



WORD – "God speaks to us in Scripture reading, preaching and song."

This reading from the Wisdom of Solomon, a deuterocanonical book of the Bible, echoes language of creation, of Proverbs 7's story of Woman Wisdom (Sophia), and also of the Prologue of John's Gospel.

It envisions Woman Wisdom at God's side as the helper and actor in the creation. This is the same way John envisions the Word (Logos) *who we celebrate as made flesh this day. In many*

ancient texts of the Church, Jesus is seen as the embodiment of Sophia. Whether we celebrate

Jesus as Sophia or Logos we celebrate today the birthday of the One who has been from everlasting.

FIRST READING: Wisdom of Solomon 9:1-6, 9-11

¹"O God of my ancestors and Author of mercy, who have made all things by your word, ²and by your wisdom have formed humankind to govern the creatures you have made, ³and oversee the world in holiness and righteousness, and render judgment as the soul of righteousness, and render judgment as the soul of righteousness: ⁴Give me the wisdom that sits by your throne, and do not reject me from among your children. ⁵For I am your slave, the child of your slave girl, one who is weak and short-lived, with little understanding of judgment and laws; ⁶for even one who is perfect among human beings will be regarded as nothing without the wisdom that comes from you. ⁹With you is Wisdom, she who knows your works and was present when you made the world; she knows what is pleasing in your sight and what is right according to your commandments. ¹⁰Send her forth from the holy heavens, and from your throne of glory send her, that she may labor with me, and that I may learn what is pleasing to you. ¹¹For she knows and understands all things, and she will guide me wisely in my actions and guard me with her glory."

What has come into being in the Word was life, and the life was the light of all people. ⁵The light shines in the bleakness, and the bleakness did not overtake it. ⁶There was a man sent from God whose name was John. ⁷He came as a witness to testify to the light, so that all might believe through him. ⁸John himself was not the light, but he came to testify to the light. ⁹The true light, which enlightens everyone, was coming into the world. ¹⁰The light was in the world, and the world came into being through him, yet the world did not know him. ¹¹He came to what was his own, and his own people did not accept him. ¹²But to all who received him, who believed in his name, he gave power to become children of God, ¹³who were born, not of blood or of the will of the flesh or of the will of a man, but of God. ¹⁴And the Word became flesh and lived among us, and we have seen his glory, the glory as of a father's only child, full of grace and truth.



NICENE CREED

- Siblings in Christ, as we ponder the infinite God entering our finite world, let us confess the faith of the Church:
- We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth,
 - of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father; through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven, was incarnate of the Holy Spirit and the virgin Mary and became truly human. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the scriptures: he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end. We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son, who with the Father and the Son is worshiped and glorified, who has spoken through the prophets. We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.







If you are not going to receive Holy Communion, but would like to receive a blessing, please come forward with your arms crossed over your chest.





<u>Worship</u>

The Eucharistic Prayer is another composition of Dr. Gail Ramshaw, liturgical scholar. This Eucharistic Prayer echoes Luke 2, John 1, and the psalms appointed for Christmas: 96, 97, and 98. Given the proximity of Christmas to the Northern Hemisphere's winter solstice, it also prays for the coming of spring.

About the cover icon: Red Letter Christians partnered with artist Kelly Latimore to create this new icon, "Christ in the Rubble," which illustrates the prophetic message that if Jesus was born today, he would be born "under the rubble." Kelly wants his art to be a 'holy pondering' - a process that potentially brings about a new way of seeing. Our hope is that this icon, "Christ in the Rubble", will create more dialogue among Christians in the United States during this holy season about the ways our beliefs and actions - or lack thereof - contribute to the violence we're currently witnessing in Gaza. How can we shape a culture of Christianity where love truly has no boundaries? How do we create a world where our poor, homeless, refugee, Palestinian Savior - born to a teenage mother and later condemned to death - would be cherished had he been born today.

Epiphany Service

All are welcome to attend the Erie Conference Epiphany Service with Burning of the Greens which will be held Saturday, January 6, 2024, 6:00 p.m. at Faith Lutheran Church, 5414 East Lake Road. Celebrate the Epiphany of our Lord together with a candlelight Eucharist, with Pastor Jay Mitchell preaching, followed by an outdoor burning of the Christmas greens. The Scandinavian custom of an Epiphany burning of the greens was introduced to Faith Lutheran by Pastor David Laakso; it has become a beloved local tradition. Refreshments and fellowship will follow in the social hall. Dress warm for the bonfire; you may also watch from the comfort of the social hall if you prefer. A simple house blessing liturgy will be available to take and use at home this Epiphany season. If you would like to bring Christmas trees or greens from home to add to the bonfire, please contact Faith Lutheran Church to let them know.

READINGS AND COMMEMORATIONS FOR THE 12 DAYS OF CHRISTMAS

December 25 – The Nativity of Our Lord, Christmas Day – Isaiah 52:7-10; Psalm 98; Hebrews 1:1-12; John 1:1-14 --As on the first day of creation, on this Christmas Day the Word illumines the world, shining forth to bring all things into being. Today we celebrate the incarnate Word, God becoming flesh to live among us in the person of Jesus Christ then and now. Emboldened by the good news of Christ's birth, along with the shepherds, Mary and Joseph, and all witnesses to the light of Christ, we declare to the world that we have indeed seen and been transformed by the arrival of "the salvation of our God." O come, let us adore!

<u>A Note from Pastor Jay</u>: The three days that follow our celebrations of Jesus' birth are the feasts of the three "Christmas martyrs." As we celebrate Jesus present on earth and what it means to be called to be disciples and witnesses (martyrion in Greek) of what he means in our lives, we contemplate the three kinds of martyrdom:

Stephen was a martyr of will and deed: He witnessed to Jesus and knew it could get him killed. He witnessed anyway. And he was killed for his witness.

John the Divine was a martyr or will but not of deed: He is believed to be the only one of the original 12 disciples to die of natural causes (though there are stories of his being spared of martyrdom on several accounts). This fulfills the Gospel of John when Jesus says, "If it is my will that he remain until I come, what is that to you?". He witnessed to Jesus knowing he could be killed. He witnessed anyway. He died of natural causes, though by tradition in exile on the isle of Patmos.

The Holy Innocents were martyrs of deed but not of will: Killed by order of King Herod who feared the birth of the "King of the Judeans" in Bethlehem, they did not witness to Jesus but were killed for his sake nevertheless.

December 26 – Stephen, Deacon and Protomartyr – II Chronicles 24:17-22; Psalm 17:1-9, 15; Acts 6:8-7:2a, 51-60; Matthew 23:34-39 -- Stephen was a deacon and the first martyr (protomartyr) of the church. He was one of those seven upon whom the apostles laid hands after they had been chosen to serve widows and others in need. Later, Stephen's preaching angered the temple authorities, and they ordered him to be put to death by stoning.

December 27 – St John the Divine, Evangelist – Genesis 1:1-5, 26-31; Psalm 116:12-19; I John 1:1-2:2; John 21:20-25 - *The son of Zebedee and brother of James, John was one of the twelve disciples and witness to the transfiguration. Tradition has named him also the writer of the Gospel of John, the three New Testament letters bearing his name, as well as Revelation.*

December 28 – The Holy Innocents of Bethlehem, martyrs – Jeremiah 31:15-17; Psalm 124; I Peter 4:12-19; Matthew 2:13-18 – *This day commemorates the young children killed by Herod in Bethlehem in his jealous attempt to murder the baby Jesus, a sobering reminder of the evil that led Christ to be born for our salvation.*

December 29 - Psalm 148; Isaiah 49:5-15; Matthew 12:46-50

December 30 – Psalm 148; Proverbs 9:1-12; II Peter 3:8-13

December 31 – Psalm 148; I Kings 3:5-14; John 8:12-19

January 1 – The Holy Name of Jesus – Number 6:22-27; Psalm 8; Galatians 4:4-7; Philippians 2:5-11; Luke 2:15-21 --By Jewish law, every baby boy was circumcised and named on the eighth day of life, so on the eighth day of Christmas the church celebrates this event in Jesus' life. The keeping of the covenant as well as Jesus' name are signs of God's salvation given to us through him.

January 2 – Psalm 110; Proverbs 1:1-7; James 3:13-18

January 3 – Psalm 110; Probers 1:20-33; James 4:1-0

January 4 – Psalm 110; Probers 3:1-12; James 4:11-7

January 5 – Psalm 110; Proverbs 22:1-9; Luke 6:27-31

January 6 – The Epiphany of Jesus – Isaiah 60:1-6; Psalm 72:1-7, 10-14; Ephesians 3:1-12; Matthew 2:1-12 -- The feast of Epiphany ("manifestation") concludes the Christmas season with a celebration of God's glory revealed in the person of Jesus Christ. In Isaiah and Ephesians, that glory is proclaimed for all nations and people. Like the light of the star that guided the magi to Jesus, the light of Christ reveals who we are: children of God who are claimed and washed in the waters of baptism. We are sent out to be beacons of the light of Christ, sharing the good news of God's love to all people.
