

FIRST READING: Exodus 24:12-18



SECOND READING: II Peter 1:16-21

¹⁶We did not follow cleverly devised myths when we made known to you the power and coming of our Lord Jesus Christ, but we had been eyewitnesses of his majesty. ¹⁷For Jesus received honor and glory from God, the Father, when that voice was conveyed to him by the Majestic Glory, saying, "This is my Son, my Beloved, with whom I am well pleased." ¹⁸We ourselves heard this voice come from heaven, while we were with Jesus on the holy mountain. ¹⁹So we have the prophetic message more fully confirmed. You will do well to be attentive to this as to a lamp shining in a dark place, until the day dawns and the morning star rises in your hearts. ²⁰First of all you must understand this, that no prophecy of scripture is a matter of one's own interpretation, ²¹because no prophecy ever came by human will, but men and women moved by the Holy Spirit spoke from God.

COUNCIL INSTALLATION

You are to be examples of faith active in love, fostering peace, harmony, and mutual understanding in this congregation.

On behalf of your sisters and brothers in Christ, I ask you: Will you accept and faithfully carry out the duties of the offices to which you have been elected?

Response: I will, and I ask God to help me.

The congregation stands. Those being installed face the congregation. The presiding minister addresses the congregation.

People of God, I ask you: Will you support these, your elected leaders, and will you share in the mutual ministry that Christ has given to all who are baptized?

We will, and we ask God to help us.

Those being installed face the presiding minister, who addresses them.

I now declare you installed as officers / council members of this congregation. Almighty God bless you, and direct your days and your deeds in peace, that you may be faithful servants of Christ.

BURIAL OF THE ALLELUIA

“But Jesus came and touched them, saying, ‘Get up and do not be afraid.’ And when they raised their eyes, they saw no one except Jesus himself alone. As they were coming down the mountain, Jesus ordered them, ‘Tell no one about the vision until after the Son-of-Man has been raised from the dead.’”

Sometimes, deep within, we must keep our Alleluias.

“Then Jesus told his disciples, ‘If any wish to come after me, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me. For those who want to save their life will lose it, and those who lose their life for my sake will find it. For what will it profit them if they gain the whole world but forfeit their life? Or what will they give in return for their life?’”

Sometimes, for others, we must give up our Alleluias.

“When Jesus had received the wine, he said, ‘It is finished.’ Then he bowed his head and gave up his spirit.”

Sometimes, in sorrow, we cannot sing our Alleluias.

“Therefore we have been buried with Christ by baptism into death, so that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, so we too might walk in newness of life. For if we have been united with him in a death like his, we will certainly be united with him in a resurrection like his.”

Even at the grave, we make our song Alleluia!

“Now there was a garden in the place where he was crucified, and in the garden there was a new tomb in which no one had ever been laid. And so, because it was the Jewish day of Preparation, and the tomb was nearby, they laid Jesus there.”

Worship Matters!

This is a pivot point in the life of the Church. In the story of Jesus, the Transfiguration takes place just before he begins his public procession to Jerusalem (more on that in the Wednesdays of Lent). In the life of the Church, we celebrate Transfiguration Sunday on the last Sunday before Lent begins. Indeed, we end our service with a farewell to the Alleluia for a season. We leave the joy and exultation of the mountain of transfiguration and head back down to the people with Jesus. We journey together, then, to the mountain of crucifixion where we will again see the glory of God in the face of our dying Savior. In the meantime, as we journey on the way with Jesus on the plains with us, we reflect more deeply on our relationship with the God who comes to us and loves us into the life of faith. Come, let us celebrate...AND let us turn our faces with Jesus toward Jerusalem and the God who loves us through death itself.

Faith Formation for All Ages
