

THE PROCLAMATION OF THE NATIVITY OF THE CHRIST

P This twenty-fourth day of December, after ages beyond number had run their course from the creation of the world, when God in the beginning created the heavens and the earth and formed humankind in the divine image; long after the great flood, when God made the rainbow shine forth as a sign of the covenant; twenty-one centuries from the time the promise was given to Abraham and Sarah our forebears; thirteen centuries after Moses led the people of Israel out of Egypt and through the Sea dry shod and the prophet Miriam danced with tambourine in freedom on the safe side of the sea; eleven hundred years from the time of Ruth and Naomi, Deborah and the judges; one thousand five hundred ten years from the anointing of David as king, in the fulfilment of the times and years and months and days discerned by the prophets; in the one hundred and ninety-fourth Olympiad; the seven hundred and fifty second year from the foundation of the city of Rome; the forty second year of the reign of Octavian Augustus, the Caesar; while the whole world enjoyed a span of peace, in the sixth age of world, Jesus Christ, Eternal God and Child of the Eternal Creator, desiring to sanctify the world by most graciously and mercifully coming, being conceived by the Holy Spirit and nine months of growth having past in the womb of his mother the Blessed Virgin Mary, was born in Bethlehem of Judea as was prophesied of old. Now in our own time is the nativity of our Lord Jesus Christ, Eternal Word Incarnate, God made Flesh.


P For those communing at home: take, eat, drink: the Body and Blood of Christ for you.

WORSHIP MATTERS!

Where's the Advent Wreath? The keeping of time during the Advent season by lighting candles was an old tradition. Originally using wagon wheels or any other instruments of labor that were not used during the winter season, there was one candle for each day of Advent (24-28 depending on the year). Red candles for each weekday and white candles for each Sunday. Over time, there were myriad iterations of these calendars to count down (or up!) to Christ's birth. The idea is as the days grow shorter and the nights deeper and longer, we light candles in anticipation of the birth of the Light of the World. Once we enter into the Christmas season—as we do tonight—and celebrate the birth of the Light among us, we no longer keep track of time in the same way, we are too busy celebrating with all of the creation the light come into the world! We light all the candles around us, we carry candles against the dark, cold night, we shine lights in the trees themselves as the entire earth is alight with the glow from the manger bed. As such, we no longer have need to count the days and so the Advent wreath is put aside until our next season of expectation and longing.

Readings and Commemorations for the 12 Days of Christmas

December 25 – The Nativity of Our Lord, Christmas Day – Isaiah 52:7-10; Psalm 98; Hebrews 1:1-12; John 1:1-14 – *As on the first day of creation, on this Christmas Day the Word illumines the world, shining forth to bring all things into being. Today we celebrate the incarnate Word, God becoming flesh to live among us in the person of Jesus Christ then and now. Emboldened by the good news of Christ's birth, along with the shepherds, Mary and Joseph, and all witnesses to the light of Christ, we declare to the world that we have indeed seen and been transformed by the arrival of "the salvation of our God." O come, let us adore!*

<u>A Note from Pastor Jay</u>: The three days that follow our celebrations of Jesus' birth are the feasts of the three "Christmas martyrs." As we celebrate Jesus present on earth and what it means to be called to be disciples and witnesses (in Greek) of what he means in our lives, we contemplate the three kinds of martyrdom:

Stephen was a martyr of will and deed: He witnessed to Jesus and knew it could get him killed. He witnessed anyway. And he was killed for his witness.

John the Divine was a martyr of will but not of deed: He is believed to be the only one of the original 12 disciples to die of natural causes (though there are stories of his being spared of martyrdom on several occasions). This fulfills the Gospel of John when Jesus says, "If it is my will that he remain until I come, what is that to you?" He witnessed to Jesus knowing he could be killed. He witnessed anyway. He died of natural causes, though by tradition in exile on the isle of Patmos.

The Holy Innocents were martyrs of deed but not of will: Killed by order of King Herod who feared the birth of the "King of the Judeans" in Bethlehem, they did not witness to Jesus but were killed for his sake nevertheless.

December 26 – *The Second Day of Christmas* – Stephen, Deacon and Protomartyr – II Chronicles 24:17-22; Psalm 17:1-9, 15; Acts 6:8-7:2a, 51-60; Matthew 23:34-39 – Stephen was a deacon and the first martyr (protomartyr) of the church. He was one of those seven upon whom the apostles laid hands after they had been chosen to serve widows and others in need. Later, Stephen's preaching angered the temple authorities, and they ordered him to be put to death by stoning.

December 27 – *The Third Day of Christmas* – John the Divine, Evangelist – Genesis 1:1-5, 26-31; Psalm 116:12-19; I John 1:1-2:2; John 21:20-25 – The son of Zebedee and brother of James, John was one of the twelve disciples and witness to the transfiguration. Tradition has named him also the writer of the Gospel of John, the three New Testament letters bearing his name, as well as Revelation.

December 28 – *The Fourth Day of Christmas* – The Holy Innocents of Bethlehem, martyrs – Jeremiah 31:15-17; Psalm 124; I Peter 4:12-19; Matthew 2:13-18 – This day commemorates the young children killed by Herod in Bethlehem in his jealous attempt to murder the baby Jesus, a sobering reminder of the evil that led Christ to be born for our salvation.

December 29 – *The Fifth Day of Christmas* – The First Sunday of Christmas – I Samuel 2:18-20, 26; Psalm 148; Colossians 3:12-17; Luke 2:41-52

December 30 - The Sixth Day of Christmas Psalm 147:12-20; II Chronicles 1:7-13; Mark 13:32-37

December 31 – The Seventh Day of Christmas Psalm 147:12-20; I Kings 3:5-14; John 8:12-19

January 1 – *The Eighth Day of Christmas* – The Holy Name of Jesus – Number 6:22-27; Psalm 8; Galatians 4:4-7; Philippians 2:5-11; Luke 2:15-21 – By Jewish law, every baby boy was circumcised and named on the eighth day of life, so on the eighth day of Christmas the church celebrates this event in Jesus' life. The keeping of the covenant, as well as Jesus' name, are signs of God's salvation given to us through him.

January 2 - The Ninth Day of Christmas Psalm 147:12-20; Proverbs 1:1-7; James 3:13-18

January 3 – The Tenth Day of Christmas Psalm 72; Job 42:10-17; Luke 8:16-21

January 4 - The Eleventh Day of Christmas Psalm 72; Isaiah 6:1-5; Acts 7:44-53

January 5 – *The Twelfth Day of Christmas* – The Second Sunday of Christmas – Sirach 24:1-12; Wisdom 10:15-21; Ephesians 1:3-14; John 1:10-18

January 6 – The Epiphany of Jesus – Isaiah 60:1-6; Psalm 72:1-7, 10-14; Ephesians 3:1-12; Matthew 2:1-12 – *The feast of Epiphany ("manifestation") concludes the Christmas season with a celebration of God's glory revealed in the person of Jesus Christ. In Isaiah and Ephesians, that glory is proclaimed for all nations and people. Like the light of the star that guided the magi to Jesus, the light of Christ reveals who we are: children of God who are claimed and washed in the waters of baptism. We are sent out to be beacons of the light of Christ, sharing the good news of God's love to all people.*


