

P This twenty-fourth day of December,

to Abraham and Sarah our forebears;

thirteen centuries after Moses led the people of Israel out of Egypt and through the Sea dry shod and the prophet Miriam danced with tambourine in freedom on the safe side of the sea: eleven hundred years from the time of Ruth and Naomi, Deborah and the judges; one thousand five hundred ten years from the anointing of David as king,

in the fulfilment of the times and years and months and days

discerned by the prophets;

in the one hundred and ninety-fourth Olympiad;

the seven hundred and fifty second year from the foundation of the city of Rome; the forty second year of the reign of Octavian Augustus, the Caesar; while the whole world enjoyed a span of peace,

Jesus Christ,

Eternal God and Child of the Eternal Creator,

desiring to sanctify the world by most graciously and mercifully coming,

Eternal Word Incarnate, God made Flesh.





A MESSAGE FOR THE YOUNG AND YOUNG-AT-HEART (6:00pm)

WORD - "God speaks to us in Scripture reading, preaching and song."

This poem promises deliverance from Assyrian oppression, a hope based on the birth of a royal child with a name full of promise. While Judah's king will practice justice and righteousness, the real basis for faith lies in God's passion for the people: The zeal of the Lord of hosts will do this!

²The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light; those who lived in a land of deep darkness— on them light has shined. ³You have multiplied exultation; you have increased its joy; they rejoice before you as with joy at the harvest, as people exult when dividing plunder. ⁴For the yoke of their burden, and the bar across their shoulders, the rod of their oppressor, you have broken as on the day of Midian. ⁵For all the boots of the tramping warriors and all the garments rolled in blood shall be burned as fuel for the fire. ⁶For a child has been born for us, a son given to us; authority rests upon his shoulders; and he is named Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace. ⁷Great will be his authority, and there shall be endless peace for the throne and dominion of David. 




¹In those days a decree went out from Caesar Augustus that all the world should be registered. ²This was the first registration and was taken while Quirinius was governor of Syria. ³All went to their own towns to be registered. ⁴Joseph also went from the town of Nazareth in Galilee to Judea, to the city of David called Bethlehem, because he was descended from the house and family of David. ⁵He went to be registered with Mary, to whom he was engaged and who was expecting a child. ⁶While they were there, the time came for her to deliver her child. ⁷ And she gave birth to her firstborn son and wrapped him in bands of cloth and laid him in a manger, because there was no place for them in the inn. 8Now in that same region there were shepherds living in the fields, keeping watch over their flock by night. ⁹Then an angel of the Lord stood before them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were terrified. ¹⁰But the angel said to them, "Do not be afraid, for see, I am bringing you good news of great joy for all the people: 11 to you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, who is the Messiah, the Lord. ¹²This will be a sign for you: you will find a child wrapped in bands of cloth and lying in a manger." ¹³And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host, praising God and saying, ¹⁴"Glory to God in the highest heaven, and on earth peace among those whom God favors!" ¹⁵When the angels had left them and gone into heaven, the shepherds said to one another, "Let us go now to Bethlehem and see this thing that has taken place, which the Lord has made known to us." ¹⁶So they went with haste and found Mary and Joseph and the child lying in the manger. ¹⁷When they saw this, they made known what had been told them about this child, ¹⁸ and all who heard it were amazed at what the shepherds told them, ¹⁹ and Mary treasured all these words and pondered them in her heart. ²⁰The shepherds returned, glorifying and praising God for all they had heard and seen, just as it had been told them.

P Let us pray.





NOTES ON WORSHIP TEXTS THIS EVENING

The Proclamation of the Nativity of the Christ—or Christmas Proclamation—comes from the Roman Martyrology, the official listing in the early church of the commemorations, feasts, fasts, and festivals of the Church. In it, dates and places and people are named from the beginning of creation to the birth of Jesus. It should be noted that this is a proclamation of kairos (God's time) and not chronos (clock time), meaning that much of the history noted is not about particular days and years but about the continued work of God in the world through the Beloved of God until the birth of Jesus. The Proclamation situates the birth of Jesus in sacred history—creation, the Flood, the prophets, the kings. It also situates the birth of Jesus in secular history—noting the date of the founding of Rome, the Greek Olympiads, and the ruler of the Empire at the time. In this way, much like Luke's birth narrative that we will hear again tonight, the coming of God in the person of Jesus is seen as the summit of both sacred and secular history. The Incarnation of God in the Flesh is for us today as much as it was for the shepherds outside Bethlehem and the magi from unknown regions of the Gentile world. It is just as important today, and our proclamation just as needed, as it was the very first time the armies of heaven sang in the Bethlehem skies. We also need to be mindful in the 21st century that there is much missing from world history in the Proclamation. Besides just the historical events of the Bible and the Mediterranean, we can also note that when Jesus was born it was the dawn of the Kushan Empire in India, and during the Han Dynasty of China. It was at the twilight of the Kingdom of Da'Amat in Ethiopia and southern Arabia, and when the Mande people thrived in and around the city of Djenné in the Inner Niger Delta region of Mali. It was while the Nazca people flourished in Peru,

and the time when the Haudenosaunee, Mississauga, and Erie people—people of the Six Nations Treaty—thrived on the sacred ground of what we now call Erie, our home. Jesus was born in an occupied country 140 years after the Maccabean revolt that established a Jewish state free from Greek rule, and about 40 years after that free Jewish state fell to Rome. What we note as the "forty-second year of the reign of Roman Emperor Octavian Augustus" was for the Judean people the period of the Second Temple in Jerusalem. We should remember that in Jesus' lifetime, the "span of peace" that the Proclamation describes was actually Rome's imperial control over Jerusalem, Bethlehem, and all of Israel. Nevertheless, into this small town that still knows strife and war, Jesus comes. Come! Let us adore him!

The Eucharistic Prayer is another composition of Dr. Gail Ramshaw, liturgical scholar. This eucharistic prayer echoes Luke 2, John 1, and the psalms appointed for Christmas: 96, 97, and 98. Given the proximity of Christmas to the Northern Hemisphere's winter solstice, it also prays for the coming of spring.

READINGS AND COMMEMORATIONS FOR THE 12 DAYS OF CHRISTMAS

December 25 – The Nativity of Our Lord, Christmas Day – Isaiah 52:7-10; Psalm 98; Hebrews 1:1-12; John 1:1-14 – As on the first day of creation, on this Christmas Day the Word illumines the world, shining forth to bring all things into being. Today we celebrate the incarnate Word, God becoming flesh to live among us in the person of Jesus Christ then and now. Emboldened by the good news of Christ's birth, along with the shepherds, Mary and Joseph, and all witnesses to the light of Christ, we declare to the world that we have indeed seen and been transformed by the arrival of "the salvation of our God." O come, let us adore!

A Note from Pastor Jay: The three days that follow our celebrations of Jesus' birth are the feasts of the three "Christmas martyrs." As we celebrate Jesus present on earth and what it means to be called to be disciples and witnesses (martyrion in Greek) of what he means in our lives, we contemplate the three kinds of martyrdom:

Stephen was a martyr of will and deed: He witnessed to Jesus and knew it could get him killed. He witnessed anyway. And he was killed for his witness.

John the Divine was a martyr of will but not of deed: He is believed to be the only one of the original 12 disciples to die of natural causes (though there are stories of his being spared of martyrdom on several occasions). This fulfills the Gospel of John when Jesus says, "If it is my will that he remain until I come, what is that to you?". He witnessed to Jesus knowing he could be killed. He witnessed anyway. He died of natural causes, though by tradition in exile on the isle of Patmos.

The Holy Innocents were martyrs of deed but not of will: Killed by order of King Herod who feared the birth of the "King of the Judeans" in Bethlehem, they did not witness to Jesus but were killed for his sake nevertheless.

December 26 – Stephen, Deacon and Protomartyr – II Chronicles 24:17-22; Psalm 17:1-9, 15; Acts 6:8-7:2a, 51-60; Matthew 23:34-39 – Stephen was a deacon and the first martyr (protomartyr) of the church. He was one of those seven upon whom the apostles laid hands after they had been chosen to serve widows and others in need. Later, Stephen's preaching angered the temple authorities, and they ordered him to be put to death by stoning.

December 27 – John the Divine, Evangelist – Genesis 1:1-5, 26-31; Psalm 116:12-19; I John 1:1-2:2; John 21:20-25 – The son of Zebedee and brother of James, John was one of the twelve disciples and witness to the transfiguration. Tradition has named him also the writer of the Gospel of John, the three New Testament letters bearing his name, as well as Revelation.

December 28 – The Holy Innocents of Bethlehem, martyrs – Jeremiah 31:15-17; Psalm 124; I Peter 4:12-19; Matthew 2:13-18 – This day commemorates the young children killed by Herod in Bethlehem in his jealous attempt to murder the baby Jesus, a sobering reminder of the evil that led Christ to be born for our salvation.

December 29 – Psalm 148; Isaiah 49:5-15; Matthew 12:46-50

December 30 – Psalm 148; Proverbs 9:1-12; II Peter 3:8-13

December 31 – Psalm 148; I Kings 3:5-14; John 8:12-19

January 1 – **The Holy Name of Jesus** – Number 6:22-27; Psalm 8; Galatians 4:4-7; Philippians 2:5-11; Luke 2:15-21 – By Jewish law, every baby boy was circumcised and named on the eighth day of life, so on the eighth day of Christmas the church celebrates this event in Jesus' life. The keeping of the covenant as well as Jesus' name are signs of God's salvation given to us through him.

January 2 – Psalm 110; Proverbs 1:1-7; James 3:13-18

January 3 – Psalm 110; Probers 1:20-33; James 4:1-0

January 4 – Psalm 110; Probers 3:1-12; James 4:11-7

January 5 – Psalm 110; Proverbs 22:1-9; Luke 6:27-31

January 6 – **The Epiphany of Jesus** – Isaiah 60:1-6; Psalm 72:1-7, 10-14; Ephesians 3:1-12; Matthew 2:1-12 – *The feast of Epiphany ("manifestation") concludes the Christmas season with a celebration of God's glory revealed in the person of Jesus Christ. In Isaiah and Ephesians, that glory is proclaimed for all nations and people. Like the light of the star that guided the magi to Jesus, the light of Christ reveals who we are: children of God who are claimed and washed in the waters of baptism. We are sent out to be beacons of the light of Christ, sharing the good news of God's love to all people.*
