

MESSAGE FOR THE YOUNG AND YOUNG-AT-HEART

WORD

God speaks to us in Scripture reading, preaching and song.

FIRST READING: II Kings 2:1-15

² Now when the Lord was about to take Elijah up to heaven by a whirlwind, Elijah and Elisha were on their way from Gilgal. ² Elijah said to Elisha, "Stay here, for the Lord has sent me as far as Bethel." But Elisha said, "As the Lord lives and as you yourself live, I will not leave you." So they went down to Bethel. ³ The company of prophets who were in Bethel came out to Elisha and said to him, "Do you know that today the Lord will take your master away from you?" And he said, "Yes, I know; keep silent." ⁴ Elijah said to him, "Elisha, stay here, for the Lord has sent me to Jericho." But he said, "As the Lord lives and as you yourself live, I will not leave

you." So they came to Jericho. ⁵ The company of prophets who were at Jericho drew near to Elisha and said to him, "Do you know that today the Lord will take your master away from you?" And he answered, "Yes, I know; keep silent." ⁶ Then Elijah said to him, "Stay here, for the Lord has sent me to the Jordan." But he said, "As the Lord lives and as you yourself live, I will not leave you." So the two of them went on. ⁷ Fifty men of the company of prophets also went and stood at some distance from them, as they both were standing by the Jordan. ⁸ Then Elijah took his mantle and rolled it up and struck the water; the water was parted to the one side and to the other, and the two of them crossed on dry ground. ⁹ When they had crossed, Elijah said to Elisha, "Tell me what I may do for you before I am taken from you." Elisha said, "Please let me inherit a double share of your spirit." ¹⁰ He responded, "You have asked a hard thing, yet if you see me as I am being taken from you, it will be granted you; if not, it will not." ¹¹ As they continued walking and talking, a chariot of fire and horses of fire separated the two of them, and Elijah ascended in a whirlwind into heaven. 12 Elisha kept watching and crying out, "Father, father! The chariots of Israel and its horsemen!" But when he could no longer see him, he grasped his own clothes and tore them in two pieces. ¹³ He picked up the mantle of Elijah that had fallen from him and went back and stood on the bank of the Jordan. ¹⁴ He took the mantle of Elijah that had fallen from him and struck the water. He said, "Where is the Lord, the God of Elijah? Where is he?" He struck the water again, and the water was parted to the one side and to the other, and Elisha crossed over. ¹⁵ When the company of prophets who were at Jericho saw him at a distance, they declared, "The spirit of Elijah rests on Elisha." They came to meet him and bowed to the ground before him.

Worship *Matters!*

Seven weeks seems like a lot at the beginning...and then once we get into the swing of things the Easter season doesn't seem all that long. Well, until we hit Sunday 7. Jesus has ascended. Isn't that the end of the Easter season? We celebrated on Thursday (day 40), what're we doing still celebrating Easter? So, the season of Easter is long—the longest of our nongreen seasons, actually—and it's long for a reason. It should get mundane. Not every Sunday of Easter should be full of trumpets and blowout celebrations. Because Easter is our way of life. We are Easter people. We proclaim Christ crucified, yes, but also that death was not the end of the story—nor is it in the world today. So we continue to celebrate. Even when the season seems like it should be over. Because Jesus leaving the earth in the Ascension is not the culmination of the Resurrection season. Rather, the coming of the Spirit upon the Church at Pentecost is such a fulfilment of everything Jesus has promised. Jesus does not leave us orphaned (though these ten days can sometimes feel like that after the Ascension. We are not orphaned because the Spirit has been outpoured upon the Church and all of the baptized. So we stay here. We continue the celebration. We allow Resurrection to steep into our bones that we might live it every day. So while today may be a little quieter. While the celebration may not be as boisterous as it was 7 weeks ago. It is nevertheless the cry of the Church: Alleluia! Christ is risen!

Erie Lutheran Conference



The Erie Lutheran Conference—17 congregations in Erie County—is looking toward the future of ministry in our area. Serving in our conference are only four full-time equivalent pastors. In 5-10, the number of full time pastors (not retired) will very likely be only 2. Readings and Commemorations This Week

- **June 1 Justin, martyr at Rome, 165** Psalm 16:5-11; I Corinthians 1:18-25; John 12:44-50 Born of pagan parents, Justin was influenced by an elderly Christian in Ephesus. He became a teacher of philosophy and the Christian faith. Jailed for practicing an unauthorized religion, he refused to renounce his faith and was beheaded.
- June 2 Psalm 29; Exodus 40:16-38; Acts 16:35-40
- June 3 The Martyrs of Uganda, 1886 Psalm 138; Hebrews 10:32-39; Matthew 24:9-14 -- On June 3, 1886, thirty-two young men were burned to death for refusing to renounce Christianity. The confident manner in which these Christians went to their deaths contributed to a much stronger Christian presence in Uganda. -- OR John XXIII, Bishop of Rome, 1963 Ezekiel 34:11-16; Psalm 84; I Peter 5:1-4; John 21:15-17 -- When elected pope, the former Angelo Roncalli was expected to be a short-term caretaker. He showed great spirit, though, and convened the Second Vatican Council which helped bring great changes to Roman Catholic and other churches.

- **June 5 Boniface, Bishop of Mainz, missionary to Germany, martyr, 754** Psalm 115:1-8; Acts 20:17-28; Luke 24:44-53 -- Boniface was a native of England who became a Benedictine monk and was called to missionary work among the Vandal tribes of Germany. With fellow workers he established churches and schools, and he also worked to reform the church.
- **June 6** Psalm 104:24-34, 35b; Isaiah 32:11-17; Galatians 5:16-25
- June 7 VIGIL OF PENTECOST Exodus 19:1-9a, Psalm 33:12-22; Romans 8:14-17, 22-27; John 7:37-39 <u>OR</u> Seattle, chief of the Duwamish Confederacy, 1866 Micah 6:6-8; Psalm 19; I Corinthians 1:26-31; Luke 6:20-23 -- Noah Seattle led a coalition of tribes, and convinced them to live peacefully with encroaching white settlers. When he became a Roman Catholic, he held morning and evening prayer with his tribe. The city of Seattle is named for him.
