolina. Pastors Pinckney and Simmons were both graduates of the Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary. A resolution to commemorate June 17 as a day of repentance for the martyrdom of the Emanuel Nine was adopted by the Churchwide Assembly of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America on August 8, 2019. Congregations of the ELCA are encouraged reaffirm their commitment to repenting of the sins of racism and white supremacy which continue to plague this church, to venerate the martyrdom of the Emanuel Nine with study and prayer.

June 18 - Psalm 124; Daniel 1:1-21; Luke 1:46b-55

**June 19 – Juneteenth --** Psalm 78:1-11, II Chronicles 7:14; Isaiah 30:25-26 – Juneteenth is a holiday that celebrates the end of slavery in the United States. It recalls how the states of Louisiana and Texas heard the news that President Abraham Lincoln had signed the Emancipation Proclamation on January 1, 1863. Slavery continued in those two states for more than two years after the proclamation was signed because the word had yet to travel there. Texas and Louisiana finally got the good news on June 19, 1865. Former slaves broke out in spontaneous celebration. Legend has it that the good word was spread by a black man who rode a mule from the east all the way to Texas. Historians credit General Gordon Grander, who arrived in Galveston, Texas, on June 19, 1865, with making the announcement. In any case, the announcement marked the end of slavery for the nation.

June 20 – Psalm 22:19-28; Isaiah 57:1-13; Galatians 3:15-22

**June 21 – Onesimos Nesib, translator, evangelist, 1931** – Isaiha 62:1-7; Psalm 48; Romans 10:11-17; Luke 24:44-53 – Onesimos was born in Ethiopia. Captured, enslaved, and taken to Eritrea, he was then freed by Swedish missionaries. He translated the Bible into his native Oromo and returned to preach there.
