<u>Worship</u>

"A Reading from Wisdom..." This week we have two readings from a section of scripture known as the Apocrypha. From the Greek meaning "shrouded" or "mysterious" it is not the content that is shrouded or unknown but rather the source. These texts in the Apocrypha have been included in the Bible from the very first canon created in 382. However, later Christians wondered about their inclusion because they are stories of the Hebrew people but their earliest source material is written in Greek which seemed strange to these Christians since they expected them to be written in Hebrew. For that reason, later Protestant Christians removed the Apocrypha, or what some call the Deutero-Canonical Books (secondary-canon). Luther translated these books of the Bible and even wrote prefaces for them. He held them in esteem, but because of their clouded source did not hold them as strongly as the canon of the 66 books of the Protestant Bible. We read from these books as continued witness to the Word of God.
