Friendship captures the love, the joy, the deep mutuality of the relationship into which Christ invites us. The Greeks believed that true friends are willing to die for each other. This is the mutual love of Christian community commanded by Christ and enabled by the Spirit.

About our guest preacher: Dr. Smallwood has served as Postdoctoral Fellow and Associate Director of the Public Theology and Racial Justice Collaborative at Vanderbilt Divinity School since 2017. She has taught at Lancaster Theological Seminary in Pennsylvania, Religious Freedom Center in Washington, D.C., Chicago Theological Seminary and Philander Smith College in Little Rock, AR. She began her legal career with Legal Services of the Southern Piedmont in Charlotte, NC, where she also worked as a staff attorney for the Children's Law Center. In 1989, she served as an Assistant District Attorney until she commenced her private practice that spanned more than two decades. Dr. Smallwood's Ph.D. dissertation was entitled, The Leprosy Effect: A Queer Womanist Pastoral Care Model. Her areas of specialty are Womanist and Feminist Theology and Ethics; Black Church Tradition; Race, Gender and Sexuality; Emmanuel Levinas; Africana Pastoral Theology; and 20th century Theology; Comprehensive Examinations: Womanist and Feminist Theology and Ethics; Black Church Tradition: Race, Gender and Sexuality; Emmanuel Levinas; Africana Pastoral Theology; 20th c. Theology, Ethnography, Spanish, French." Dr. Smallwood was licensed and ordained to public ministry while serving Mount Olive Missionary Baptist Church in Lewiston, NC. She is a member at New Covenant Christian Church in Nashville, TN. She has published extensively, including book chapters "Race, Law, and Religious Freedom," in African Americans and Religious Freedom: New Perspectives for Congregations and Communities, "Who Defines the Religious Narrative? The Old Guard Meets the Avant-garde in Nashville—The 'It' City," in The Routledge Handbook of Religion and Cities, and is currently working on a book under review for publication, The Bully Pulpit: Queer and Black in Church. She has presented numerous papers and lectures and served as a panelist at Morgan State University, Samuel DeWitt Proctor Conference, Vanderbilt University, Children's Defense Fund Proctor Conference, Chicago Theological Seminary and Oxford University, among others.

Worship Matters

Today, we (finally) bless our Green Space because this week we mark the Rogation Days. Stewardship of creation is an ongoing ministry in the church. The creation that God declared good is entrusted to the care of humankind. Exercising that care is one dimension of daily Christian discipleship. Rogation Days are a way for the church to honor God for the gift of creation and to pray for the land, the gift of labor, and the needs of all people. Rogation Days were traditionally celebrated during the fifty days of Easter on the Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday before Ascension Day. The word Rogation has its roots in the Latin word that means to ask or petition, and it comes from the ancient introit for the Sunday preceding the Ascension. In some places the celebrations of Rogation Days were quite elaborate and included processions from the church to and around fields while asking for God's blessing. Although Rogation Days are agricultural celebrations, they are not solely for rural congregations. These days underscore the dependence of all people, urban and rural, on the fruitfulness of the earth and human labor.

Readings and Commemorations This Week

May 6 – Psalm 93; Deuteronomy 7:1-11; I Timothy 6:11-12

May 7 – Psalm 93; Deuteronomy 11:1-17; I Timothy 6:13-16

May 8 – Dame Julian of Norwich, anchoress, renewer of the church, 1416 – Psalm 27:5-11; Hebrews 10:19-24; John 4:23-26 – When she was about thirty years old, Julian (or Juliana) reported visions that she later compiled into a book, Sixteen Revelations of Divine Love, now a classic of medieval mysticism. The visions declared that love was the meaning of religious experience, provided by Christ who is love, for the purpose of love.

also May 8 – Victor the Moor, martyr, 303 -- Also known as Victor Maurus, this native of the northwest African nation of Mauritania was a soldier in the Roman Praetorian Guard. Under the persecution of Maximian, Victor died for his faith at Milan.

May 9 – THE ASCENSION OF JESUS – Acts 1:1-11; Psalm 47; Ephesians 1:15-23; Luke 24:44-53 – The evangelist Luke was a talented storyteller, and his narrative presentations of the life of Jesus have become normative in the Christian church. An example is the chronology that Luke, and only Luke, give to the resurrected Christ. Forty days, the unit that repeatedly in the Bible signifies sacred time, marks the period that Christ was seen by his followers after the resurrection. This forty-day unit has led much of the church since the fourth century to celebrate the Ascension of Our Lord on a Thursday, the fortieth day after Easter.

May 10 – Nicolaus Ludwig, Count von Zinzendorf, renewer of the church, hymnwriter, 1760 (transferred) – Jeremiah 4:1-10; Psalm 46; I Corinthians 3:11-23; Mark 10:35-45 -- When he was 22, a group of Moravians asked permission to live on Zinzendorf's land. He agreed, and eventually worldwide Moravian missions emanated from this community. Zinzendorf participated in these missions, and is also remembered for writing hymns characteristic of his Pietistic faith.
