
RITE OF HEALING

By the tender touch and gracious working of your care, protect and comfort us, nourish and teach us, and unite us with you and to one another.

Until the whole communion of saints is lovingly hidden in you, we join with Mary, your mother, Elizabeth, John, Jiri, Donald, Phil, and Cindy in hope, in praise, and thanksgiving that in you **All shall be well, and all manner of things shall be well.**







Worship Matters!

Why do we share in Healing Services? There are a multitude of reasons that the people of God gather together to pray for healing and wholeness. We are told about such gatherings and such prayers from the very earliest days of the Church. Peter and Paul are both credited with healings in the name of Jesus. James tells his community: "^{5:13} Are any among you suffering? They should pray. Are any cheerful? They should sing songs of praise. ¹⁴ Are any among you sick? They should call for the elders of the church and have them pray over them, anointing them with oil in the name of the Lord. ¹⁵ The prayer of faith will save the sick, and the Lord will raise them up, and anyone who has committed sins will be forgiven." When Justin Martyr writes about the weekly gatherings of the Church for worship he makes sure to include that prayers are made for the sick and suffering and that a share of whatever is gathered is distributed by deacons to those who are not able to be part of the Sunday Assembly.

The order for healing is an expression in worship of the church's ministry of healing. Here all who sense the need for God's healing in any aspect of their lives may join in prayer for others and themselves. Here each person may come to receive a word of blessing and prayer. Here each one may also receive a physical gesture of healing: the laying on of hands accompanied by anointing with oil. These signs, first given in baptism, tell us again that we are sealed by the Holy Spirit and marked forever with the cross of Christ, who is health and salvation for the whole world.

In its ministry of healing, the church <u>does not</u> replace the gifts of God that come through the scientific and medical communities nor does it promise a cure. Rather, the church offers and celebrates gifts such as these: God's presence with strength and comfort in time of suffering, God's promise of wholeness and peace, and God's love embodied in the community of faith.

Erie Lutheran Conference



The Erie Lutheran Conference—17 congregations in Erie County—is looking toward the future of ministry in our area. Serving in our conference are only four full-time equivalent pastors. And of the 17 congregations, only 3 have a full time pastor (the other FTE pastor is shared between two congregations). In 5-10, the number of full time pastors (not retired) will very likely be only 2. This is not a reason to fear or fret but a reason to open our hearts, minds, eyes, and ears to the various ways that God is calling us into the future! The Church of Jesus will stand the tests of time…whether it looks like it does today or not is only known to Jesus. As part of this planning and dreaming, folks

have gotten together as a taskforce to consider models of collaborative ministry in our area. But this is not work just for a few people sometimes, but work that we are all called to do in God's future. In our planning and dreaming, we are looking toward what ministry looks like years down the road. As part of this dreaming and planning, YOU are invited to fill out a survey to assess the positions, feelings, hopes, and dreams of the Lutherans in Erie County. Readings and Commemoration This Week

May 26 - Psalm 93; I Chronicles 12:16-22; Revelation 21:5-14

May 27 – John Calvin, renewer of the church, 1564 – Jeremiah 1:4-10; Psalm 8; Romans 8:28-30; John 15:1-11 – *Gifted both as a systematic theologian and as an interpreter of scriptures, Calvin embraced the Reformation, and as a preacher in Geneva, Switzerland, brought a theocratic government to it. He is regarded as the father of the Reformed churches.*

May 28 - Psalm 93; II Chronicles 34:20-33; Luke 2:25-38

May 29 – THE ASCENSION OF OUR LORD <u>*OR*</u> **Jiřī Tranovský, hymnwriter, 1637** – II Chronicles 20:20-21; Psalm 96; Ephesians 5:18b-20; Matthew 13:44-52 -- Tranovský is considered to be the father of Slovak hymnody as well as an important reformer of the Slavic church. He translated the Augsburg Confession (the basis of Lutheran teachings) and published a collection of Slovak hymns.

May 30 – Psalm 97; Exodus 33:12-17; Revelation 22:6-9

May 31 – THE VISITATION OF MARY TO ELIZABETH – I Samuel 2:1-10; Psalm 113; Romans 12:9-16b; Luke 1:39-57 --This festival marks the occasion when Mary, pregnant with Jesus, visited her cousin Elizabeth who was herself pregnant with John. Elizabeth pronounced Mary "blessed among women," and Mary responded with the song called the Magnificat.
