Though the people had returned to Jerusalem from exile in Babylon, they continued to face hardship and oppression. In the language of the jubilee year described in Leviticus 25, the prophet, moved by the spirit of God, announces deliverance for those who are oppressed and comfort for those who mourn.

They will be called oaks of righteousness, the planting of the Lord, to display the glory of the Lord. ⁴They shall build up the ancient ruins; they shall raise up the former devastations; they shall repair the ruined cities, the devastations of many generations. ⁸For I, the Lord, love justice, I hate robbery and wrongdoing; I will faithfully give them their recompense, and I will make an everlasting covenant with them. ⁹Their descendants shall be known among the nations and their offspring among the peoples; all who see them shall acknowledge that they are a people whom the Lord has blessed. ¹⁰I will greatly rejoice in the Lord; my whole being shall exult in my God, for the Lord has clothed me with the garments of salvation, and has covered me with the robe of righteousness, as a bridegroom decks himself with a garland and as a bride adorns herself with her jewels. ¹¹For as the earth brings forth its shoots and as a garden causes what is sown in it to spring up, so the Lord God will cause righteousness and praise to spring up before all the nations.




At the suggestion of pastor Larry Houff, Paul Damico-Carper wrote this adaptation of the song of Mary to be used in a setting of Evening Prayer and as a post-communion canticle in a matched Holy Communion setting for Advent at Holden Village in 2005. In addition to the traditional text's proclamation of divinely initiated status reversals, this adaptation lifts up feminine imagery for the life of faith and invites singers to see themselves as God-bearers (Theotokoi) intimately involved in the flourishing of the body of Christ.

John's gospel describes Jesus as the "light of the world." John the Baptist is presented as a witness to Jesus, one who directs attention away from himself to Christ, the true light.

GOSPEL: John 1:6-8, 19-28

⁶There was a man sent from God whose name was John. ⁷He came as a witness to testify to the light, so that all might believe through him. ⁸John himself was not the light, but he came to testify to the light. ¹⁹This is the testimony given by John when the Judeans sent priests and Levites from Jerusalem to ask him, "Who are you?" ²⁰John confessed and did not deny it, but confessed, "I am not the Messiah." ²¹And they asked him, "What then? Are you Elijah?" He said, "I am not." "Are you the prophet?" He answered, "No." ²²Then they said to him, "Who are you? Let us have an answer for those who sent us. What do you say about yourself?" ²³John said, "I am the voice of one crying out in the wilderness, 'Make straight the way of the Lord,'" as the prophet Isaiah said. ²⁴Now they had been sent from the Pharisees. ²⁵They asked him, "Why, then, are you baptizing if you are neither the Messiah, nor Elijah, nor the prophet?" ²⁶John answered them, "I baptize with water. Among you stands one whom you do not know, ²⁷the one who is coming after me, the strap of whose sandal I am not worthy to untie." ²⁸This took place in Bethany across the Jordan where John was baptizing.

Though some hymns attributed to Ambrose are doubtful, this one seems rather surely to be by him. Luther's German version (commemorated in the tune name) dropped one syllable from each line of the Latin text, giving the hymn its characteristically declarative Lutheran form.



A beautifully simple, singable melody accompanies the confident statement that Jesus comes to bring peace. A request comes in the third phrase of each stanza as we ask for Jesus as Sun of justice to shine on us and as the loving Shepherd to lead us. In the last line we return to patient expectation. This song is suitable not only for Advent but for the second coming of Jesus and any time we find ourselves waiting in hope. 

<u>Worship</u>

The Eucharistic Prayer for the season of Advent was composed by Gail Ramshaw, a liturgical scholar. About it, she writes: *This Advent Eucharistic Prayer is based on the O Antiphons. Sung in medieval monasteries December17–23 at evening prayer before and after the Magnificat, the antiphons used Old Testament images as descriptors of Christ.*

The first letters of the seven Latin words— <u>S</u>apientia (Wisdom), <u>A</u>donai(Lord), <u>R</u>adix Jesse (Root of Jesse), <u>C</u>lavis David (Key of David),

> <u>O</u>riens (Sunrise), <u>R</u>ex Gentium (King of Nations), <u>E</u>mmanuel (God with us)

--when read backwards, spell "Ero cras," "I will be tomorrow," that is, Christ will be here December 24. The final quatrain ("Come, Lord Jesus, be our guest") can also serve as meal prayer in the home.

Our prelude begins at 10:25 each week and flows into the 10:30am worship time. We hope that this will draw us together and into our time of worship. Please remember to be mindful of those around you and those worshiping at home by keeping conversations and visiting to the lobbies once the prelude has begun. Thank you.

A reminder that our livestream runs from the beginning of the prelude through the end of the postlude. To maintain a worshipful space for those joining from home, please remember to leave the chancel area (the area around the altar) clear until after the postlude.
