



The author of this hymn was a 20<sup>th</sup> century woman of letters best-known for her 1940 novel Mrs. Miniver. The tune is named after a hill in County Meath where St. Patrick is said to have challenged King Loegaine by fighting the Easter Eve fire. It appeared in several early 20<sup>th</sup>-century collections where it is attributed as an Irish folk tune.

<sup>34</sup>Laban received a visitor who said, "I am Abraham's servant. <sup>35</sup>The Lord has greatly blessed my master, and he has become wealthy; the Lord has given him flocks and herds, silver and gold, male and female slaves, camels and donkeys. <sup>36</sup>And Sarah my master's wife bore a son to my master when she was old, and Abraham has given him all that he has. <sup>37</sup>My master made me swear, saying, 'You shall not take a wife for my son from the daughters of the Canaanites in whose land I live, <sup>38</sup>but you shall go to my father's house, to my kindred, and get a wife for my son.' <sup>42</sup>"I came today to the spring and said, 'O Lord, God of my master Abraham, if now you will only make successful the way I am going! <sup>43</sup>I am standing here by the spring of water; let the young woman who comes out to draw, to whom I shall say, "Please give me a little water from your jar to drink," <sup>44</sup>and who will say to me, "Drink, and I will draw for your camels also"— let her be the woman whom the Lord has ▶

appointed for my master's son.' 45" Before I had finished speaking in my heart, there was Rebekah coming out with her water jar on her shoulder, and she went down to the spring and drew. I said to her, 'Please let me drink.' <sup>46</sup>She quickly let down her jar from her shoulder and said, 'Drink, and I will also water your camels.' So I drank, and she also watered the camels. <sup>47</sup>Then I asked her, 'Whose daughter are you?' She said, 'The daughter of Bethuel, Nahor's son, whom Milcah bore to him.' So I put the ring on her nose and the bracelets on her arms. <sup>48</sup>Then I bowed my head and worshiped the Lord and blessed the Lord, the God of my master Abraham, who had led me by the right way to obtain the daughter of my master's kinsman for his son. <sup>49</sup>Now then, if you will deal loyally and truly with my master, tell me; and if not, tell me, so that I may turn either to the right hand or to the left." <sup>58</sup>And they called Rebekah, and said to her, "Will you go with this man?" She said, "I will." <sup>59</sup>So they sent away their sister Rebekah and her nurse along with Abraham's servant and his men. <sup>60</sup>And they blessed Rebekah and said to her, "May you, our sister, become thousands of myriads; may your offspring gain possession of the gates of their foes." 61 Then Rebekah and her maids rose up, mounted the camels, and followed the man, and the servant took Rebekah and went his way. 62Now Isaac had come from Beer-lahai-roi and was settled in the Negeb. <sup>63</sup>Isaac went out in the evening to walk in the field, and looking up, he saw camels coming. <sup>64</sup>And Rebekah looked up, and when she saw Isaac, she slipped quickly from the camel <sup>65</sup>and said to the servant, "Who is the man over there, walking in the field to meet us?" The servant said, "It is my master." So she took her veil and covered herself. <sup>66</sup>And the servant told Isaac all the things that he had done. <sup>67</sup>Then Isaac brought her into his mother Sarah's tent. He took Rebekah, and she became his wife, and he loved her. So Isaac was comforted after his mother's death.

As you return by the side aisles, please place your empty cup in the tray.


All are invited to the meal. If you would like to participate but not to receive the bread and wine, please cross your arms in front of you for a blessing from the pastor.
