



The Lord answered, "For the sake of twenty I will not destroy it." ³²Then Abraham said, "Oh, do not let my lord be angry if I speak just once more. Suppose ten are found there." ⁶As you therefore have received Christ Jesus the Lord, continue to walk in him, ⁷rooted and built up in him and established in the faith, just as you were taught, abounding in thanksgiving. ⁸Watch out that no one takes you captive through philosophy and empty deceit, according to human tradition, according to the elemental principles of the world, and not according to Christ. ⁹For in Christ the whole fullness of deity dwells bodily, ¹⁰and you have come to fullness in Christ, who is the head of every ruler and authority. ¹¹In Christ also you were circumcised with a spiritual circumcision, by the removal of the body of the flesh in the circumcision of Christ; ¹²when you were buried with Christ in baptism, you were also raised with him through faith in the power of God, who raised him from the dead. ¹³And when you were dead in trespasses and the uncircumcision of your flesh, God made you alive together with Christ, having forgiven us all our trespasses, ¹⁴erasing the record that stood against us with its legal demands. God set this aside, nailing it to the cross. ¹⁵God disarmed the rulers and authorities and made a public example of them, triumphing over them in the cross. [16] Therefore, do not let anyone condemn you in matters of food or drink or of observing festivals, new moons, or Sabbaths. ¹⁷These are only a shadow of what is to come, but the body belongs to Christ. ¹⁸Do not let anyone disqualify you, insisting on self-abasement and worship of angels, initiatory visions, puffed up without cause by a human way of thinking, ¹⁹ and not holding fast to the head, from whom the whole body, nourished and held together by its ligaments and tendons, grows with a growth that is from God.]






THE COMMUNION



Worship Matters!

What is the purpose of a hymn? There are a multitude of types and genres of music that we share in worship together. We listen, we sing, we chant, we hum, we play, we clap, we tap our toes, we sway and dance. All of it is holy and good. Music has always been important to the Church and during the Reformation it became that much more important for many sects of the faithful. Luther himself used hymnody and music as a way to teach. Our Hymn of the Day this morning is one such hymn.

Hymns are a specific kind of music the Church uses to proclamation, praise, or prayer. It is a piece of music meant for the whole assembly to sing. It is addressed to God when we are using it for prayer and praise. It can be addressed (formally or informally) to others when we are proclaiming the Good News via song. Indeed, the Hymn of the Day which we sing after the sermon is a particularity of the Lutheran liturgy and the rubric is important. After the preaching, we "stand to proclaim the Word of God in song." Our Hymn of the Day this morning, Our Father, God in Heaven Above blurs some lines. It is a prayer, absolutely. It is addressed to God. It is entirely based on the Lord's Prayer. It is, though, also a teaching hymn. In praying the Lord's Prayer it also expounds on what each petition of the prayer means. Luther wrote such hymns to teach his congregations about the central things of our faith (We All Believe in One True God which is also found in our hymnals is his version of the Nicene Creed). This morning we sing the "abridged" version of this hymn. Pick up a red Evangelical Lutheran Worship and check out 746 and 747. The original version of this hymn was at least 9 verses long. Luther was never known for brevity!

As we sing this morning, let us pray but let us also listen to what we are singing as it expounds this central prayer of our faith for us.

Catechism is getting a revamp! It seems like there has been a change every year since Pastor Jay has gotten here. And there has But there has also been much in flux about ConfirCamp and other programming. A general schedule has been set: For students 7th grade through 9th grade, there will be four workshops offered throughout the year on the 2nd Sunday (in odd months: November, January, March, May) after the 10:30am worship service. In order to successfully complete confirmation classes, each confirmand must attend all four. However, the *same four* will be offered every year in slightly different orders to allow for flexibility in attending all four. There will also be a worship leadership and a biblical literacy component that will need to be completed along with the usual service hours. Finally, ConfirCamp is strongly recommended for *at least* one year between the end of 7th and beginning of 10th grade. Confirmation will still be held in the autumn of 10th grade to each confirmand.

Faith Formation Calendars for adults are available in hard copy on the Welcome Table near the Ramp Door. There are also electronic copies on the Facebook page and linked to the newsletters in August. Check out all the opportunities to gather for Adult Forum, Brown Bag Bible, and Bible After Dark (BAD) every month! The schedule will be slightly different this year for some, and there are resources available for others. So check it out now and let the church office know if you need to put in a reservation for any of the resources!

Trouble in Today's Texts

"How great is the outcry against Sodom and Gomorrah and how very grave their sin!" This morning's First Reading comes just before the much more widely known (and quoted) story of the destruction of Sodom and Gomorrah. We must remember what exactly is being talked about here in this story: First, the sin is known before anything happens in Sodom. Second, God relents from punishing for the sake of Lot and his family. Third, the sin of Sodom and Gomorrah is not what many people often credit. Rather, there is no distinct sin named in Genesis. However, according to the prophet Ezekiel the sins are named quite bluntly: "This was the guilt of your sister Sodom: she and her daughters had pride, excess of food, and prosperous ease but did not aid the poor and needy. They were haughty and did abominable things before me; therefore I removed them when I saw it." (Ezekiel 16:49-50) There is something for us to consider in the 21st century when we speak of the sin of Sodom. It is pride, excess, and haughtiness. These in and of themselves are numerously called abominations by God throughout scripture. Additionally, they did nothing for the poor and those in need. Isaiah 3 seems to confirm this "It is you [who are like Sodom] who have devoured the vineyard; the spoil of the poor is in your houses. What do you mean by crushing my people, by grinding the face of the poor?' says the Lord God of hosts."

This week, however, we are not called to focus on the sin of Sodom (though that is how the reading starts) but rather on the prayerful relationship between God and Abraham. Abraham is able to haggle with God, to explain and ask and argue...and receive. And that is a beautiful thing we are called to remember. Just something to ponder this week.

Readings and Commemoration This Week

July 28 – Johann Sebastian Bach, 1750; Heinrich Schutz, 1672; George Frederick Handel, 1759; musicians and hymnwriters – Psalm 55:16-23; Esther 5:1-14; Colossians 2:16-3:1 – These three German-born musicians have done much to enrich the life of the church. Schütz was an early master who focused on settings of biblical texts. Bach wrote over 300 cantatas along with works for organ and instrumental pieces, and has been called the "fifth evangelist" for the way he proclaimed the gospel in music. Handel's great work, Messiah, is a setting of scriptural texts.

July 29 – Mary, Martha, and Lazarus of Bethany <u>OR</u> Olad, King of Norward, martyr, 1030 – Psalm 55:16-23; Esther 6:1-7:6; Romans 9:30-10:4 -- Friends of Jesus, Mary and Martha are remembered for the hospitality of their home that they offered him—Martha focused on serving their guest, and Mary on listening to him. Their brother Lazarus was raised from the dead as a sign of the greater resurrection to come. <u>OR</u> Considered the patron saint of Norway, Olaf went from a life of piracy to becoming Christian and declaring himself king of Norway. He revised the laws and tried to administer them fairly. Driven from Norway in a rebellion, he was killed in battle trying to regain his kingdom.

July 31 – Psalm 49:1-12; Proverbs 23:1-11; Romans 11:33-36
