

FIRST READING: Acts 4:32-35



The opening of this letter serves as a reality check. The reality of God is light, but our confessed reality has been sin. God cleanses us from our sinful reality through Christ's death so that we live in fellowship with Christ and walk in God's light.

SECOND READING: 1 John 1:1-2:2


¹We declare to you what was from the beginning, what we have heard, what we have seen with our eyes, what we have looked at and touched with our hands, concerning the word of life— ²this life was revealed, and we have seen it and testify to it and declare to you the eternal life that was with the Father and was revealed to us— ³what we have seen and heard we also declare to you so that you also may have communion with us, and truly our communion is with the Father and with Jesus Christ, the Son. ⁴We are writing these things so that our joy may be complete. ⁵This is the message we have heard from Jesus Christ and proclaim to you, that God is light and in God there is no darkness at all. ⁶If we say that we have communion with God while we are walking in darkness, we lie and do not do what is true; ⁷but if we walk in the light as God is in the light, we have communion with one another, and the blood of Jesus, God's Son, cleanses us from all sin. ⁸If we say that we have no sin, we deceive ourselves, and the truth is not in us. ⁹If we confess our sins, God who is faithful and just will forgive us our sins and cleanse us from all unrighteousness. ¹⁰If we say that we have not sinned, we make God a liar, and God's word is not in us. ^{2:1}My little children, I am writing these things to you so that you may not sin. But if anyone does sin, we have an advocate with the Father, Jesus Christ the righteous, ²who is the atoning sacrifice for our sins, and not for ours only but also for the sins of the whole world.

GOSPEL ACCLAMATION

Then the disciples rejoiced when they saw the Lord. ²¹Jesus said to them again, "Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you." ²²When he had said this, he breathed on them and said to them, "Receive the Holy Spirit. ²³If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven them; if you retain the sins of any, they are retained." ²⁴But Thomas (who was called the Twin), one of the twelve, was not with them when Jesus came. ²⁵So the other disciples told him, "We have seen the Lord." But he said to them, "Unless I see the mark of the nails in his hands and put my finger in the mark of the nails and my hand in his side, I will not believe." ²⁶A week later his disciples were again in the house, and Thomas was with them. Although the doors were shut, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you." ²⁷Then he said to Thomas, "Put your finger here and see my hands. Reach out your hand and put it in my side. Do not doubt but believe." ²⁸Thomas answered Jesus, "My Lord and my God!" ²⁹Jesus said to him, "Have you believed because you have seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have come to believe." ³⁰Now Jesus did many other signs in the presence of his disciples that are not written in this book. ³¹But these are written so that you may continue to believe that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God, and that through believing you may have life in his name.







The **Presque Isle ProMusica**, a community orchestra hosted by the Luther Memorial Concert Series will present a concert at Luther Memorial **this afternoon at 4:00**. The following is their statement about this concert:

Sunday's program begins with Gustav Holst's energetic St. Paul Suite, which he wrote for his pupils as a beloved teacher for 30 years at St. Paul's Girls' School in London. This will lead us into Grieg's charming and evocative Holberg Suite, actually "In Holberg's Time", each movement another echo of the dances of a real Baroque suite from the time of Norway's own Ludvig Holberg, philosopher and writer, almost an exact contemporary of Bach. The second half of the program will bring us Benjamin Britten's delightful dive into Baroque dances (with harmonies and rhythms never heard in the Baroque!), his Simple Symphony. The movements are 'Boisterous Bouree', 'Playful Pizzicato', 'Sentimental Saraband' and 'Frolicsome Finale'. The program concludes with Dvorak's luscious Serenade for Strings, which needs no introduction. The music brings us voices from 300 years of European music-making, all beautiful, with joyful celebration a constant theme. It promises to be a wonderful afternoon of familiar and heart-warming music, followed by one of our legendary receptions to gather, meet and greet the musicians, and celebrate the occasion, in the church parlor. Feel free to circulate this invitation as widely as possible – invite your friends and family; tell them to invite others; we want this to be a gala occasion, celebrating the return of your own hometown orchestra. As always, admission is free, and we'll hope for donations to make these concerts available to everyone.

Worship

Our prelude begins at 10:25 each week and flows into the 10:30am worship time. We hope that this will draw us together and into our time of worship. Worship Matters

Look! Here is water! During the Easter Season we begin our worship with a Thanksgiving for Baptism. Remembering Paul's teaching that in baptism we are joined to Christ's death and resurrection, we give thanks throughout this season of resurrection for the gifts of baptism. In the waters that washed over us, the Old Adam is drowned and the New Adam is brought to life with Christ's resurrection. This does not mean that there is not still a place for remembering our need for God's mercy and love as we are reminded in the Rite of Corporate Confession and Forgiveness. However, that forgiveness is rooted in these waters and in this season we give thanks for the waters themselves. We are reminded that in the waters washed over us, in the cross signed on us, and especially in the Meal where Jesus comes to us and bids us feast "for the forgiveness of sins," we are given the same forgiveness we seek in the Confession and Forgiveness. In this season, let us rejoice that we have been claimed by God, loved into life, and joined to Christ's death and resurrection!

Readings and Commemorations This Week

April 8 - Psalm 135; Daniel 3:1-30; I John 2:3-11

April 9 – Dietrich Bonhoeffer, theologian, 1945 – Proverbs 3:1-7; Psalm 119:89-96; Revelation 6:9-11; Matthew 13:47-52 -- Bonhoeffer was a German theologian who wrote profoundly, yet in an accessible manner. In the Second World War, he became a leader of the Confessing Church in Germany that resisted the Nazi movement. Linked to a plot to kill Hitler, he was hanged shortly before the end of the war.

April 10 – Mikael Agricola, Bishop of Turku, 1557 – Jeremiah 1:4-10; Psalm 46; I Corinthians 3:11-23; Mark 10:35-45 – Consecrated bishop of Turku, Finland, without the approval of the pope, Agricola began a reform along Lutheran lines. In only three years, he translated the New Testament and worship texts into Finnish, in the process establishing the rules of Finnish writing that are still used today.
