All the baptized have a calling in God's world. God calls not just pastors and deacons but also the youngest child, like Samuel. The story of the calling of Nathanael plays with the idea of place. Nathanael initially dismisses Jesus because he comes from Nazareth. But where we come from isn't important; it's where—or rather whom—we come to. Jesus refers to Jacob, who had a vision in a place he called "the house of God, and . . . the gate of heaven" (Gen. 28:17). Jesus says he himself is the place where Nathanael will meet God.

A MESSAGE FOR THE YOUNG AND YOUNG-AT-HEART

FIRST READING: I Samuel 3:1-20

¹Now the boy Samuel was ministering to the Lord under Eli. The word of the Lord was rare in those days; visions were not widespread. ²At that time Eli, whose eyesight had begun to grow dim so that he could not see, was lying down in his room; ³the lamp of God had not yet gone out, and Samuel was lying down in the temple of the Lord, where the ark of God was. ⁴Then the Lord called, "Samuel! Samuel!" and he said, "Here I am!" ⁵and ran to Eli and said, "Here I am, for you called me." But Eli said, "I did not call; lie down again." So, Samuel went and lay down. ⁶The Lord called again, "Samuel!" Samuel got up and went to Eli and said, "Here I am, for you called me." But Eli said, "I did not call, my son; lie down again." Now Samuel did not yet know the Lord, and the word of the Lord had not yet been revealed to him. 8The Lord called Samuel again, a third time. And he got up and went to Eli and said, "Here I am, for you called me." Then Eli perceived that the Lord was calling the boy. ⁹Therefore Eli said to Samuel, "Go, lie down, and if the Lord calls you, you shall say, 'Speak, Lord, for your servant is listening.'" So, Samuel went and lay down in his place. ¹⁰Now the Lord came and stood there, calling as before, "Samuel! Samuel!" And Samuel said, "Speak, for your servant is listening." ¹¹Then the Lord said to Samuel, "See, I am about to do something in Israel that will make both ears of anyone who hears of it tingle. ¹²On that day I will fulfill against Eli all that I have spoken concerning his house, from beginning to end. ¹³For I have told him that I am about to punish his house forever for the iniquity that he knew, because his sons were blaspheming God, and he did not restrain them. ¹⁴Therefore I swear to the house of Eli that the iniquity of Eli's house shall not be expiated by sacrifice or offering forever." ¹⁵Samuel lay there until morning; then he opened the doors of the house of the Lord. Samuel was afraid to tell the vision to Eli. ¹⁶But Eli called Samuel and said, "Samuel, my son." He said, "Here I am." ¹⁷Eli said, "What was it that the Lord told you? Do not hide it from me. May God do so to you and more also, if you hide anything from me of all that God told you." ¹⁸So Samuel told him everything and hid nothing from him. Then Eli said, "Let the Lord do what seems good to the Lord." ¹⁹As Samuel grew up, the Lord was with him and let none of his words fall to the ground. ²⁰And all Israel from Dan to Beer-sheba knew that Samuel was a trustworthy prophet of the Lord.

SECOND READING: I Corinthians 6:12-20



"All things are permitted for me," but I will not be dominated by anything. ¹³"Food is meant for the stomach and the stomach for food," and God will destroy both one and the other. The body is meant not for sexual immorality but for the Lord and the Lord for the body. ¹⁴And God raised the Lord and will also raise us by divine power. ¹⁵Do you not know that your bodies are members of Christ? Should I therefore take the members of Christ and make them members of a prostitute? Never! ¹⁶Do you not know that whoever is united to a prostitute becomes one body with that prostitute? For it is said, "The two shall be one flesh." ¹⁷But anyone united to the Lord becomes one spirit with the Lord. ¹⁸Shun sexual immorality! Every sin that a person commits is outside the body, but the sexually immoral person sins against the body itself. ¹⁹Or do you not know that your body is a temple of the Holy Spirit within you, which you have from God, and that you are not your own? ²⁰For you were bought with a price; therefore, glorify God in your body.







Christ is risen.


Christ will come again.

White grape juice is in pre-filled cups for those who cannot have alcoholized wine.


Gluten-free wafers are available for those who need them; please let the pastor know.








Worship Matters

During the Season after Epiphany, we will be using the *Nunc Dimittis* (Latin: "Now dismiss") as our **Post-Communion Canticle**. This Gospel Canticle is the Song of Simeon, which the prophet sings while holding the child Jesus at the Purification in the Temple. Martin Luther added this canticle to the Communion service because, he explained, just like Simeon held the child Jesus in the Temple, in Communion we too hold Jesus in our hands. So, like Simeon, we can sing in prophecy, proclamation, and praise.

Also, this Sunday's Eucharistic Prayer, found on pg. 67 in the front of the ELW, takes its inspiration from the Hymn *Lift Ev'ry Voice and Sing* a hymn important in the African American community often called The Black National Anthem. Given our proximity to the feast of Martin Luther King, Jr., the inclusion of this prayer reminds us of the ongoing work for justice in our world.

Worship

Our prelude begins at 10:25 each week and flows into the 10:30am worship time. We hope that this will draw us together and into our time of worship. Please remember to be mindful of those around you and those worshiping at home by keeping conversations and visiting to the lobbies once the prelude has begun. Thank you.

Readings and Commemorations This Week

January 15 – The Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr, Renewer of Society, Martyr, 1968 — An American prophet of justice among races and nations, King was an eloquent preacher, a leader of the nonviolent resistance to race-segregated society, and recipient of the Nobel Peace Prize in 1964. Born on this date, he was assassinated on April 4, 1968. [Note from Pastor Jay: technically, MLK should be commemorated on April 4, this death date like all other martyrs, but the ELCA has chosen not to do this.] -- Exodus 3:7–12; Psalm 77:11–20; Luke 6:27–36

January 16 – Psalm 86; I Samuel 15:10-31; Acts 5:1-11

January 17 – Anthony of Egypt, Renewer of the Church, c. 356; Pachomius, Renewer of the Church, 346 -- *One of the earliest of the Egyptian desert fathers, Antony gave away his sizeable inheritance and became a hermit. Later he became leader of a group of monks who devoted themselves to prayer, worship, and labor.* -- James 1:9–11; Psalm 91; Mark 10:17–22

January 18 – The Confession of St. Peter (beginning of the Week of Pryer for Christian Unity) — Today the church remembers the apostle Peter's great acknowledgement of Jesus as "the Christ, the Son of the living God." This festival serves as a fitting beginning to the week in which we particularly pray that all Christians might be united in faith and witness. — Acts 4:8-13; Psalm 23; I Peter 5:1-4; Matthew 16:13-19

January 19 – Henry, Bishop of Uppsala, Martyr, 1156 – When Erik, King of Sweden, determined to invade Finland for the purpose of converting the people there to Christianity, Henry went with him. Henry is recognized as the patron saint of Finland. -- Isaiah 49:1-6; Psalm 98; Acts 17:22-31; Matthew 28:16-20

January 20 – Psalm 62:5-12; Jeremiah 20:14-18; Luke 10:13-16
