Worship Matters!

Holy Cross Day is a unique celebration. Technically, the day is known as The Exaltation of the Holy Cross. But the choice of date has very little to do with the Cross itself. It is on September 14 in the year 326 that Helena, the mother of Constantine, founded the Church of the Holy Sepulchre, believed to be on the site of Jesus' crucifixion and burial, in Jerusalem. To this day, this church remains one of the holiest sites in all Christianity and held in esteem by Christians of many denominations.

According to tradition, Helena was a recent and fervent convert to Christianity after her son legalized its practice in the early 4th century CE. She went on pilgrimage to Jerusalem and the Holy Land and on her travels collected a number of relics of Jesus and the saints. She would later bring these back and build a church to mirror the Church of the Holy Sepulchre—the Basilica of the Holy Cross in Jerusalem (Basilica Santa Croce Gerusalemme)—in Rome to house these relics where they can still be found now. However, as she sought the holiest of relics—the True Cross—there were many places thought to be where Jesus was crucified. It is said that one morning she smelled sweet basil and, following her nose, was led to a trash heap-turned-hill covered in sweet basil and upon digging found wood enough for three crosses. When a sick man touched one of the crosses, he was healed. Helena, then, built the church in this location.

Now, whether or not all those details are factually true, it is nevertheless the case that all of Christianity has come to revere this site as holy—and often what we hold holy is made holy precisely because of our common reverence. Taking a cue from the story of how the True Cross was found, in many parts of the Church—particularly in the Eastern Church and Eastern Europe—today is the day to harvest the remaining basil and prepare it for storage (this is, also, just generally near the end of the basil season outdoors, anyway). Interestingly, if you flatten a "layer" of a basil plant, there are four leaves that form a cross.

However it comes to us, on this day all these years later and almost a direct 6 months after Good Friday, we take time to give thanks not just for the Passion of Jesus through which we are redeemed, but also the instrument of Capital Punishment the Government used to execute an inconvenient peripatetic prophet who spoke truth to power and challenged the status quo.

We adore you, O Christ, and as bless you. By you holy cross you have redeemed the world.

LIVESTREAMERS ARE NEEDED! Recently, a few of our services have not been livestreamed and therefore not available to our homebound members. We need a robust rotation of livestreamers which involves tending the camera in the choir loft during our 10:30am worship service and our main worship services on feast days (such as Christmas Eve or Ash Wednesday). All ages are welcome to take on this vital leadership role in our communal worship. September 15 – Psalm 73; Amos 7:1-6; I Timothy 1:18-20


September 16 – Cyprian, Bishop of Carthage, martyr, 258 – Psalm 73; Jonah 3:1-10; II Peter 3:8-13 -- Cyprian served as a bishop during a time of great persecution of Christians. He insisted on receiving back those who had left the faith under duress. He also provided medical care during a severe epidemic.

September 17 – Hildegard, Abbess of Bingen, 1179 – Psalm 73; Job 40:6-14, 42:1-6; Luke 22:31-33, 54-62 -- *A mystic who was widely influential within the church, Hildegard advised and reproved kings and popes, wrote poems and hymns, and produced treatises in medicine, theology, and natural history. She was also a musician and artist.*

September 18 – Dag Hammarskjold, renewer of society, 1961 – Psalm 113; Exodus 23:1-9; Romans 3:1-8 -- A Swedish diplomat, Hammarskjöld served as the second Secretary General of the United Nations until his death in a plane crash while trying to negotiate peace in present-day Zambia. His journal, published as Markings, revealed the depth of his Christian faith.
