
LIGHTING OF THE ADVENT WREATH (lighted by Sue Cappelletty and Karen Lundwall)

PUBLIC RECOGNITION OF BAPTISM

PRESENTATION

Sponsors, parents, and the person who was baptized in extraordinary circumstances gather with the ministers at the font. The presiding minister may address the assembly in these or similar words.

God, who is rich in mercy and love, gives us a new birth into a living hope through the sacrament of baptism. By water and the Word God delivers us from sin and death and raises us to new life in Jesus Christ. We are united with all the baptized in the one body of Christ, anointed with the gift of the Holy Spirit, and joined in God's mission for the life of the world.

The baptized person is presented.

▶ I present George Clair Hedlund to this community of faith.

The presiding minister announces the baptism that has taken place.

■ George was baptized with water in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit on November 24 at Lakeside Methodist Church in Dubois, Pennsylvania.

The presiding minister addresses parents or others who have brought a child for recognition of baptism.

- ▶ As you rejoice in the baptism of your child, you are also entrusted with responsibilities: to live with him among God's faithful people, bring him to the word of God and the holy supper, teach him the Lord's Prayer, the Creed, and the Ten Commandments, place in his hands the holy scriptures, and nurture him in faith and prayer, so that your child may learn to trust God, proclaim Christ through word and deed, care for others and the world God made, and work for justice and peace. Do you promise to help your child grow in the Christian faith and life?
- Response: I do.

PROFESSION OF FAITH

The presiding minister addresses the person whose baptism is being recognized as well as the parents and sponsors of a young child. The assembly may join in the responses.

- ▶ Do you renounce the devil and all the forces that defy God, the powers of this world that rebel against God, and the ways of sin that draw you from God?
- I renounce them.

The presiding minister addresses the candidates and the assembly.

- **P** Do you believe in God the Father?
- **G** I believe in God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth.
- **P** Do you believe in Jesus Christ, the Son of God?
- I believe in Jesus Christ, God's only Son, our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried; he descended to the dead.
 On the third day he rose again; he ascended into heaven, he is seated at the right hand of the Father, and he will come to judge the living and the dead.

- **P** Do you believe in God the Holy Spirit?
- I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting.

THANKSGIVING AT THE FONT

The presiding minister leads the assembly in giving thanks.


- **P** The Lord be with you.
- **G** And also with you.
- **P** Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.

G It is right to give our thanks and praise.

- P We give you thanks, O God, for in the beginning your Spirit moved over the waters and by your Word you created the world, calling forth life in which you took delight. Through the waters of the flood you delivered Noah and his family, and through the sea you led your people Israel from slavery into freedom. At the river your Son was baptized by John and anointed with the Holy Spirit. By the baptism of Jesus' death and resurrection you set us free from the power of sin and death and raise us up to live in you. We thank you that by your Holy Spirit, the power of your living Word, George Clair has been washed in the waters of baptism and has been given new life. To you be given honor and praise through Jesus Christ our Lord, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, now and forever.
- **G** Amen.

C Come, Lord Jesus.

▶ For the sick and suffering that they may know the peace of Jesus and the care of those who gather around them. For those whose names and needs we hold most dear: *here, you may offer names and need aloud or silently*. With the sick and suffering, we pray:

C Come, Lord Jesus.

▶ For those in need, the underhoused and underemployed, the lonely and forgotten, those who cannot look with hope to Jesus' coming and who cannot find joy in this season that they may be surrounded in their need. With those in need, we pray:

C Come, Lord Jesus.

▶ With thankfulness for all the baptized, especially George, those who have gone before us in lives of faith and holy living, and those whose faith was known only to you, we pray that we may be kept with Harry, Alan, JoAnn and all your beloved saints until we gather around your glory. With our faithful dead, we pray:

C Come, Lord Jesus.

▶ Come, Lord Jesus, and quickly! Hear our prayers and come with your healing, your grace, your peace in all the ways you see that we need.

G Amen.




THE COMMUNION



Today's Events

Why isn't Pastor Jay preaching from the pulpit? In this season—as we are reminded in the salutation at the readings, "Hear the One for Whom We Wait. December 12 - Isaiah 12:2-6; Amos 6:1-8; II Corinthians 8:1-15

December 13 – Lucy, martyr, 304 – Song of Solomon 8:6-7; Psalm 45; Romans 8:31b-39; John 3:17-21 -- Lucy was a young Christian of Sicily who was martyred during the persecutions under Emperor Diocletian. Her celebration became particularly important in Sweden and Norway, perhaps because the feast of Lucia (whose name means "light") originally fell on the shortest day of the year.

December 14 – Juan de la Cruz, renewer of the church, 1591 – Jeremiah 1:4-10; Psalm 46; I Corinthians 2:1-10a; Mark 10:35-45 -- John was a member of the Carmelite monastic order, and worked to reform it. His writings reflect a deep interest in mystical thought and meditation.
