

SECOND READING: Hebrews 1:1-4; 2:5-12

¹Long ago God spoke to our ancestors in many and various ways by the prophets, ²but in these last days God has spoken to us by a Son, whom God appointed heir of all things, through whom God also created the worlds. ³He is the reflection of God's glory and the exact imprint of God's very being, and sustains all things by his powerful word. When the Son had made purification for sins, he sat down at the right hand of the Majesty on high, ⁴having become as much superior to angels as the name he has inherited is more excellent than theirs. ^{2:5}Now God did not subject the coming world, about which we are speaking, to angels. ⁶But someone has testified somewhere, "What are humans that you are mindful of them or mortals that you care for them? ⁷You have made them for a little while lower than the angels; you have crowned them with glory and honor, ⁸subjecting all things under their feet." Now in subjecting all things to them, God left nothing outside their control. As it is, we do not yet see everything in subjection to them, ⁹but we do see Jesus, who for a little while was made lower than the angels, now crowned with glory and honor because of the suffering of death, so that by the grace of God Jesus might taste death for everyone. ¹⁰It was fitting that God, for whom and through whom all things exist, in bringing many children to glory, should make the pioneer of their salvation perfect through sufferings. ¹¹For the one who sanctifies and those who are sanctified all have one source. For this reason Jesus is not ashamed to call them members of his family, ¹²saying, "I will proclaim your name to my family; in the midst of the congregation I will praise you."

So they are no longer two but one flesh. ⁹Therefore what God has joined together, let no one separate." ¹⁰Then in the house the disciples asked Jesus again about this matter. ¹¹He said to them, "Whatever man divorces his spouse and marries another commits adultery, 12and if she divorces her spouse and marries another, she commits adultery." ¹³People were bringing children to Jesus in order that he might touch them, and the disciples spoke sternly to them. ¹⁴But when Jesus saw this, he was indignant and said to them, "Let the children come to me; do not stop them, for it is to such as these that the dominion of God belongs. ¹⁵Truly I tell you, whoever does not receive the dominion of God as a little child will never enter it." ¹⁶And Jesus took them up in his arms, laid his hands on them, and blessed them.

THANKSGIVING AT THE TABLE

P You are indeed holy, almighty and merciful God. You are most holy, and great is the majesty of your glory. - ▶ To you, O God, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, be all honor and glory in your holy church, now and forever.





THE COMMUNION





Worship Matters

Why did the Announcements move? Recently I was asked why we moved the Announcements to just before the Blessing when I arrived. There are a number of reasons (as usual) for this. There are several places in the worship service where it is appropriate to make the Announcements. The first is at the beginning, before we begin worship. Another good place is after the Peace and just before the Offering is collected. A third option is where we have them now just before the Blessing. While each have their good reasons, theologies, and practical sides, making the Announcements just before the Blessing in the SENDING section of the service reminds us that we are not just leaving church after about an hour of sitting in this room together. We are being Sent by the Spirit in mission. What we do in worship is what strengthens us for service. Our whole lives should begin and end in worship, everything we do flows from worship. So when we make Announcements just before the Blessing, we are reminded that we are Sent out into the world with mission and ministry to do...and some of the ways we fulfill that mission and ministry are the many things we list in the Announcements.

<u>Outreach</u>

Bethany Outreach Center News

After 20+ wonderful years at the former Bethany Lutheran Church located at 10th and German, the organization founded by its members is now moving to a new location to better serve its community.

<u>HISTORY</u>: The Bethany Lutheran church food pantry was established in 2004 to serve people that kept coming to the door in need of food. In 2005, the Bethany Lutheran church combined with Luther Memorial church, and the building was owned by Luther Memorial as we continued to serve local people who needed food pantry and other outreach programs, such as the MOMS group. Between 2005 and 2010, additional services such as a clothes closet, computer classes, and other educational programming were offered. In 2010 Bethany Outreach Center became an independent non-profit organization with Diane Giannelli as its Executive Director, and she and her organization of volunteers from Luther Memorial and the local community continued the work she had begun ever since 2004. In 2011 the building was sold to the Neighborhood Partnership, and so Bethany Outreach has leased space from them to continue its services. During the years of the Pandemic, Bethany Outreach had to cease its educational services and concentrated on the life essentials services of Food Pantry and Clothes Closet that it could provide outdoors. Also, during that time conditions in the facility eroded to where recently we could not use them for educational services again. So, we searched for a new location where we could provide both educational services and our existing Food Pantry and Clothes Closet services ... and now...

Readings and Commemorations This Week

October 6 -- William Tyndale, translator, martyr, 1536 – Psalm 1; James 1:21-25; John 12:44-50 -- *Tyndale was ordained a priest in England and wished to translate the Bible into English. He was opposed in this by King Henry VIII, causing him to flee to Germany. He completed the New Testament in 1525, but before he could finish the Old Testament, he was tried for heresy and burned at the stake.*

October 7 – Henry Melchior Muhlenberg, pastor in North America, 1787 – Ezekiel 34:11-16; Psalm 84; I Peter 5:1-4; John 21:15-17 -- Divided Lutherans in America asked leaders in Europe to send someone who could take charge and unite their work. Muhlenberg was sent, and was effective in organizing the American Lutherans. Among other accomplishments, his liturgical principles became the basis for the Common Service of 1888.
