




COMMUNION



Readings and Commemorations This Week

January 21 – **Agnes, martyr, c. 304** – Song of Solomon 2:10-13; Psalm 45:11-16; Matthew 18:1-6 -- *Agnes was a girl of about thirteen living in Rome. The details of her martyrdom are not clear, but she gave witness to her faith and was put to death as a result, most likely by the sword. The church has honored her as one of the chief martyrs of her time.*

January 22 – Psalm 46; Genesis 12:1-9; I Corinthians 7:17-42

January 23 – Psalm 46; Genesis 45:35-46:7; Acts 5:33-42

January 24 – Psalm 46; Proverbs 8:1-21; Mark 3:13-19a

January 25 – The Conversion of St. Paul Week of Prayer for Christian Unity Ends – Acts 9:1-22; Psalm 67; Galatians 1:11-24; Luke 21:10-19 -- The week of prayer begun by the remembrance of Peter's confession now comes to an end as we recall the pivotal moment in the life of the other pillar of the early church, the apostle Paul. His encounter with the risen Christ turned him from persecutor of the followers of Christ to one of their leaders.

January 26 – Timothy, Titus, Silas, missionaries – II Timothy 1:1-8; Titus 1:1-5; Psalm 112:1-9; John 10:1-10 -- *These three early Christian men were missionary companions of the apostle Paul. Timothy became bishop of Ephesus, Titus bishop of Crete, and Silas was imprisoned with Paul at Philippi until they were delivered by an earthquake.*

January 27 – Lydia, Dorcas, Phoebe, witness to the faith – Sirach 2:7-11; Psalm 1; I Corinthians 1:26-31; Matthew 25:1-13 – Women as well as men were important Christian leaders from the beginning, as demonstrated by these coworkers of the apostle Paul. Lydia, a seller of purple goods, lent her home for a church; Dorcas was known for charitable works; and Phoebe was a deacon in the church at Cenchrae.
