THE COMMUNION







We will gather at both services on this morning to focus ourselves on God's abundance in our lives and to make our commitments to God's mission through financial support of Luther Memorial. Worship Matters

While not *technically* a liturgical commemoration, today (November 10) is the 86th anniversary of Kristallnacht. The "Night of Broken Glass" was the beginning of the public pogroms of Nazi Germany. In one night, 267 synagogues we burned; 7,000 Jewish-owned business had their windows shattered and their inventory destroyed or looted (the shattered glass is where the name Kristallnacht came from because in the morning sunshine the glass shone like crystal); and over 30,000 Jewish men were arrested and deported to concentration camps.

Why should we remember this day as Lutherans 86 years later? There are several reasons. The first is that we cannot escape that writings of Martin Luther—who was himself an anti-Semite—were used by Hitler and the Nazis to support their actions and beliefs. Additionally, the Lutheran Church in Germany quickly became the Reich Church; some bishops' pectoral crosses were even worn on chains made out of gilt swastikas. November 10 is also Luther's birthday and many were unaware of the destruction being wreaked because they were celebrating his 455th birthday.

We can lift up Dietrich Bonhoeffer and the Confessing Church—an underground movement within the Lutheran Church of theologians, clergy, seminarians, and others who stood against the usurpation of the Church for the Reich's deeds. However, we must remember that Bonhoeffer was not initially against what was happening in Germany and once he was, he was eventually caught in a plot to assassinate Adolf Hitler and executed for the crime.

This day serves as a reminder of the ways that the Church has often stood by while harm has been done, often with our blessing and in Jesus' name.

A prayer by Dietrich Bonhoeffer from prison (set to music as hymn 626 in *Evangelical Lutheran Worship*):

- 1. By gracious powers so wonderfully sheltered and confidently waiting, come what may, we know that God is with us night and morning, and never fails to meet us each new day.
- Yet are our hearts by their old foe tormented; still evil days bring burdens hard to bear; O give our frightened souls the sure salvation for which, O Lord, you taught us to prepare.
- 3. And when the cup you give is filled to brimming with bitter suffering, hard to understand, we take it gladly, trusting though with trembling, out of so good and so beloved a hand.
- 4. If once again, in this mixed world, you give us the joy we had, the brightness of your sun, we shall recall what we have learned through sorrow, and dedicate our lives to you alone.
- 5. Now as your silence deeply spreads around us, open our ears to hear your children raise from all the world, from every nation round us, to you their universal hymn of praise.

Readings and Commemorations This Week

November 11 – Martin, Bishop of Tours, 397 – Isaiah 58:6-12; Psalm 15; Matthew 25:34-40 -- Martin's pagan father enlisted him in the Roman army. Approached by a beggar, Martin cut his cloak in half and gave part to the man, whom he later understood as representing Christ. He asked to leave the army, but was jailed instead. After his release, he became a preacher, and later a bishop. In the ancient church, St Martintide, beginning today and ending on the feast of St Andrew (11/30,) was the beginning of Advent. Today, Veterans Day/Armistice Day is remembered on St. Martin's Day which invites an interesting conversation as Martin was a conscientious objector.

November 12 – Soren Aabye Kierkegaard, teacher, 1855 – Proverbs 3:1-7; Psalm 119:89-104; I Corinthians 2:6-10, 13-16; John 17:18-23 -- *Kierkegaard was a Danish theologian whose writings also gave rise to the modern philosophy of existentialism. He frequently attacked the complacency of the state church of his day, as well as its desire to be accepted by polite society rather than be a stumbling block.*

November 14 – Psalm 16; Daniel 4:4-18; I Timothy 6:11-21
